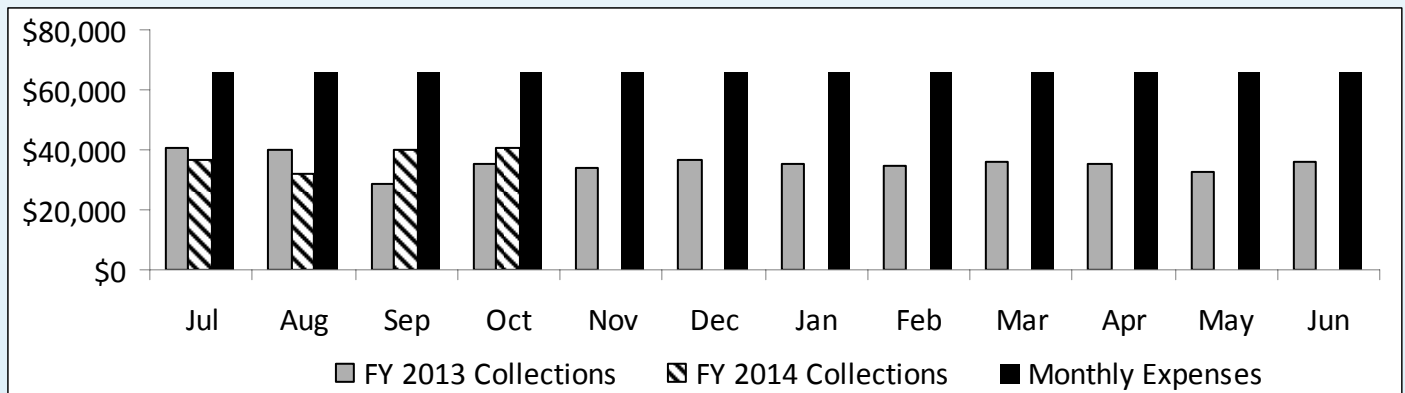

Fiscal Year (07/01 - 06/30) Comparison



- The offertory collection for last weekend, October 26-27, 2013, was \$4,754.
- For the 2014 Fiscal Year, Sunday and Holy Day collections are down 14.4% from the 2013 Fiscal Year; versus expenses, we have a \$63,602 deficit.
- For the 2014 fiscal year, the cost per family per week is \$36 as 430 families contribute to the Parish.
- Our goal is to fund all operations and expenses from the weekly collections, i.e. the goal is for the striped bars to exceed the black bars in the chart above.
- St. Teresa's annual fundraisers assist in meeting funding gaps. It is the Finance Council's and Fr. Frank's goal to increase weekly giving to meet our ongoing expenses, and use the proceeds from fundraisers to fund special initiatives and outreach programs of the Parish.

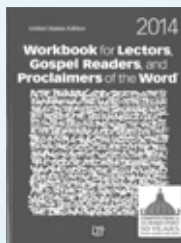

Reflecting on God's Word



Luke sketches his characters quickly but with precision, telling us all we need to know to appreciate the situation. Zacchaeus was chief tax collector, a wealthy man, and short. Most important, he was a seeker, trying to catch sight of Jesus.

Because of the crowd Jesus attracted as he was passing through town and because of his height, Zacchaeus had to climb a tree. His stature might not have been the only reason why. Tax collectors were nobody's favorite; they collaborated with the Roman occupiers and became rich to the detriment of their own people. Up a tree would have been the safest location for a tax collector in a crowd.

What makes this story so appealing is the joy that both Jesus and Zacchaeus show in meeting each other. "Come down quickly," Jesus says, "for today I must stay at your house" (Luke 19:50). Zacchaeus drops quickly and receives Jesus with joy. The crowd, however, does not share in this joy. They grumble about a prophet eating with a sinner! But Zacchaeus holds his ground, saying that if—notice the "if"—he has defrauded anyone, he will make amends four-fold, keeping to the strictest restitution demanded by the law. Jesus, not to be overdone in generosity, proclaims: "Today salvation has come to this house" (19:9), adding that this is why he came in the first place, "to seek and save what was lost" (19:10). Sometimes we can find ourselves "up a tree," even in our relationship with God. Remember Zacchaeus. Jesus brought him down safely and restored him to the community. This is why he still comes into our lives: to bring salvation to our own house.

Reflexionemos sobre la Palabra de Dios



Lucas hace bocetos rápidos de sus personajes, pero con precisión, para decirnos todo lo que necesitamos saber a fin de poder comprender la situación que nos presenta. Zaqueo era jefe de los recaudadores de impuestos, un hombre rico y bajo de estatura. Aún más

importante es que él buscaba ver a Jesús. Como Jesús atraía a tanta gente al pasar por el pueblo Zaqueo, debido a su estatura, tuvo que subirse a un árbol. Pero su estatura tal vez no fuera la única razón por la que tuvo que subir al árbol. Los recaudadores de impuestos no eran favoritos de nadie, pues colaboraban con los invasores romanos y se hacían ricos a costa del detrimento de su propia gente. Arriba de un árbol hubiera sido el lugar más seguro para un recaudador de impuestos en medio de una muchedumbre.

Lo que hace tan atractiva esta historia es la alegría tanto de Jesús como de Zaqueo al encontrarse. "Baja en seguida", le dice Jesús, "porque hoy tengo que hospedarme en tu casa" (Lucas 19:50). Zaqueo baja a toda prisa y recibe muy contento a Jesús. La gente, sin embargo, no comparte esa alegría. ¡Murmuraban porque un profeta fuera a comer con un pecador! Pero Zaqueo mantuvo su posición diciendo que si—notemos el "si"—había engañado a alguien le devolvería cuatro veces más. Así cumplía con las exigencias más estrictas de la ley respecto a la restitución. Jesús, sin escatimar nada en generosidad, proclama: "Hoy ha llegado la salvación a esta casa" (19:9) y añade que ha venido, "a salvar lo que estaba perdido" (19:10). Algunas veces podemos estar "subidos a un árbol" aun en nuestra relación con Dios. Acuérdate de Zaqueo. Jesús lo bajó con cuidado y lo restauró a la comunidad. Por eso es que Jesús todavía viene a nuestra vida: para traer la salvación a nuestra casa.

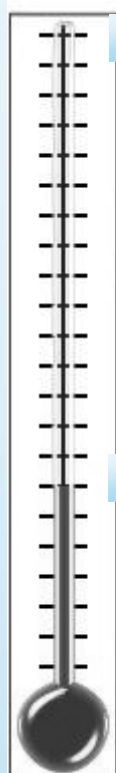

\$1,320,000 We have formally entered the collection phase of our campaign and have collected \$365,451 in pledges so far. There is a "thermometer" depicting pledges collected located in the church, which we will update in \$88,000 increments.

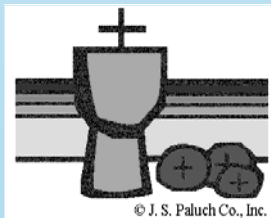

Who can be saved?

One of the most telling and significant encounters in the entire Gospel of Luke is the one where a rich man asks Jesus a troubling question. This query turns out to be a central one because its answer gets to the very heart of what Jesus calls the “one thing that remains” — the one thing that will make the difference between merely following the rules of the law and going all the way and trusting fully in God.

The question asked is this: “What should I do to inherit eternal life?” Jesus reminds the questioner what the commandments are, only to have the rich man say, “I’ve kept all these from my youth.” Jesus’ famous reply is a shocking one: “One thing remains for you to do: Sell everything you possess.”

This is so radical a response that the people hearing it in today’s Gospel reading, including his disciples, ask: “Then who can be saved?”

To answer their question, Luke tells a story about another rich man. A man named Zacchaeus. Only this time, the person is not a righteous follower of the law, but a man who is known by all to be a “sinner.” His sin is that he is the “chief tax collector,” a man who has gotten rich from colluding with the hated Romans and oppressing the Jewish people.

But unlike the first rich man, who asked the question about how one can gain eternal life, Zacchaeus is open to the possibility of a new life, a transformed life, a life of hospitality and generosity and “glorifying God.” Appearances can deceive us. Everything about the first rich man suggested the utmost piety. He’d followed all the commandments from the time he was a child. He was pious to the core. Yet he

lacked one thing: the willingness to change his heart; the longing to embrace a new way of living in total trust.

The Gospel tells us he “went away sad.”

At the same time, everything about Zacchaeus suggested corruption and wickedness. Yet he so wanted to see Jesus, he was so on fire to discover a new approach to life, that he almost made a fool out of himself by climbing a tree to get a glimpse of Jesus even though he was very short. And after he was able to see and to hear, he climbed down and enthusiastically welcomed Jesus into his home and into his heart. In fact, he was so changed by this experience that he promised to give away

half his wealth and make restitution to anyone he had cheated.

This same Gospel shows us a very different kind of rich man — one filled with joy.

This, Jesus tells us, is the answer to the question “Who can be saved?” Those who have a free and generous heart; those who do not allow themselves to become consumed by their possessions.

Jesus is not opposed to wealth or possessions. He is opposed to stinginess. He is opposed to people’s unwillingness to share with “the least of these.” He is opposed to the lack of hospitality and kindness that allows us eagerly to share all the blessings we’ve been given.

Jesus says to Zacchaeus, “Come down.” Perhaps that’s exactly what he’s saying to each of us: Come down. Come down from our arrogance, which tells us that what we possess we deserve to keep only for ourselves. Come down from the miserliness in us that wants to hoard our possessions, as though they alone will bring us happiness.

“Who can be saved?” Zacchaeus. The little man with the giant heart.
