# Where They Have Put Him

Christ is risen! Alleluia!

These are the victorious words we shout with gusto on this greatest of all feast days.

But, in order to fully appreciate them, we need to go way back in time to the people who first discovered this reality. We need to put ourselves inside their skin and see with their eyes.

All throughout his public ministry, Jesus had so impacted the lives of a group of people that they had become radically changed. These disciples of Jesus were the very same ones who had walked and talked with him, who were present when his many healings took place, who listened to him discourse about a God of mercy beyond their farthest imagining.

For these early followers of Jesus, life had taken on a whole new meaning. In him, they believed they had found the messiah the prophets had promised. They believed that things could finally be different: the hungry would be fed; the poor would be recognized; the sinful made whole.

Easter is initially the story, though, of how these same faith-filled people then became devastated to the point that their hope turned to despair, and their dream of a glorious future became a night-mare.

Jesus was crucified. He was executed in perhaps the most grue-some way that anyone could die at that time in human history.

The story of those hope-

filled people now became a very dark one. It became instead a story of betrayal and abandonment.

And then came the Gospel account we read today — an account that begins with words that reflect that gloom: "On the first day of the week, Mary of Magdala came to the tomb early in the morning, while it was still dark." In the Gospel of John, darkness implies a lack of faith. It tells us that at that time, Mary had no faith, no hope. She was in a place of numbness.

And then she finds the tomb is empty! She's startled. She's bewildered. She doesn't know what to do. And so she runs. She runs to get Simon Peter and the other disciple Jesus loved. And together they run—right into that very same empty tomb.

The Easter story now begins to unfold in an entirely new direction. The darkness gives way to the bright light brought on by a sense of victory. Little by little, the earliest followers of Jesus begin to realize that what truly happened is something never heard of before in all of human history: God has raised Jesus from the dead! He is alive! He is risen!

And the wondrous ending to the Easter story is what all four of the Gospels and St. Paul tell us repeatedly: Jesus is not only alive, but he is still here, still present, still among us. Only now he is with us in a whole new way.

That's what the really good news for each of us is: We are not alone. The Spirit Jesus promised us is alive in the scriptures we read; alive in the Eucharist we celebrate; alive in the hungry whom we feed; alive in the gathering of two or more in his name.

"They have taken the Lord from the tomb and we don't know where they have put him," Mary of Magdala sadly tells us in today's Gospel.

The ecstasy of this day is that we now know exactly "where they have put him": inside each one of us; in our hearts; in our values; in our prayers; in our reaching out to the "least of these."

That's why now we can truly sing together with full joy:

Christ is risen! Alleluia!

# **Finance Council Meeting Minutes**

March 17, 2014

# **Key Discussion:**

Erica provided the financials and the Council reviewed them. Administrative Expenses are being watched along with the line item Maintenance & Building Repairs.

The Capital Campaign, Building Faith Together has raised to date \$580,000. Discussion arose around the realistic goal for the entire project. Justin with his experience in capital construction has seen an average increase of 10% from initial estimates. A contingency of \$100,000 will ensure that the project will be completed efficiently and cover any unanticipated building issues that may arise. This will bring the amount of the project to \$1.4 million.

The Land Sale is under contract and anticipated to close in mid June. During the last Council meeting in February parishioners were able to bring up concerns to the committee regarding how the money would be used from the sale. At this March's meeting, it was agreed that of the anticipated return on the sale of \$2.9 million we have designated:

- \$100k for the contingency on the building renovation and that any costs over \$1.4 million will have to go to Finance Council for approval
- \$90k for repairs to Parish Center to be in compliance with the Protecting God's Children directive;
- \$110k for repairs on the roof, gutters, and air conditioning in the rectory;
- The remaining \$2.6 million will be designated for future capital endeavors.

The Council discussed the best ways to be transparent to the parish during the Land Sale and the church construction. It was decided that minutes of our monthly meetings would be posted in the bulletin and St. Teresa's website.

Fr. Frank talked about the costs associated with protecting the children of the parish. Particular capital improvements must be met and are expected to cost around \$90,000.

The next Council meeting will be May 19<sup>th</sup> at 7:00 pm. Please note there will not be an April meeting.





#### SPRED Needs More Volunteers

My name is Paul Jastrzebski and I got involved with SPRED just this past year. I'm a former DePaul student and regularly attend St. Vincent, but I live close to St. Teresa and figured I would branch out to a new church. I happened across SPRED by chance when I heard a catechist speaking about the group during mass. I have always had an interest in helping those with disabilities and from my personal background and experiences, SPRED felt like a perfect fit.

SPRED offers unique activities in weekly sessions. The catechists meet one week in order to prepare for the next week's community session with the friends. The procedure for preparing for a session is routine, but each session's goal is to communicate a different spiritual message.

Dedication, passion and a willingness to help others are common qualities shared by all of the catechists in the group, and we're always looking for new members who share these qualities. Even though each catechist comes from a different background, these mutual traits create a close knit and welcoming church family. The group of friends is part of that family, teenagers who are always eager to learn about the liturgy and actively participate in group activities.

Most of the friends are guys, which has al-



lowed me (as the only male catechist) to create special connections with them on a supportive and spiritual level.

Participating in SPRED is an extremely gratifying experience, especially concerning the

connections you can make with the friends. For me, nothing felt better than when the friends started remembering my name and treating me as a true friend. SPRED also provides the gratification of spreading God's message and learning more about yourself in the meantime.
