

Even if the Temple Falls

Today's Gospel from Luke, written after the destruction of Jerusalem by the Romans in 70 C.E., reads back into those terrible events the apocalyptic imagery of Daniel and Ezekiel, who wrote during times of great national distress. Their message was one of hope and reassurance that believers would survive because God is faithful. The overthrow of Jerusalem had an impact on the Jewish world at that time similar to the shock of 9-11 in our time. It shook all their assumptions about God, even as the attack in 2001 was unthinkable to many Americans.

Jesus is quoted here as saying the temple would be totally destroyed, a shocking prediction. The temple was regarded as a symbol of God's presence on earth, an unshakable foundation for the covenant. Yet, everyone knew that the temple had been destroyed once before at the time of the Babylonian exile. There was no guarantee that an institutional expression of the covenant between God and his people would survive if they did not live up to its principles.

The temple Jesus pointed to was magnificent, but was also a source of controversy because it had been built by Herod, a nonbeliever currying favor with the Jewish establishment. It was also a symbol of the complicity between the high priests and the Romans, who shared revenues from its animal sacrifice and money-changing, making it a virtual marketplace.

Jesus did not hesitate to attack it verbally and even physically when he saw its one purpose — to be a house of prayer — being violated by other agendas and abuses, nor did he hesitate to predict the institution's downfall if real conversion did not take place.

The theme of loss and letting go is part of our ongoing liturgical conversion. Crisis is never welcome, but when it happens, it often purifies and unburdens us so we can start over. It also reminds us of what is essential and what is not.

We are coming to the end of one church year and about to enter another with Advent. It is a good time to take stock and to let go. We also commemorate our beloved dead in the feasts of All Souls and All Saints, and we contemplate the end times, when heaven and earth will pass away and all our possessions and assumptions will be swept aside as we enter eternity.

Jesus tells his disciples not to be anxious about loss or suffering. Whatever they need to face any crisis will be provided, and he will be with them to guide their understanding and response.



The disappearing sun and colder days of autumn (for those in the northern hemisphere, at least) will take us into winter, the ancient harbinger of death. Yet there, when darkness seems about to overtake us, we will kindle the first candle of Advent.

How many times prophets of doom have predicted the end of the world, the collapse of the civilization as we know it. Change will surely come for many institutions, their impressive structures and claims of divine favor. All we know for sure from the mouth of Jesus is that the essence of what is good, most human and divine within us, will endure in fresh manifestations of the mystery of God in history through every ending and beginning. What Jesus revealed in himself about the future of humanity will endure in us, even if the temple falls.



2013 Catholic Campaign for Human Development November 23-24



The U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishop's collection for the Catholic Campaign for Human Development (CCHD) is slated for November 23-24, the weekend before Thanksgiving. The collection is taken up in parishes and dioceses nationwide. The theme of this year's collection is: "Defend Human Dignity. Take Poverty Off the Map."

This annual national collection is the primary source of funding for CCHD's anti-poverty grants and education programs. These programs enable low-income people to join together to identify problems, make decisions and improve their communities. For over 40 years, CCHD has funded organizations that address the root causes of poverty, providing lasting solutions for the future.

During the 2012-2013 grant cycle, the campaign gave out 214 grants in community and economic development, totaling more than \$9 million. Of these grants, 178 went to community development and 36 went to economic development and job creation projects. Additionally, 10 grants were given in the category of technical assistance.

"CCHD brings the Gospel message to issues of social justice. We cannot simply help a struggling family today and leave them with no means of support tomorrow," said the Most

Rev. Jaime Soto, Bishop of Sacramento, California and chairman of USCCB's Subcommittee on the Catholic Campaign for Human Development. "Instead, the projects funded by CCHD focus on long-term solutions to poverty. This complements the work of direct-assistance programs like Catholic Charities and pro-life activities."

Twenty-five percent of the proceeds from each CCHD collection stay in each diocese to fight poverty and foster liberty and justice at the local level. CCHD uses the national portion of the collection to fund projects across the country through grants. These grants fund community efforts to promote human dignity and fight poverty. Many of the funded projects focus on health care, immigration, community safety, political participation and environmental justice.

CCHD funded projects help people and communities in a number of ways. In the Archdiocese of Seattle and the Dioceses of Spokane and Yakima, for example, the Intercommunity Peace and Justice Center works with help from 16 religious communities and local "Women's Justice Circles." One program, "Justice for Women," organizes women living in poverty by bringing them together with economically stable women from local faith communities. With low-income women in the lead, the Circles identify the conditions that need changing and offer women spiritual strength and support.

Through CCHD-funded projects, the support of individuals and organizations across the country is helping to end poverty one community at a time. More information about the Catholic Campaign for Human Development is available at http://www.povertyusa.org/.



Reflecting on God's Word

Worlds do change. They come and they go. One day we

I pray that everyone will rejoice in the graces and hard work of so many of our fellow parishioners and make a meaningful gift that will lead us through a successful effort.





- Planning and preparing the Celebration (decorations, music, etc.)


