FY12 Year-end Financial Update

Dear Members of St. Teresa of Avila Parish,

First and foremost, we want to thank you for your generosity that keeps our Parish in sound financial health. All of the members of the Finance Council take seriously the responsibility that has been entrusted to us. Given our diverse backgrounds in finance, accounting, and business, we serve as an important resource to Fr. Frank and the Parish.

The Finance Council is pleased to provide you with a financial summary for our 2012 Fiscal Year (7/1/2011 – 6/30/2012). Our Parish is in good financial health, ending the year with an **operating surplus of \$28,806**. This is the third year in a row that the Parish has ended a fiscal year in a positive position, highlighting the strength of your giving and our continued focus on cost management. St. Teresa of Avila Parish is one of only 20% in the Archdiocese that operates with a balanced budget. Below are several key highlights:

- Total operating revenue was \$840,536 and total operating expenses were \$811,730, resulting in net revenues of \$28,806.
- The Time of Your Life was again a significant success because of all who organized and contributed to the event. **TOYL netted \$165,000 last year**. This annual event and weekly collections of approximately \$512,000 provided the Parish the needed financial resources to support operations.
- Even after retaining an appropriate amount to deal with unexpected needs, the Parish was able to make **\$157,740** in capital improvements. Through the generosity of many Parishioners to the special Preserving Our Heritage collection for Rectory, we were able to begin many key improvements, including replacing the broken boiler and purchase new windows. We hope to complete all deferred maintenance repairs and improvements in FY13 by collecting **an additional \$80,000** to finish gutter and fascia work and installing a new electrical and cooling system. If you have not made a pledge, we hope that you can do so as soon as possible to help us meet this very attainable goal.
- Notably, the **Parish has no debt outstanding**.

In addition to the financial performance of the Parish, we have much to celebrate this year:

- We had **47 baptisms, 23 first communions, 4 funerals, 4 RCIA candidates** and **7 marriages**.
- **142 of our children** participated in religious education classes. This is a major increase from FY11. We are grateful to Kate Lynch and the many volunteers that have made this effort a success.
- The Parish continues to thrive with **937 registered families** (1563 individuals).
- Our **Food Pantry** program **distributed approximately 3,800 bags of food** to those in need. This ministry continues to grow and add new distributions and clients.
- We served an average of 80 people per week through our **Loaves & Fishes Dinners**.
- Our Parish has a commitment to Stewardship – 3% of our operating income is shared with other missions. In FY12, we helped build a church in St. Rose de Lima Parish in Haiti. Fr. Frank will continue to support efforts in Haiti through his Camino de Santiago walk to build wells to provide clean and accessible water.
- Importantly, more of our parishioners are getting involved in activities away from Sunday mass, such as our spirituality and social justice groups. In short, we have a healthy and vibrant faith community.

The Finance Council strives to operate under a balanced budget while still providing the services and programs that keep our faith community thriving. The 2013 budget calls for a 14% increase in operating expenses, driven by adding personnel hours, increasing the output for our Social Outreach programs, and an increase in our Parish assessments. We have budgeted for average weekly collections and Time of Your Life proceeds on par with FY2012 to achieve a balanced budget. Both the full FY2012 annual report and our 2013 budget are available on the Parish website.

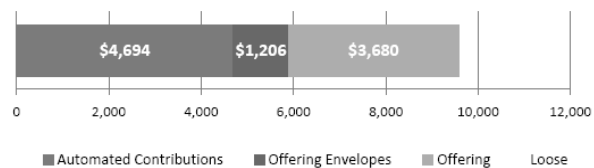

Weekly Sunday Collections (Budget of \$12,000)



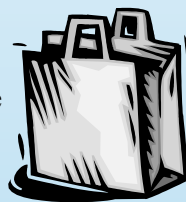

You may notice that we no longer have yellow envelopes in the pews. After many discussions between the staff, finance council, and Fr. Frank, we have decided unanimously to stop using them.

After our last audit with the Archdiocese, we were told that we needed to implement a new system for making sure that all of your donations were tracked and audited. We have always carefully tracked your donations, but took this as a chance to improve upon the system in place.

As a result, we determined that it would be impossible to track cash donations in yellow envelopes because they are a mix of registered parishioners, visitors, and unregistered parishioners. In order to track yellow envelope cash donations, we would have to input every family, new and old, into our database whether they are registered or not. This was creating a false sense of how many parishioners we have giving since we were now entering visitors and friends as well. In the end, for the fiscal responsibility to our parish and parishioners, we determined the elimination of yellow envelopes to be the best course of action.

If you are a cash giver and forget your envelope, please email Dean in the office with the amount of cash you donated and what weekend. He will add it to your account.

Please note this only affects those who give cash in the yellow envelope and expect it to be counted in their donation records. ALL checks are always entered into our system whether they are in an envelope or not.

Treasures from Our Tradition

Did you ever notice how often the angels are referred to during Mass? We commonly meet them in the Confiteor (“I ask blessed Mary, every virgin, all the angels and saints”), prefaces (“with angels and archangels and the whole company of heaven”), the Roman Canon (“we pray that your angel may take this sacrifice”), and Eucharistic Prayer IV (“countless hosts of angels stand before you to do your will”). Last week and this week angels abound as we celebrated Michael, Gabriel, and Raphael yesterday and will honor the Guardian Angels on October 2.

September 29 was originally the feast day for Michael alone. Gabriel and Raphael joined him in the 1969 reform of the Church calendar. The celebration of the Guardian Angels has been observed since the sixteenth century in Spain. Pope Clement X assigned the feast to the first free day after St. Michael's in 1670, and there it has remained. Take some time this week to reflect on these, God's messengers and our protectors, and maybe even celebrate with a little angel food cake! — James Field, Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

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Tradiciones de Nuestra Fe

En 1648 el franciscano, Matías Abad llegó a la selva chocoana en la costa pacífica de Colombia. Allí, a pesar de los ataques indígenas en contra de los misioneros, pudo celebrar la fiesta de san Francisco (4 de octubre). Al pasar de los años la devoción a San Francisco en Chocó se convirtió en una mezcla de la fe católica, las religiones africanas y la brujería. Este sincretismo es una forma de superstición que busca utilizar al santo en lugar de imitarlo.

Esta confianza en imágenes y estatuas es común y hasta peligrosa entre los latinoamericanos. Las hazañas de ciertas imágenes milagrosas llegan a proporciones exageradas. Por ejemplo, la imagen de “San Pachito”, como lo llaman los chocoanos, se le atribuye haber apagado un incendio que amenazaba la población. La pusieron delante de las llamas y las apagó con su propio sudor.

Hay que tener cuidado con la importancia de las imágenes sagradas de nuestras tradiciones. En un descuido pueden convertirse en ídolos o amuletos en lugar del recuerdo de la presencia divina y el desafío de vivir en santidad. — Fray Gilberto Cavazos-Glez, OFM, Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

Keeping Our Hearts Together Through Challenging Times

A graduate school professor of mine asserted that the main reason people had a warped attitude toward life was that their mothers lied to them as children. Sooner or later, he said, a child would scrap their knee and come running home to mom crying and sobbing and mom would pick up little Johnny and say, “Now, now, everything is going to be alright.”

Well, everything is not going to be alright. Bad things are going to happen to all people. Painful things. More painful than rifts with a family member or challenges with a spouse or serious questions about a career. As my Grandma use to say, “No one goes through this world unscathed.”

When a nasty strife comes, the kind of strife that really knocks us off our feet like the death of a child or a really bad divorce or a terminal illness, our world will be reoriented. Many times the reoriented world will be one of anger and pessimism. The reoriented world will be one of questioning God or blaming God. The reoriented world will not just be a divided heart but a Humpty-Dumpty heart shattered into pieces.

How can it be that some people in the midst of such strife become stronger in their faith and become a beacon of light for others? Martin Laird suggests in his book *Into A Silent Land* that such individuals come to recognize the strife as the entity that brings them face-to-face with God. They embrace the strife, walk into the strife, and allow the strife to be the vehicle that takes them into the Promised Land with their relationship with God. With a robust attitude, an attitude that knows in the heart that not everything is going to be alright, such individuals come to see all in life as a gift. And thus they become a gift to us.

Help Bring Clean Water to Haiti Sponsor Fr. Frank as He Walks the Camino de Santiago



In this country, we take so many things for granted. It is difficult for us to imagine living our lives without sufficient clean water. When we want water, all we have to do is turn on the faucet.

Imagine a poor country like Haiti where 40 percent of its 10 million people do not have access to a dependable supply of clean water, where the walk to the faucet is an average of 5 miles away, walking an average of 10 miles per day

for clean water.

Our goal is to raise \$20,000 for Haiti; this money will be used to build wells to provide clean and accessible water. If we raise more than our goal of \$20,000, that money will be used to provide healthcare for the people of Haiti.

All donations Fr. Frank raises through sponsorship of his pilgrimage will go to *Zanmi Lasanté* —Paris, a social justice agency who will have wells built in Haiti by Haitian labor and fund



other education and development in impoverished rural Haiti.
