I am inviting all parishioners to express your thanks to him for his 16 years of service to the parish.

Not only has Deacon Hector “pastored” the 10:30 am Mass, he has organized countless dinners for all parishioners; he has celebrated baptisms after the noon Mass; he has decorated the church for the various liturgical seasons and feasts; he has visited the sick at homes and in the hospital. 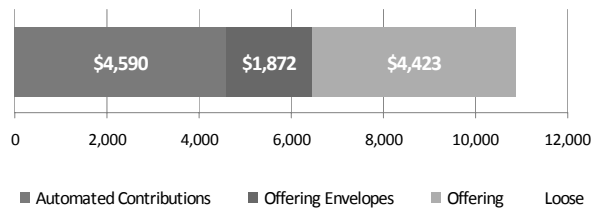

Weekly Sunday Collections (Budget of \$12,000)

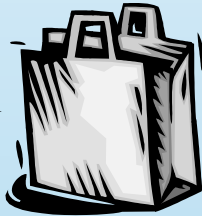

St. Teresa of Avila Preserving Our Heritage...

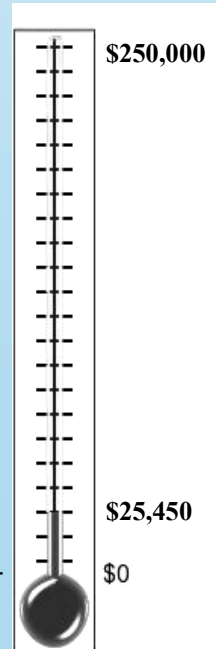
Thanks to your generosity, St. Teresa's *Preserving Our Heritage...* collection is up and running!

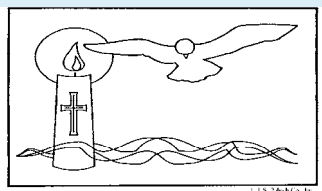

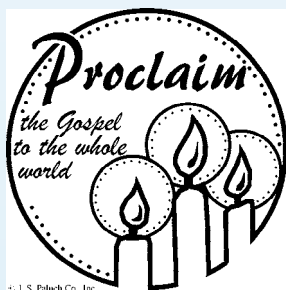

The Significance of the Ascension



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The theological unity, or perhaps even the temporal experience of the early community, made it seem that Jesus' resurrection and his ascension were inseparable aspects of a single mystery. Only in the later writings of Luke and John has further theological reflection helped the Christian community to distinguish different dimensions of the mystery. Liturgical tradi-

tion has followed the forty-day chronology formulated by Luke. We would miss the point, however, if we were to demand a precise historical chronology of events such as the Resurrection-Ascension that are primarily spiritual in nature and that clearly surpass the bounds of time and space as we know them.

What is important for us to grasp is the significance of the Ascension. For Luke, it is the decisive turning point that marks the end of Jesus' earthly ministry and the beginning of the disciples' Spirit-led ministry and thus the ministry of the whole church down to our own day. — Copyright © J. Treasures from Our Tradition

Today's celebration varies from place to place. In some parts of the United States, people gather for the Seventh Sunday of Easter, while other places celebrate the Ascension of the Lord. Several years ago, regions of bishops were permitted to decide whether to retain Ascension Day on Thursday, the fortieth day after Easter, or to move the celebration to the nearest Sunday. This new flexibility in the Christian calendar has to do with the desire to gather the Church to celebrate its central feasts fully, and with the Eucharist. Increasingly, as priests serve remote and scattered parishes, this is not always possible mid-week.

The Ascension is a key moment for grasping what life in Christ is all about. It is not about a departure, but rather a plan for presence. We who are nourished by the Lord's body and blood in the Eucharist are transformed to be his abiding presence in the world. That is a truth so worth celebrating that we can adjust our calendar in order that the fullest possible gathering of the Church can be achieved. — James Field, Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

El Significado de la Ascensión



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La unión teológica, o tal vez la experiencia temporal de la primera comunidad cristiana, hizo parecer que la Resurrección y Ascensión de Jesús eran aspectos inseparables de un único misterio. Solo en los últimos escritos de Lucas y Juan la reflexión teológica que iba madurando ayudó a la comunidad cristiana distinguir las diferentes dimensiones del misterio. La tradición litúrgica ha seguido la cronología de cuarenta días formulada por Lucas. No comprenderíamos lo esencial, sin embargo, si exigiéramos una cronología precisa de acontecimientos históricos como la Resurrección y la Ascensión que son principalmente de naturaleza espiritual y que superan claramente los límites del tiempo y el espacio tal como los conocemos.

Lo que es importante es que comprendamos el significado de la Ascensión. Para Lucas, es el momento decisivo que marca el final del ministerio terrenal de Jesús y el comienzo del ministerio guiado por el Espíritu de los discípulos, y por lo tanto el ministerio de toda la Iglesia hasta nuestros días. – Copyright © J. 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Tradiciones de Nuestra Fe

En 1563 el Concilio de Trento estableció que todos los Católicos debían recibir la comunión por lo menos una vez al año, de preferencia, durante la época de Pascua, los 50 días desde la Pascua Florida a la Pascua de Pentecostés. En Chile los sacerdotes en siglos pasados llevaban la Eucaristía a todos aquellos que no pudieron asistir a Misa en la Pascua Florida. Comenzando con el segundo domingo de Pascua y acompañados de huasos (vaqueros) quienes los protegían de bandidos llevando el Sacramento en cálices de plata por toda la región. Esto llegó a llamarse Cuasimodo, en base a la frase inicial de la Misa del segundo domingo pascual: Quasi modo geniti infantes (Casi como recién nacidos).

Hoy día la fiesta también es conocida como “correr a Cristo,” por el hecho de llevar a Cristo en carretas decoradas por las calles de los pueblitos mientras los niños corren por delante gritando “¡Viva Cristo Rey!” De esta manera los niños anuncian la venida de Cristo, algo que todo cristiano debería hacer con hechos y palabras todos los días de año. – Fray Gilberto Cavazos-Glz, OFM,

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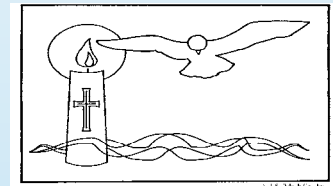

Thank You for Giving Me Another Day

It was somewhat of an unusual Mother's Day last week. Catherine, my wife, and I attended a wake on the evening of Mother's Day. The man who passed I had known for over twenty-five years; he was the father of four children (three boys and one girl), all of whom I got to know when I was working with a far Southside Catholic parish. The boys were doing well. The girl, Angelique, was struggling from a recent treatment of chemotherapy.

When I first saw Angelique I could hardly recognize her— no hair, a bit swollen due to a steroid treatment. I remembered her as a striking young woman filled with ambition and dreams and tons-of-fun life. Breast cancer has now spread to her bones and brain.

When we first sat down to visit, we tried to figure out that last time we saw each other. The date was nebulous. We talked about fun times on the South side and she reminded me of a few funny stories about me that I could not totally recall but I am sure are true.

At some point, I asked her about her journey during the past two years. She was honest and forthcoming with all the details. At one point she looked at me and said, "Tom, this is the path God has chosen for me. I don't understand it, but I know it is for a reason. I have met several children with leukemia and I am so glad that it is me and not one of my children. Every night before I go to bed I say to the Lord, 'Thank you for giving me another day.' And everyday when I wake up I say, 'Thank you for letting me make it through another night.'"

There's a lot of stuff to get worked up about in the Church; there are a lot of people that can rub you the wrong way. I try not to attach myself to that stuff. I try, rather, to gravitate to the awesome witness of faith that Angelique shared with me on Mother's Day. Angelique's faith is our faith, the faith of the Church. What a wonderful and all-inspiring gift.

Your support will enable them to continue their mission of caring for the elderly in a spirit of joy and dignity. Any assistance you are able to give will be greatly appreciated.

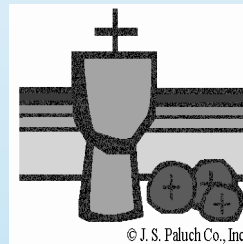
