God's Economy

Today we hear about a landowner who hired laborers to work in his vineyard. The first hires agreed on a day's pay. When work ended the men were paid, the first hires receiving the same as the late hires. Imagine the grumbling! Fairness and justice in the marketplace are essential. In 1891, Pope Leo XIII issued *Rerum Novarum* ("Of New Things"). This ground-breaking document discussed the relationships and duties of labor and capital, governments and citizens. It called for just wages for people to support families, and the right of labor to unionize. The pope rejected both communism and unrestricted capitalism, and affirmed the right to private property. In the Gospel, Jesus is not addressing these issues, but God's relationship with people. God acts with justice: like the laborers who worked all day, we receive what God promised. God also gives beyond simple justice, giving unexpectedly and lavishly. In God's economy we all get what we deserve and more than we ever bargained for.

La Economía de Dios

Hoy oímos acerca de un propietario que contrató obreros para trabajar en su viña. Los primeros contratados estuvieron de acuerdo con el salario diario que se les ofreció. Cuando se terminó el día laboral todos recibieron la misma paga, según lo acordado, tanto los que empezaron primero como los que llegaron a lo último. ¡Imagínate los gruñidos! Tanto la justicia como la equidad son esenciales en el mundo mercantil. En 1891 el Papa León XIII publicó su encíclica *Rerum Novarum* ("Sobre la Situación de los Obreros"). Este documento innovador abordaba las relaciones y responsabilidades entre el obrero y el capital, y entre el

gobierno y sus ciudadanos. Pedía salarios justos que le permitiera a los trabajadores mantener su familia, así como el derecho a formar sindicatos laborales. El papa rechazaba tanto el comunismo como el capitalismo sin restricciones y afirmaba el derecho a la propiedad privada. En el Evangelio de hoy, Jesús no se refiere a estos asuntos, sino a la relación de Dios con su pueblo. Dios actúa con justicia y, tal como los obreros que trabajaron todo el día, nosotros recibimos lo que Dios nos promete. Dios también es profusamente generoso más allá de la justicia humana y de lo que podemos esperar. En la economía de Dios nosotros recibimos no lo que tenemos merecido, sino lo mejor e inimaginable.

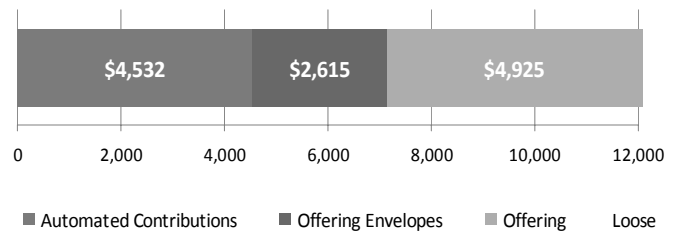

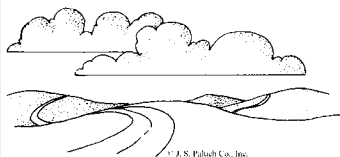

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Isaiah tells us something that we already know, and yet seem to forget every now and then. He tells us, essentially, that God is God and we are not. When we're confused and troubled and can't figure everything out, it might be wise to recall Isaiah speaking on the Lord's behalf and explaining that God—who is on a much more, well, Godly wavelength than we are—moves in ways we can't even imagine.

Saint Paul, by comparison, has everything figured out. Kind of. At least he understands his calling in life—to magnify Christ in everything he does. That should give all of us the direction we need. Jesus gives us direction, too, explaining to us once again in the parable of the workers in the vineyard that the last will be first, and the first, last. — © Copyright, J. S. Paluch Co.

Doxology and Amen

“Doxology” comes from a Greek word meaning “words of praise.” The Eucharistic Prayer ends with a doxology addressed to the triune God: “Through him, with him, in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all glory and honor is yours, almighty Father, for ever and ever.” It is an exclamation of praise, honor, and glory to God, reminding us that we receive everything from God through the Son, in the power of the Spirit. At the consecration, the priest held up the host and then the chalice for us to see and adore. During the doxology, the host and chalice are held up again, but this time they are held up and offered to God the Father. With the doxology, the Eucharistic Prayer ends, as it began, with words of praise addressed to the Father: truly, it is right and just to give God praise, and we assent to this in our whole-hearted acclamation, “Amen.” Never was more meaning packed into so short a word. This “Amen,” sometimes and fittingly called “the great Amen,” is our response to the entire Eucharistic Prayer. — Corinna Laughlin, © Copyright, J. S. Paluch Co.

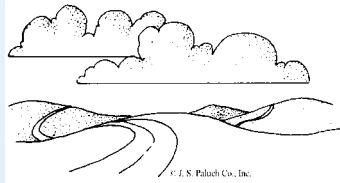

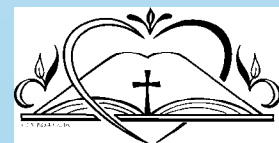
La Fracción del Pan

Uno de los primeros nombres que se dio a la celebración eucarística era precisamente este: “la fracción del pan”. De hecho, Lucas es muy preciso al relatarnos que los discípulos de Emaús lo reconocieron “en la fracción del pan”. En la celebración, el sacerdote fracciona la hostia o el pan y deposita una parte menor en el cáliz que contiene la Sangre del Señor, significando así la gloriosa resurrección, un misterio pascual total. Esta acción de partir un mismo pan antes de compartirlo nos recuerda que somos miembros de un solo cuerpo. El pan es precisamente para eso, para compartirse y esta acción de partir el pan nos recuerda la obligación moral que tenemos de compartir nuestro propio pan con quien tiene hambre y, de hacer que la vida propia sea ese mismo pan de vida que comulgamos. El pan ha de ser compartido sin medida alguna, tal y como la vida misma ha de compartirse. Cristo mismo realizó esta acción: “tomó, bendijo, partió y compartió”. Es necesario romper nuestra vida para darla a los demás, a ejemplo de Cristo.

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All Along the Watchtower

In the Hebrew Scriptures, the Old Testament, there are several references to taking up on a watchtower in order to hear God's call. Most often, the reference is made to a community to put men on watchtowers around their cities to both watch and listen and then report what they see and hear. The two senses of seeing and hearing go hand and hand when it comes to an announcement from God.

A very well known watchtower references comes to us from the twenty-first chapter of the book of Isaiah. In this poem from Isaiah, God says, "Go, station a watchman and let him tell what he sees". The watchman, fervently keeping his watch without a break, encounters a couple of someone's who announces that Babylon, Israel's captors, have fallen and all their images of gods are smashed.

In our Christian tradition, many mystics and spiritual writers, encourage Christians to post a watchman over their heart. These mystics believe that the real battle does not exist among nations or cultures or families. Rather, the real battle exists in one's heart. It is in the heart where Christ desires to dwell. And Christ cannot dwell in the heart if it is filled with contempt of neighbor, negative judgment of sibling, hatred of another culture.

Work, hard work, has to be undergone to rid the heart of such negativity and evilness. Some of this work is praying, some of it is fasting, some of it is simply doing good works in the community. Once the heart is clean of such elements and Christ is dwelling in one's heart, the mystics tell us to not put our guard down. Post a watchman to see and hear what announcements are coming to us from God. Keep steadfast in your watch.

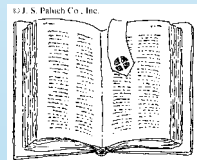

The Doxology and the Great Amen

Doxology means an account (-ology) of glory (doxa-). Doxologies appear in various liturgies of the Church. One of the most familiar is the doxology at the end of the Lord's Prayer: "For the kingdom, / the power and the glory are yours / now and for ever." During the Liturgy of the Hours, there are doxologies at the end of the psalms. The Rosary includes the "Glory be." Hymns, especially ancient ones, have a doxology as the final or part of the final stanza. Finally, there is the doxology at the end of the Eucharistic Prayer: "Through him, and with him, and in him, / O God, almighty Father, / in the unity of the Holy Spirit, / all glory and honor is yours, / for ever and ever."

Doxologies are ancient and have been part of the Church's liturgies since the early centuries. Many of the early Church fathers used these doxologies to defend the doctrine of the Trinity. Those who held heretical views denied the divinity of Christ Jesus and/or the divinity of the Holy Spirit. Early theologians reminded those espousing heretical views that the Doxologies give glory and praise to the Triune God: Father Son, and Holy Spirit.

These, like our Creeds, have a Trinitarian structure. The doctrine of the Trinity states that God is One, yet three persons: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. We see this doctrine in the structure and theology of the doxology of the Eucharistic Prayer.

"Through him, and with him, and in him," though not apparent in the text itself, is not about Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, rather it is through Christ, and with Christ, and in Christ, that we worship, praise, and thank God the Father. Then, through the proclamation of these words by the priest, our glory and praise of God is offered: "O God,



almighty Father, / in the unity of the Holy Spirit, / all glory and honor is yours. . . ." We give glory and honor to the Triune God who is Father, Son and Holy Spirit. Through the entire Eucharistic Prayer, we pray to God the Father, through Christ and in the power of the Holy Spirit. It is the Spirit that moves us to pray in, with, and through Christ to God the Father. Christ is our mediator. Christ is the one who unites us to communion with God. This is beautifully prayed by the priest and the faithful in the Eucharistic Prayer for Reconciliation I: "But before his arms were outstretched between heaven and earth, / to become the lasting sign of your covenant, / he desired to celebrate the Passover with his disciples." Christ unites heaven with earth: Christ unites himself and God the Father with the entire cosmos in general and humanity in particular.

In the liturgy, words are united to actions or gestures or objects. The priest holds the Body and Blood of Christ throughout the chanting of this particular doxology. If there is a deacon present at the liturgy, the priest holds the Body of Christ and the deacon holds the Blood of Christ. This is when we offer our glory and honor to the God who becomes tangible in our midst: the Body and Blood of Christ. The faithful acclaim this proclamation, that is, they make it their own, with the singing of "Amen." Our "Amen" is our way of giving of, confirming, and believing what the priest chanted, not only in the doxology, but in the entire Eucharistic Prayer.

Doxologies are our way of praising, glorifying, and honoring the Triune God who seeks to unite us to himself. How can we not sing Amen?!
