

Fiscal Year (07/01 - 06/30) Comparison



- The collection for last weekend, September 14-15, 2013, was \$8,020.
- For the 2014 Fiscal Year, Sunday and Holy Day collections are down 14.4% from the 2013 Fiscal Year; versus expenses, we are have a \$63,602 deficit.
- For the 2014 fiscal year, the cost per family per week is \$36 as 430 families contribute to the Parish.
- Our goal is to fund all operations and expenses from the weekly collections, i.e. the goal is for the striped bars to exceed the black bars in the chart above.
- St. Teresa's annual fundraisers assist in meeting funding gaps. It is the Finance Council's and Fr. Frank's goal to increase weekly giving to meet our ongoing expenses, and use the proceeds from fundraisers to fund special initiatives and outreach programs of the Parish.



Priorities



In the first reading, the prophet Amos rages against all those whose greed is so great that they would close their eyes and hearts to the needs of the poor among them. To make a buck is one thing, Amos is saying. To make it on the backs of the helpless is quite another.

In the second reading, Paul reminds us of our charge and duty to pray. He issues a call to more expansive prayer—prayer that should mark the daily life of Christians.

In the Gospel, Jesus describes the wholehearted effort of a crafty servant who sees "downsizing" heading his way. Jesus finds him a marvel and puzzles over why such cleverness is limited to the world of commerce. Jesus wonders why those who seek a "position" in the reign of God lack such wit and wherewithal. —Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

Treasures from Our Tradition

When the Roman Empire turned a favorable eye toward the oncepersecuted Christians, among the effects was a population explosion in the baptismal font, as Christian sympathizers stepped from the shadows. With more and more people becoming Christians, laws were passed to protect Sunday as a work-free day. Soon, it became possible to celebrate Mass later in the morning, rather than the older custom of gathering before dawn to celebrate Eucharist. Amazingly, despite the increasing numbers of Christians, there was great resistance to adding to the number of worship events; the Eucharist that began as a few friends around a table soon was transformed into a more formal event with throngs crowding a large hall. All the Christians in a city or town would gather around the bishop for the one Sunday Eucharist, and only when the crowds became unmanageable was there an impulse to divide the assembly by splitting off a new bishop and flock.

Now, sixteen hundred years later, many parishes see a need to trim or combine Mass schedules. This is often seen as tough surgery. Yet our forebears in the faith would see it as a gain: a filling up of the Eucharist with a large and vigorous assembly, a fullness of ministry, an opportunity to make the Church more fully visible and stronger for service. -James Field, Copyright © J. Reflecting on God's Word

When Jacob Marley appears to Ebenezer Scrooge at the beginning of *A Christmas Carol*, he wears a long chain, clasped around his middle, "made of cashboxes, keys, padlocks, ledg-



ers, deeds, and heavy purses wrought in steel." He tells Scrooge that he wears the chain he forged in life, and now he wanders the earth because in life his spirit never went beyond "the narrow limits of our money-changing hole." Old Marley's life had been about money until it ended; now he pays the price. Luke calls on his community to consider its use of money. In today's parable a steward has been caught squandering his master's property. Seeing that his days are numbered, the steward acts quickly to ensure that he will have friends at the end. Surprisingly, the master commends him for "acting prudently." Jesus then comments that the children of this world have more gumption than the children of light, using their money to make friends.

Three other comments follow: Use money to make friends for eternity; trustworthiness in small matters and earthly wealth will lead to being trusted with true wealth, i.e. God's kingdom; and you have to choose between God and "mammon" (whatever holds your deepest trust other than God). In a nutshell, use your money to serve; allow God to save.

Jesus is in line with the prophet Amos, who castigates the businessmen of his day for cheating the poor and needy. God is on the side of these little ones. They are the ones we are to be friend by using our money for their good. Jesus, who came as a "ransom for all" (1 Timothy 2:4), is our true wealth.

Living God's Word

We pray for the wisdom to live justly, that is, in such a way that we keep ourselves in proper relationship with God, with each other, and with the earth. We pray for the wisdom to use our financial resources to help bring about such "just living."



Stop, pray and listen...

Years ago I had a beloved pet guinea pig named Gertrude. I took such good care of her, making sure she was fed properly and that her cage was cleaned and that she got plenty of exercise.

But one day she got sick and we took her to the vet who did everything to save her...even to the point of surgery! Yes, my pig had surgery! I prayed and prayed that she be saved, but she died, even after I asked God to keep her alive. After all, I did everything I could to take care of her. But God didn't seem to listen to my prayers.

This early childhood experience was my first encounter with the reality that life isn't always fair. We carry this attitude well into our adult years when we compare our lives with those around us, and in the comparison, we usually come up with the short end of the stick.

The family next door or across the street seems like they have it all; the friend who is less educated has a better job; the older sibling gets all the attention; some live to be over ninety years old and some die very young. The list can go on and on but the feeling that life isn't fair ties it all together.

The older brother in the parable was telling his father in no uncertain terms that the lavish treatment his wayward brother was getting just wasn't fair. Unlike his wayward brother, he was always at home doing what he was supposed to do; he was obedient to a fault; he didn't embarrass his father with

such reckless behavior. Why didn't he get a party with a fattened calve, music, dancing, sandals and a ring? It just wasn't fair.

At the heart of this parable is not the lavish feats for the prodigal son but the lavish love of a father —of GOD— was waiting for the son to return all along. He didn't even wait for the son to knock on the front door; he ran out to meet him and embraced him.

Jesus also wants us to love as lavishly as the father in the parable. Such lavish love is never fair because it can never be measured out or quantified. God is not fair in how he loves, and thank God for that! God's mercy *always* triumphs over judgment: judgment is rooted in the law, and must always be fair.

We believe in a God, revealed by Jesus, who loves lavishly without bounds. Even when the Chosen People sinned over and over and over and over again, creating golden idols, he kept forgiving them. Was that "fair" of God? He does no less for each and every one of us.

But the older son's heart was hardened by the "law" which compelled him to compare his life with that of his younger brother. The tragedy of the parable is the brother's hardened heart...a lesson for us all.

As soon as he heard the "sound of music" he began to turn in on himself. What he failed to realize was the party wasn't just for his returning brother...it was for him, also!!! Yes, if he truly loved with an open and generous heart, he would have run inside and started to join in the dancing and feasting because the return of his brother would have filled him with joy.

We *must* share in the good fortune of others because that is what love rooted in Christ compels us to do.

When you feel that life isn't fair, *stop*, *pray and listen* for the "sound of music"...God's voice and his spirit surrounding you with a cloak of joy...and God leading you inside for the Feast.
