





Fiscal Year (07/01 - 06/30) Comparison



- The offertory for last weekend, November 2-3, 2013 was \$13,939.
- For the 2014 Fiscal Year, Sunday and Holy Day collections are 4.1% over Fiscal Year 2013 collections; versus expenses, we are have a \$63,602 deficit.
- For the 2014 fiscal year, the cost per family per week is \$36 as 430 families contribute to the Parish.
- Our goal is to fund all operations and expenses from the weekly collections, i.e. the goal is for the striped bars to exceed the black bars in the chart above.
- St. Teresa's annual fundraisers assist in meeting funding gaps. It is the Finance Council's and Fr. Frank's goal to increase weekly giving to meet our ongoing expenses, and use the proceeds from fundraisers to fund special initiatives and outreach programs of the Parish.



2013 Catholic Campaign for Human Development November 23-24



The U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishop's collection for the Catholic Campaign for Human Development (CCHD) is slated for November 23-24, the weekend before Thanksgiving. The collection is taken up in parishes and dioceses nationwide. The theme of this year's collection is: "Defend Human Dignity. Take Poverty Off the Map."

This annual national collection is the primary source of funding for CCHD's anti-poverty grants and education programs. These programs enable low-income people to join together to identify problems, make decisions and improve their communities. For over 40 years, CCHD has funded organizations that address the root causes of poverty, providing lasting solutions for the future.

During the 2012-2013 grant cycle, the campaign gave out 214 grants in community and economic development, totaling more than \$9 million. Of these grants, 178 went to community development and 36 went to economic development and job creation projects. Additionally, 10 grants were given in the category of technical assistance.

"CCHD brings the Gospel message to issues of social justice. We cannot simply help a struggling family today and leave them with no means of support tomorrow," said the Most

Rev. Jaime Soto, Bishop of Sacramento, California and chairman of USCCB's Subcommittee on the Catholic Campaign for Human Development. "Instead, the projects funded by CCHD focus on long-term solutions to poverty. This complements the work of direct-assistance programs like Catholic Charities and pro-life activities."

Twenty-five percent of the proceeds from each CCHD collection stay in each diocese to fight poverty and foster liberty and justice at the local level. CCHD uses the national portion of the collection to fund projects across the country through grants. These grants fund community efforts to promote human dignity and fight poverty. Many of the funded projects focus on health care, immigration, community safety, political participation and environmental justice.


CCHD funded projects help people and communities in a number of ways. In the Archdiocese of Seattle and the Dioceses of Spokane and Yakima, for example, the Intercommunity Peace and Justice Center works with help from 16 religious communities and local "Women's Justice Circles." One program, "Justice for Women," organizes women living in poverty by bringing them together with economically stable women from local faith communities. With low-income women in the lead, the Circles identify the conditions that need changing and offer women spiritual strength and support.

Through CCHD-funded projects, the support of individuals and organizations across the country is helping to end poverty one community at a time. More information about the Catholic Campaign for Human Development is available at http://www.povertyusa.org/.

Reflecting on God's Word



We have many hungers in life, and sometimes we can overindulge in response to them. Still, one that never goes away is our hunger to be connected. We desperately shun living in isolation. For many it is marriage that feeds that hunger, but so do family or friendships or the simple

attention one finds in a community of faith or a collection of back yards. They all seem to feed our yearning for deep life, even when we are inattentive or preoccupied. A person of faith might even say that these communities are God being faithful to us.

This week's Gospel is one that turns the tables on us. It snares us in our own curiosity about what heaven will be like, and whether we will know the ones we love and be with our spouses, and what if we've been married seven times? And that's just where Jesus turns the tables and says it's about relationships and not about bodies to be with; it's about our deepest hungers to be united, even bevond marriage and friends and neighbors and communities of any sort. That's what resurrection is about, Jesus replies, and then reminds us one more time (as if we'd been deaf all the other times) that God has promised it and God is faithful. God "is not God of the dead, but of the living, for to him all are alive," is how Luke has Jesus saying it (Luke 20:38). In other words, all of our relationships of loving and caring, especially those of marriage, are but hints of real and full life, and the best is yet to come. So what you've found in marriage, even if you've been married seven times, is just the beginning.

Reflexionemos sobre la Palabra de Dios



Nosotros tenemos muchas hambres en nuestra vida y algunas veces nos consentimos demasiado tratando de saciarlas. Una de esas hambres que nunca desaparece es el hambre de relacionarnos. Nosotros rechazamos a toda costa vivir en asilamiento. Para muchas personas es el matrimonio lo

que sacia esa hambre; pero la familia, las amistades o aun la atención sencilla que uno encuentra dentro de una comunidad de fe o con los vecinos puede conseguir lo mismo. Todo eso parece satisfacer nuestro anhelo de una vida con significado, aun cuando estamos distraídos o preocupados. Una persona de fe pudiera llegar a decir que estas comunidades son una manera en que Dios nos muestra su fidelidad.

El Evangelio de esta semana reta nuestra percepción. Nos atrapa en nuestra propia curiosidad acerca de cómo es el cielo, si conoceremos allí a las personas que amamos y si estaremos junto a nuestros cónyuges. ¿Y qué, si estuvimos casados siete veces? Ahí es donde Jesús reta nuestras percepciones y dice que no se trata de relaciones ni de estar con los seres queridos, sino de que todas nuestras hambres queden saciadas aún más allá del matrimonio, las amistades, los vecinos y cualquier otra comunidad. De eso se trata la resurrección, dice Jesús, y entonces nos recuerda una vez más (como si hubiéramos estado sordos las veces anteriores), que Dios lo ha prometido y Dios es fiel a sus promesas. Dios "no es un Dios de muertos, sino de vivos, porque todos viven por él", así describe Lucas lo que dice Jesús (Lucas 20:38). En otras palabras, todas nuestras relaciones basadas en el amor y el cuidado, sobre todo el matrimonio, no son más que esbozos de una vida plena y verdadera. Lo mejor está por venir. Así es que lo que has encontrado en el matrimonio, aunque hayas estado casado siete veces, no es más que el comienzo.



Called Down from the Tree

Last weekend I was staying in a small town that I love to visit each October around Halloween; the highlight of the weekend is the huge Halloween parade. The problem is whenever I go to the parade I can't see due to the huge crowds lining the street, which means I spend the time struggling to see the various floats and musicians, largely missing it all.

The difficulty of being short...the "Zacchaeus" syndrome. But this year it was different. I ended up with a clear view of *everything*! What a difference a parade with a view makes.

I saw all the floats and bands and entertaining acts that passed me by with the children laughing and smiling stretching out their hands to catch the flying candy being tossed from the floats. It was wonderful and fun to see families together, with grandparents peppered throughout, smiling from "coast to coast."

But I noticed something else in my privileged position: all the darkened windows above the storefronts with no signs of people looking down at the festivities. These are apartments that are rented on a short-term basis to people who come and go, places not well kept or truly lived in.

In my spot along the parade route, I saw the event with new eyes, with the darkened and seemingly empty rooms above having a clear presence amidst the throng on the street below.

Like Zacchaeus, I was called down from straining to see the event to entering the scene in all of its shapes and colors. As Zacchaeus' eyes were opened, he saw the world with new eyes and it began when he "came

down" from the tree and entered the crowd; he joined the parade and became a part of its life. And then Jesus did the unthinkable: he invited himself in the home of Zacchaeus for dinner, an action that restored Zacchaeus to life with mercy over his sinful past.

Yes, wonderful things happen when we sit down and eat together. Zacchaeus responded by living out his conversion...his new way of seeing life: to sell half of his belongings and pay back extorted money four times over!!! In calling Zacchaeus down and having dinner with him in his own home caused the religious leaders to be scandalized. Jesus was trying to get these self-righteous leaders to "come down" from their perch of judgment

and "see" life and God and people in a whole new way. But there eyes were closed...

Jesus is calling us down from our own trees of security and comfort and isolation, to join the human race by entering the crowd, joining the parade, inviting unlikely people over for dinner or out to a restaurant.

My experience of the parade was a haunting one, not because of the frightful masks and costumes (vampires were big this year), but because of the darkened windows above; the unknown inhabitants were an invisible part of the parade...but they were there. I was hoping that they were in the crowd but had the feeling that most of them weren't.

Whatever the case, I saw the entire scene and not just what was going on at my own level. In a touch of irony, I was struggling to see any signs of life through these darkened windows. For a brief moment my own inner "mask" was removed and my experience along the parade route expanded.

At every Eucharist, Jesus invites us to a banquet, nourishing us with his very Presence, expanding our hearts with divine mercy... destroying all the chains that bind us. And we remove not only our own mask but the mask we have covered God's face with to see life in a whole new way.

Our response: to mend fences, give generously and be grateful.
