

Today's Readings

First Reading — The LORD said to Cyrus, his anointed, “I am the LORD, there is no other” (Isaiah 45:1, 4-6).

Psalm — Give the Lord glory and honor (Psalm 96).

Second Reading — Paul, Silvanus, and Timothy to the church of the Thessalonians: We thank God always for all of you (1 Thessalonians 1:1-5b).

Gospel — Give to Caesar what is Caesar's, and to God what is God's (Matthew 22:15-21).



In God Alone

Isaiah speaks to us today of Cyrus, King of Persia, anointed by the Lord. God calls Cyrus by name and leads him in service to the Israelites. In this passage we hear that it is the Lord who gives Cyrus his title, who arms him against his enemies, and who opens doors and unbars gates before him. And God does all of this so that the people will know that “I am the LORD,” and that “there is none besides me” (Isaiah 45:6).

Paul opens his letter with essentially the same notion—that in God alone we find our grace and peace. Paul also gives thanks to God on our behalf, calling to mind our work of faith, hope, and love. And in the familiar Gospel reading, Jesus tells the Pharisees to give to Caesar what is Caesar's and to God what is God's. — © Copyright, J. S. Paluch Co.

Only Say the Word

The bread is broken, the banquet is prepared, and now we are invited to the feast. Once more the priest holds the host, now broken, for us to see, and invites us to behold the one “who takes away the sins of the world.” Truly blessed and happy are those invited to this meal, which is a foretaste of the heavenly banquet, the supper of the Lamb (Revelation 19:19). We respond to this invitation with a prayer to the Lord: we acknowledge that we are not worthy, but at the same time we are confident that the One who comes to us can heal us, body and soul. This prayer echoes the story of the centurion in Luke's Gospel. The centurion, a Gentile, asks healing for his servant, but does not consider himself worthy to have Jesus come under his roof—he believes that Jesus can heal his servant with a word, without even seeing him. Jesus is amazed at his faith. It is the same for us. We believe that Jesus speaks to us, comes to us, dwells with us, even though we neither hear his voice nor see his face. — Corinna Laughlin, © Copyright, J. S. Paluch Co.

Sólo en Dios



Isaías nos habla hoy de Ciro, el rey de Persia, ungido del Señor. Dios llama a Ciro por su nombre y lo conduce a servir a los israelitas. En este pasaje oímos que es el Señor quien le da a Ciro su título, quien lo arma contra sus enemigos, y quien abre los portones, y no deja nada trancado ante él. Y Dios hace todo esto para que su pueblo llegue a saber que “yo soy el SEÑOR,” y que “no hay otro” (Isaías 45:6).

Pablo abre su carta esencialmente con la misma noción, que sólo en Dios podemos hallar gracia y paz. Pablo también da gracias a Dios en nuestro nombre, recordando nuestro trabajo fatigoso de fe, esperanza y amor. Y en la familiar lectura del Evangelio, Jesús dice a los fariseos que den al César lo que es del César y a Dios lo que es de Dios. — © Copyright, J. S. Paluch Co.

Comunión: Dar y Recibir

La celebración eucarística es la oración por excelencia de toda la Iglesia; la plenitud de esta celebración es la comunión. Aunque comulgamos personalmente, es una acción totalmente comunitaria. No comulgamos como individuos sino como un solo cuerpo místico de Cristo que somos. Cristo mismo partió su cuerpo y nos lo dio; durante su ministerio público, pidió a sus apóstoles que repartieran el pan a la gente. La comunión se nos da porque en sí es un don y regalo de Dios. Si tomamos directamente la comunión empobrece el significado porque no es un autoservicio o algo que simplemente podemos agarrar. Al comulgar lo que somos, dice san Agustín, estamos llamados a ser lo que comemos. La Eucaristía, como sacramento, es un regalo absoluto de Dios, es un estilo de vida, una espiritualidad a vivir, nunca una conquista propia. La Eucaristía, nos lo recuerda Juan Pablo II, “crea comunión y educa a la comunión”. En comunión no sólo se recibe el don, sino que la persona comulgante, se da a sí misma, a lo que comulga y a la asamblea con quien comulga y vive esa comunión. — Miguel Arias, © Copyright, J. S. The Challenge of Accepting God's Call

I love caller ID. I love it even more now that I have a phone that talks to me. A call comes in and my phone announcing to me who is calling. It's wonderful. I don't have to get up from the table or couch to look and see what number is coming in. Remember the old days? Painful.

Our modern day technology makes it so easy to reject incoming phone calls. Rejecting incoming live face-to-face calls from friends or relatives or associates takes, well, more finesse. I am proud to say that I have refined the fine art of rejecting such face-to-face calls. The art entails a slice of active listening + a few nods of the head followed by a question that diverts the incoming call and lets me off the hook.

Reading the call of Moses, I find that I am in good company. Moses, for example, at first, tried to reject God's call. Imagine that. Moses basically said, "OK God, I cannot be a leader because I have a speech impediment." God said, "I will take care of that, I will send with you Aaron to do all the talking. You just show up and use this staff that I am going to give you."

Reading through "the call" of other major Old Testament profits I continue to find that I am in good company. It turns out that they all tried to reject God's initial call. But God, wonderful as God is, consistently responds, "Don't worry about your faults and defects. I will take care of that."

Typically, when I am rejecting a call from anyone (including God), I am simply putting myself first. I sense this dynamic is part of a pattern in all of us and why it repeats itself with all the Major Prophets. "Accepting" a call is to put myself aside for a little bit and sincerely respond. Not easy to do... all the time.




St. Teresa's Halloween Open House is next Sunday, October 23!

Holiday Greenery Order Forms!




It's hard to believe it, but it's time to start thinking about the holidays.

Dear Members of St. Teresa of Avila Parish,

First and foremost, we want to thank you for your generosity that keeps our Parish in sound financial health. All of the members of the Finance Council take seriously the responsibility that has been entrusted to us. Given our diverse backgrounds in finance, accounting, and business, we serve as an important resource to Fr. Frank and the Parish.

The Finance Council is pleased to provide you with a financial summary for our 2011 Fiscal Year (7/1/2010 – 6/30/2011). Our Parish is in good financial health, ending the year with an **operating surplus of \$70,401**. This is the second year in a row that the Parish has ended a fiscal year in a positive position, highlighting the strength of your giving and our continued focus on cost management. St. Teresa of Avila Parish is one of only 20% in the Archdiocese that operates with a balanced budget. Below are several key highlights:

- Total operating revenue was \$781,000 and total operating expenses were \$711,000, resulting in net revenues of \$70,401.
- The Time of Your Life was again a significant success because of all who organized and contributed to the event. **TOYL netted \$170,000 this year**. This annual event and weekly collections of approximately \$525,000 provided the Parish the needed financial resources to support operations.
- Even after retaining an appropriate amount to deal with unexpected needs, the Parish was able to make several needed repairs.
- The Parish paid in full all assessments and contributions to the Archdiocese and the Priest Retirement Fund for FY2011.
- This spring, the Archdiocese conducted a thorough review of our Parish's finances and internal controls. The **audit showed that our internal controls are strong**. We adopted several recommendations, including purchasing a new safe for weekly collections and adopting a monthly financial report packet that represents how a business or not-for-profit reports its results.
- Notably, the **Parish has no debt outstanding**. Because of many parishioners' contributions, we were able to completely retire a \$57,000 capital loan.

In addition to the financial performance of the Parish, we have much to celebrate this year:

- We had **56 baptisms, 25 first communions, 6 funerals, 4 RCIA candidates and 9 marriages**.
- **104 of our children** participated in religious education classes.
- The Parish continues to thrive with **966 registered families** (1888 individuals).
- 250 families (400 individuals) participate at St. Teresa, but are not registered. On average, Sunday mass attendance is approximately 600 people.
- Our **Food Pantry** program added an additional distribution day each month that began this past spring. This calendar year, **our Parish will distribute approximately 3800 bags of food** to those in need. An additional 195 new clients have signed up for the program. This year, our Parish will fund 36 distributions.
- We served an average of 80 people per week through our **Loaves & Fishes Dinners**.
- Importantly, more of our parishioners are getting involved in activities away from Sunday mass, such as our spirituality and social justice groups. In short, we have a healthy and vibrant faith community.

The Finance Council strives to operate under a balanced budget while still providing the services and programs that keep our faith community thriving. The 2012 budget calls for a 5.3% increase in operating expenses, driven by adding personnel hours, increasing the output for our Social Outreach programs, and an increase in our Parish assessments. We have budgeted for average weekly collections and Time of Your Life proceeds on par with FY2011 to achieve a balanced budget. Both the full FY2011 annual report and our 2012 budget are available on the Parish website.

The next facet of our development as a community involves the strategy around our facilities. The long-term facility committee, working in conjunction with Fr. Frank and staff, has developed a three-phase approach to meet the Parish's needs as we continue to grow. Obviously, this entails soliciting your feedback, and we hope that you will actively participate in the discussion.

Once again, we would like to thank you for your generosity and continued support of this wonderful faith community.
