I am not arrogant enough to propose solutions, but I know I must work for others to have a better life in any way I can, or my gratitude becomes meaningless. If I close the door on my Christianity and my humanity, I become trapped in complacency. Then I am very poor indeed.

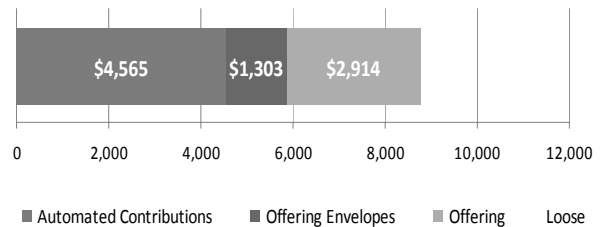

## Today's Readings

## The Presence of the Holy Spirit



We have a unique episode in the Acts of the Apostles today. A whole roomful of people are baptized with the Holy Spirit before they are baptized with water! The verb used—“the Holy Spirit ‘fell’ on them” (Acts 10:44)—is characteristic of the way the Spirit works throughout the book of Acts: powerful and surprising. Though this “baptism” is not the normative way the New Testament describes baptism, it is still a good reminder today that the Holy Spirit is not controlled by whether or not we pour water, but rather that our sacramental signs reveal the presence of the Spirit at work among us. And we have a double reinforcement of how this work is accomplished from a Letter and a Gospel bearing John’s name. It is love, self-sacrificing and self-giving love, that manifests the Spirit of Jesus in our midst. It is love that is the greatest of commandments. The Spirit is manifested equally through those who live in that love. – Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

## Treasures from Our Tradition

Just as the origins of Lent have to do with accompanying people in the final stages of preparation for baptism at Eastertime, so does the structure of the Easter season help the newly received Catholics take root in the community. This is the season of “mystagogy,” which means “reflection on the mysteries.” This means that new Catholics are remembering the sacraments by which they become one with us, and are sorting out the implications for their everyday life. They can understand the excitement of Cornelius and his family in the first reading, filled with the Holy Spirit, and so eager to begin their new life that they overwhelm St. Peter. The second reading and the Gospel today likewise help our new brothers and sisters explore their new life as an experience of God’s tender love.

Long ago, our tradition named these newly baptized adults and children the “neophytes,” from Greek words meaning “newly planted.” Newly planted in the garden of faith, they look to us to provide the fertile soil in which their new life can take root and grow. ## La Presencia Del Espíritu Santo



Hoy tenemos un episodio único en los Hechos de los Apóstoles. ¡Un grupo de personas que llena una habitación es bautizado con el Espíritu Santo antes de que se bautizaran con agua! La palabra que se usa para describir el suceso: “el Espíritu Santo descendió sobre ellos” (Hechos 10:44), es característica de la forma en que el Espíritu obra en todo el libro de los Hechos: de manera poderosa y sorprendente. Aunque este “bautismo” no es la norma para describir el bautismo en el Nuevo Testamento, es sin embargo un buen recordatorio de que el Espíritu Santo no está controlado por si hemos vertido el agua o no, sino que nuestros signos sacramentales revelan al Espíritu presente y obrando entre nosotros. Y tenemos un doble refuerzo de cómo esta obra se lleva a cabo en la carta y el Evangelio que llevan el nombre de Juan. Es el amor, el auto sacrificio y el amor de entrega, que manifiestan al Espíritu de Jesús entre nosotros. El amor es el más grande de los mandamientos. 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## Tradiciones de Nuestra Fe

El día 15 de mayo los campesinos de Ichocán, Perú adornan sus yugos, y las puertas de sus casas con el fruto de sus cosechas en honor a San Isidro Labrador. Muchos países Latinoamericanos celebran esta fiesta. En un continente donde la agricultura es tan importante no hay que sorprenderse de la importancia de este santo español del siglo XII. Además San Isidro se parece a mucha gente de Latinoamérica: es de padres campesinos, de familia pobre y religiosa, no fue a la escuela, quedó huérfano y se empleó como peón de campo, ayudando en la agricultura.

Se casó con María la cual también llegó a ser Santa. Tuvieron un hijo. Los tres fueron reconocidos como piadosos y generosos. Gracias a Dios, la santidad se encuentra en todo tipo de persona. Los casados y padres y madres de familia también llegan a ser santos. Después de su muerte en 1130 se descubrió que su cuerpo estaba milagrosamente incorrupto. En 1622 el Papa canonizó a este humilde campesino junto con algunos grandes religiosos como Santa Teresa, San Ignacio, y San Francisco Javier. – Fray Gilberto

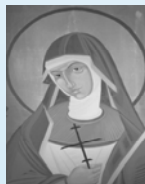

## Acceptance:

### The way to serenity and peace of mind

One of the more perplexing religious/ethical questions is, "Why do bad things happen to good people?" Most of the faithful have asked this question. Scripture scholars will have us turn to the book of Job in attempt to find an answer. But in the end, the bible really does not give us an answer. In Job's case, he was a righteous man that suffered terribly. Job's only answer to the question of "why" his suffering, was to have faith and trust in God.

One strain of the philosophy of religion makes the case that man has actually created the concept of God and religion out of fear. Namely, that man cannot control most, if not all, of the variables in his life. And this fact of being out of control scares the living day lights out of man and as a response to buffer himself from this fear man has created a God that protects him, a God that he can go to in times of trouble.

At one of our recent gatherings, our Men's Spirituality group took on the concept of "Acceptance." We read through a little pamphlet titled "Acceptance: The way to serenity and peace of mind." A wide range of responses were shared regarding how each of us deals with troubling news or challenging events in our lives.

For men, if we can't manage it, control it or get a handle on it... well, the challenging it becomes very difficult personally and mentally. I mean, we are supposed to be charge here aren't we? And to hear "you just have to let it go," or "you just need to take a positive attitude toward it," does not help. What helps is the gift of faith from God. What helps more is the gift of faith from God in the context of a community of believers. For sometimes, actually most of the times, we cannot do it alone.

We have been told a thousand times that God loves us. We want to believe that — but we know how it feels when someone loves us, and God’s love doesn’t feel that way.

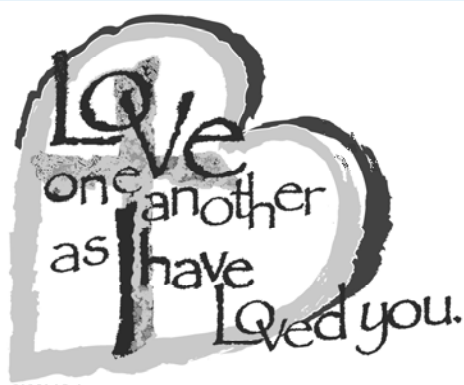
Elizabeth Barrett Browning wrote a poem that began: “How do I love thee? Let me count the ways.”

Let’s count at least some of the ways that God loves you.

I suppose God could have loved you by creating you to live directly in his presence, skipping the earthly experience. But what kind of love would that have been, without the ups and downs, gives and takes of love; the sensuality of physical love; the risk of unrequited love; the uncertainty and surprise of love?

God made that mistake in his first human creation. God doesn’t want to make that mistake again. God thought Adam would be perfectly happy loving and being loved by God directly. But no, Adam wanted to taste the apple, have sex, travel outside paradise, see the world, try different ways of relating, stretch the limits of love.

God understood, and so God worked up to you. Starting from scratch. God squeezed primal matter into a ball until it exploded into galaxies. God enjoyed the display, then followed developments closely. God loved the simple rocks, cherished the weeds, warmed up to caribou, thought humanoids were actually lovable. But God said: “It is good to love, but better

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to be loved.”

So, God created human creatures. But not from nothing, as if God’s prior creations meant nothing. No, humans were the apex of all created things, the perfection of evolution, the crowning glory of God’s handiwork. Humans incorporate the sturdiness of rocks, the flexibility of trees, the mobility of rabbits, the intelligence of apes. And God placed in the first human the capacity for friendship, the ability to care for another.

But forced love is no love; love must be freely given, so God carved into this creature the freedom not to love. It was a great risk. And God paid dearly for it. Humans used their freedom not to love in multiple ways: hatred, abortion,

crime, adultery, murder, war, theft, genocide. The total depravity of the human heart is still unknown.

There was no way to know how it would all end. Some people would surely love God back, but what of humankind as a whole? Would it end in disaster? Would God’s offer of love be rejected wholesale? Human freedom allowed for that horrible possibility.

But what could God do? All God could think of was to ask his Son to be incarnated, mortalized as a human being. Jesus could have the experience of human loving and being loved; he could choose to love or not.

Jesus chose to love his Father with all his being, and his neighbor as himself.

That is how God loves you. As your Father and as your neighbor. As a fellow human, Jesus loves you, his neighbor, as he loves himself. He wants you to have the necessities of life, he wants you to be successful and happy, he wants you free of suffering and sin, he wants you to be personally fulfilled, he wants you to love his Father the way he does. But most of all, he wants you to be his friend.

We are humbled, exalted, amazed when someone shines their love on us to declare us lovable, to enable us to accept our self and be invited to love them in return.

And what if the One who loves us like that is God himself?
