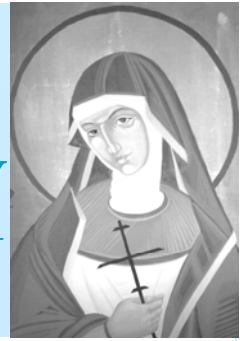

Be a Light in the Heart of Darkness

Sr. Helen Prejean has given her life to challenging the death penalty; her story was given expression in the movie, *Dead Man Walking*. She tells the man who brutally murdered two young people as he "walks" his final journey to the chamber of execution, that she wanted the last face he saw to be the face of Love. Sr. Helen was the "light, dispelling the darkness," just as Christ began his ministry in the region of Zebulun and Naphtali — a region which marks the division of Israel and the reality foreign domination—as a "great light on those dwelling in a land overshadowed by darkness...light has arisen."

Sr. Helen saw something in a convicted criminal which no one else could see: a child of God. The call of Christ at the Sea of Galilee is a call to see beneath the surface of the "sea of humanity," a Presence in each human being that remains hidden, sometimes in mystery and sometimes in sin.

Jesus calls them to use their skills, transferable ones, to "catch" people in the net of God's love. He "calls" them to see in life and humanity hidden potential and possibility. It is gospel irony that they, as fishermen, were trying to catch fish "hidden" beneath the surface waters, swimming by the thousands and now they were called to catch "fish" plainly visible to the human eye, but who had a hidden mystery that the human eye could not detect.

The eye of faith must see

through the Light who is Christ. Jesus wants the disciples that he calls...us...to be the face of Love that people see. Love sees in people what they most likely cannot see in themselves. But in order for us to be a face of Love, we have to "see" ourselves as beloved by God. To be the face of Love means that we, ourselves, must have encountered Christ deep in the heart of our spirit. We cannot give or reflect something we don't have. A painful truth.

When Jesus began his ministry, he went into the heart of darkness, the place of division, to be the Light of reconciliation and peace. Jesus certainly "rolled up his sleeves," and got his hands and feet dirty from the get go. We are called

to do the same....to enter the heart of darkness, beginning with our own personal darkness. We have to face the darkness within, our own sin, addiction, fear, selfishness, so that the Light may free us to live as a child of the Light. Oh, how the waters of baptism, the Spirit, wants to burst out of our inner darkness!

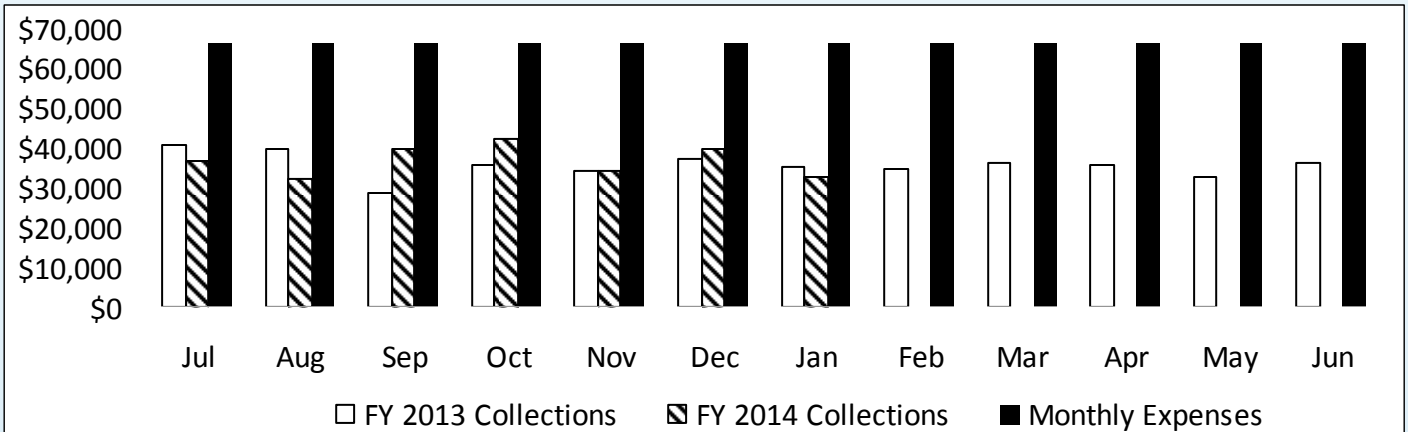
The Light shining in darkness must occur in the Church, the people of God, and how much the darkness of hidden and covered up sin and crime seems to permeate the visible structures of the institution of the Church.

Once again our Church is in the news in a most painful and shameful way. As I stand here and apologize, I know you are weary and disgusted by what has been revealed: the various correspondences and letters from Cardinals Cody, Bernardin and George that expose a hidden culture that tried to protect the image of the Church by sheltering predators.

Yes, the Light must shine in the darkness, as painful as it is, so that we can truly become the face of Love. The clerical culture of the institution must be more than reformed, it must give way to a new way of ministering and governing, one that includes clergy, women, men, both single and married, reflecting the beautiful diversity that *is* the Church of Jesus Christ.

We have much to learn from Sr. Helen: to be the face of Love means facing the darkness.

Fiscal Year (07/01 - 06/30) Comparison



- The offertory collection for January 25-26 was \$6,344.

Treasures from Our Tradition

By Candlemas, forty days after Christmas, February 2, the season of Christ's coming has depleted our candle supply. Soon, the parish will order a new paschal candle from a catalogue or candlemaker, or in some communities, wax will be collected to be melted and molded. Last year's paschal candle shows the wear and tear of summer heat, or many funerals or baptisms.

Paschal candles have been around since at least the fourth century, when Constantine's biographer Eusebius reported that the night of the sacred vigil was "transformed into the brilliancy of day, by lighting throughout the city pillars of wax, while burning lamps in every place so that the splendor of this night was brighter than the brightest daylight."

Light was a precious commodity in the ancient world, and this lavish use of precious beeswax was a sign of the Christian's call to bear Christ's light into the world's darkness. In a pre-electric age, a whole city aglow from the paschal flame must have been a glorious sight, and a reminder to every baptized Christian of our vocation to "be the light of the world."

El día 2 de febrero la Iglesia universal celebra la Presentación del Niño Jesús en el Templo. La costumbre judía dictaba que 40 días después del parto la madre debía ir al templo para ser purificada y junto con su marido ofrecer su hijito(a) a Dios. En la religión cristiana esta costumbre fue desarrollándose en la presentación de los niños en el templo, dejando en el olvido la purificación de la madre.

En Málaga, España, la presentación de los niños se hace el día 2 de febrero cuando todos los niños bautizados durante el último año se presentan en la congregación de la Divina Pastora. En muchas partes de Latinoamérica los niños se presentan a los tres años de edad. Aunque no es un rito oficial de la Iglesia, muchas familias hispanas continúan esta práctica religiosa, presentando su hijo(a) a la comunidad parroquial durante la Misa dominical. El rito es uno de agradecimiento y consagración a Dios. El sacerdote bendice al niño pero es la tarea de los padres educarlos en lo que significa ser consagrado a Dios.

Christmas Reprise

The Church's celebration three weeks ago of the Baptism of the Lord signaled the "official" end of the Christmas season. Today's feast of the Presentation of the Lord seems to extend the Incarnation celebration a bit longer. In fact, some have called this feast a "second Epiphany."

The first reading recalls the anticipation of Advent, as Malachi writes, "Lo, I am sending my messenger to prepare the way before me." The reading from Hebrews reminds

us of the Incarnation, proclaiming that Jesus had a "share" in our own "blood and flesh." The Gospel finds the infant Jesus on his first visit to Jerusalem and his human parents once again surprised and in awe over the events surround his birth.

In the simplicity of the manger, in the grandeur of the temple, in the domesticity of Nazareth, Jesus comes. May we come to know him and so be filled with "wisdom" and the "favor of God." — Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

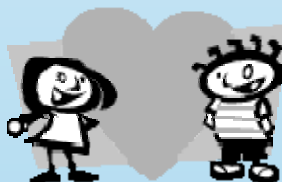

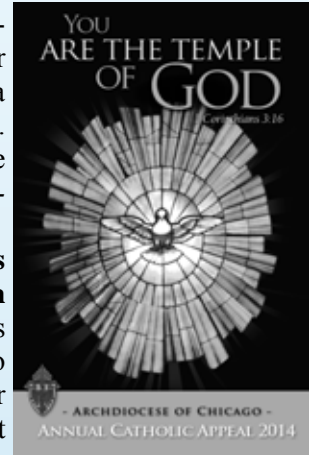

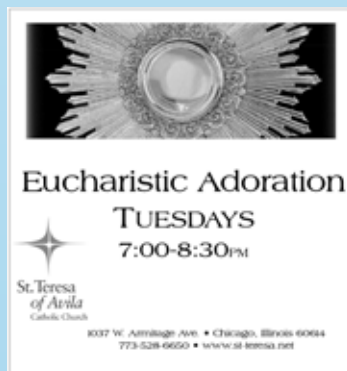
