Dear Members of St. Teresa of Avila Parish,

First and foremost, the Parish Finance Council wishes to thank you for your generosity that keeps our Parish a vibrant faith community. This past year, Parishioners gave and pledged more money than at any other point in the history of our Parish. This is certainly something for us to celebrate. Though our weekly Sunday collections were down about 6%, Parishioners have contributed significantly, including to our ongoing capital campaign and last spring's special capital appeal to complete repair work on the Parish Rectory.

The primary focus of the Finance Council this past year was on our operating income and expenses. This year, we had some unique challenges, including conducting a historic capital campaign (impacting weekly giving) and Fr. Frank's sabbatical. In contrast to the last several years with net positive results (collectively \$100K over the past 2 years), we finished FY13 with a \$55,000 operating deficit. Nearly all of this can be attributed to weekly collections being down versus the prior year.

I started this letter by celebrating the record year of Parish giving and then I mentioned that weekly giving was down for the year. The Finance Council has discussed the frustration that it seems we are constantly being asked to give. This can be particular frustrating to people that already give so much. To paraphrase St. Teresa, "if this is the way you treat your friends, no wonder you have so few of them." Indeed, I feel this same frustration myself, both monetarily and with the time I dedicate for Parish activities. I can further frustrate myself by thinking that I already give more than *my share*. However, I know that this is not the case for me and I need to continue to do what I can to maintain and support our Parish. We all share this responsibility.

For our FY14 budget, we took a more conservative approach and assumed that our weekly collections will be flat to FY12 levels. Our hope is that budgeting to FY12 levels will make the weekly burdens on Parishioners manageable, especially those that have already stretched financially to give to our capital campaign. However, this still translates into a 6% or about \$30,000 increase from this year. As we have done over the past year, we will continue to keep you apprised of our progress in the Weekly Bulletin and provide detailed monthly financial information on the Parish's website. And though we have a ways to go, our long-term goal continues to be targeting weekly giving to support all of our normal Parish operating expenses. This would allow us to use fundraising revenues for special needs and initiatives of the Parish.

Here are three things that we hope you will consider to help the Parish meet it operating needs this year:

- 1) Always remember our Parish in your prayers.
- Consider your weekly giving for ordinary operating expenses. If you have not increased in the past year, please consider a 10-20% increase depending on your personal and professional circumstances.
- Consider moving your weekly giving to automated. The Give Central website is easy to use and automated giving allows you to help maintain your home Parish, even when attending a mass elsewhere.

All of the members of the Finance Council take seriously the responsibility that has been entrusted to us. We are energized by your financial support for the Parish. Perhaps more importantly, we are energized by the unselfish time and talent that Parishioners give to our various ministries and missions (e.g., Haiti, Food Pantry, Loaves and Fishes, Parish Council, Liturgical, Catechesis of the Good Shepherd, Youth Ministries, etc.).

Once again, we would like to thank you for your generosity and continued support of this wonderful faith community.



- The collection for last weekend, September 28-29, 2013, was \$5,066.
- For the 2014 Fiscal Year, Sunday and Holy Day collections are down 14.4% from the 2013 Fiscal Year; versus expenses, we are have a \$63,602 deficit.
- For the 2014 fiscal year, the cost per family per week is \$36 as 430 families contribute to the Parish.
- Our goal is to fund all operations and expenses from the weekly collections, i.e. the goal is for the striped bars to exceed the black bars in the chart above.
- St. Teresa's annual fundraisers assist in meeting funding gaps. It is the Finance Council's and Fr. Frank's goal to increase weekly giving to meet our ongoing expenses, and use the proceeds from fundraisers to fund special initiatives and outreach programs of the Parish.



Increase Our Faith



Today's Gospel passage falls under the category that has come to be known as the "hard sayings" of Jesus. Hard to understand, hard to apply to life today. The Apostles' request, "increase our faith," is in response to a previ-Increase Our Faith ous "hard saying" about how frequently we are

called upon to forgive others. Curiously, Jesus seems rather unforgiving in responding to their request, or in describing the manner in which they are to serve others.

Jesus uses exaggerations to wake us up to how God is present in our lives, and how we are urged to live if God is with us. None of us is called upon to uproot trees or cast mountains into the sea. The faith we have is adequate for the task we are called upon to do: spread the gospel by our witness. And living that witness is done not for self-gratification or recognition, but out of the joy of helping the world to hear the Good News. - Copyright © J S Paluch Co

Traditions of Our Faith

Sometimes human relationships go awry, but Christ's choice for us is irrevocable. In marriage celebrations, the Church always recalls God's faithfulness to help prepare married couples for enduring the inevitable rough spots. The Byzantine liturgy does this by adorning the couple with crowns that remind them of the martyr's crown. The couple therefore takes on a vocation of witnessing to the sacredness of life in all of its suffering and joy, and of keeping their eyes fixed on the banquet of heaven

In Eastern theology, people have a liturgical vocation to give God praise, and marriage fits within that plan. It is not so much saying prayers that counts, but becoming prayer. Interestingly, in this liturgy the couple never utters a word other than joining in the community's chants; there are no marriage vows as such. There is therefore not a hint of our Western Christian sense that marriage is a legal contract. Rather, it is all about living out one's baptismal vocation, embracing the cross, pouring oneself out in love, and opening to the grace of the Holy Spirit.

Bridge-building Basics


On March 13, I was standing in the pouring rain with 250,000 people watching the white smoke billow out of the chimney atop the Sistine chapel. Being soaked with the rain coming from the heavens evoked a new beginning...a new Pentecost.

We begin our lives as followers of Christ by being immersed in the waters of re-birth and the rain coming down announcing the election of pope Francis signaled a new beginning. His first gesture was to ask for us to pray for him and his ministry, and in doing so, he extended a spiritual "bridge" to the people standing before him. The ancient name for the Pope, who is the successor of St. Peter, is "pontiff," which means, "bridge-builder." We have a Pope who is a true bridgebuilder, a reality that is igniting a new burst of the Spirit, ever so slowly moving the Church in a new direction.

In the first two weeks, he moved into a simple suite of rooms in the hotel in the Vatican; he washed the feet of men and women, including a Muslim; he simplified the vestments worn at the liturgy; he told the priests at the Chrism Mass on Holy Thursday to bring our ministry into the streets and start smelling like sheep; he went by himself into the crowds without escorts and a pope-mobile; and all this within the first two weeks of his papacy. He built many bridges with his people by his unassuming and humble gestures.

Yes, Pope Francis has taken the world by storm by acknowledging that he is first a foremost a sinner who doesn't have all the answers and prefers to speak of the Church as the People of God, an allinclusive term that all can understand because it embraces all. Francis clearly wants to build bridges with those who are alienated from church in any way, including the non-Christian and even the atheist. He has built a large bridge with those who doubt the reality of God's love saying the church wants to listen to their doubts and questions.

Pope Francis has built a strong bridge with those who are struggling in the



We are entering a new way of being "church," one open to dialogue and discussion, one that is not afraid of the many questions facing humanity; one that is able to live in the beauty and uncertainty of mystery; one that is forever building bridges, bridges that will lead us to create new paths and new directions.

church for welcome and an open ear. He says that God sees each one of us, not through any category but as a person, a human person created in His image and likeness. For decades the church has focused itself on the correct understanding of doctrine, speaking in definitive ways that suppressed any form of dialogue. Somehow, the very Person of Christ got lost in this crusade for orthodoxy. Christ is the head of the Church and it is He who forgives. Our moral teachings and response to them must first be rooted in Christ if they are to have any meaning whatsoever. The pope seems to be saying that we got the cart before the horse, constantly preaching about a select few doctrines that have become separated from the whole body of church teaching; this is a very dangerous place to be because the Spirit of Christ is lost in the pursuit of the correct way of believing.

We just heard the parable about Lazarus and the un-named rich man, perhaps he might be all of us. The rich man was *not* a bridge-builder but one who destroyed bridges; he isolated himself in his money and possessions. Lazarus was someone, or rather some "thing," to be walked over; he became a human stepping stone. Money and possessions are never the problem, but the extent that they isolate us from the rest of the world is a problem.

As I read the recent interview with Pope Francis that has caused so much commentary, I believe that Francis wants the church to re-focus its life, ministry and teachings on Christ. He wants the constant arguing between *left* and *right* to cease, and instead, focus on what unites us. Bridges need to be built *within* the Church so that we see ourselves as walking together in our love for Christ.

Pope Francis is clearly asking the Church to build bridges to the poor and alienated of the world. Our money and possessions are "things" that can help us to reach out to humanity. It is when we turn people into "things" that we destroy the bridge that leads us into the Kingdom. The rich man learned this so well as he became indifferent to the plight of Lazarus...he only cared about his comforts and wealth. No bridge could span the great "chasm" between the place of torment that the rich man placed himself in and the place of eternal comfort that Lazarus was carried into: one placed himself while the other "was carried," a huge difference.

The memory of that night on March 13 when Pope Francis walked onto that balcony and into the hearts of many is a memory I will cherish for the rest of my life. We are entering a new way of being "church," one open to dialogue and discussion, one that is not afraid of the many questions facing humanity; one that is able to live in the beauty and uncertainty of mystery; one that is forever building bridges, bridges that will lead us to create new paths and new directions.


