# **Our Family Circle**

All who believed were together and had all things in common; they would sell their property and possessions and divide them among all according to each one's need. (Acts 2:44-45)

True story: Long ago in a parish far, far away, a socially prominent Monsignor was invited to preside at the baptism of an equally prominent (wealthy) family. It was the Second Sunday of Easter, and he chose to preach on today's first reading.

Longer ago and farther away, my high school history teacher introduced me to some of the simpler writings of Karl Marx. What stuck with me was a particular slogan that Marx adapted from other idealists of the period.

Imagine my secret delight when Monsignor preached, "As it says elsewhere in scripture, 'From each according to his ability; to each according to his need.'" I admit I hugged myself and exchanged a wink with the one person in my choir who recognized that the saying was from the Gospel of Marx, not Mark.

As an idealistic teenager this seemed to me a wonderful way to organize the world. Several years later, I was sniffing around the Catholic church and reading a little New Testament a priest gave me, trying to decide if I wanted to take the plunge into the Christian life. I was playing Scripture Roulette—close your eyes, open the book, and let your finger fall on a passage. Today's first reading is where my finger landed and I was hooked.



How terrible would it be if we passed around the serving dishes to all but one or two members of the family, leaving their plates empty? And what if we did this night after night?

The problem with such idealism is not in the sentiment, but how to legislate against human greed and selfishness without creating a world that is as ugly and repressive as greed creates. We know about the abuses of forced sharing. It was not so easy in the early church either. In Chapter 5 of Acts we hear the story of Ananias and Sapphira, a couple who held back some of their assets and lied to the community about it. For that "sin against the Holy Spirit" they fell down dead. I soon discovered that the whole church does not live out this ideal, but a lot of people try. Women and men in religious orders and some dedicated lay communities of Christians do try. And the best of us share, giving 5 or 10 percent of our income to charitable efforts, offering our time and talent to assist others.

As I write, we have a pope who has been accused of being a socialist because he has suggested that having more than we need when others don't have enough to survive is not what a disciple of Jesus should do. Perhaps it's like this: We sit down to a family meal every night. How terrible would it be if we passed around the serving dishes to all but one or two members of the family, leaving their plates empty? And what if we did this night after night? Unthinkable!

I think Pope Francis, and Jesus, regard the world's peoples as a family. It's just as unthinkable to pass around food — and clean water, medical care, educational opportunities, and hope for the future — and routinely pass over some of the folks at the table. Unthinkable ... but we do it every day.

Like Thomas in today's Gospel, maybe we need to be shown that there is enough; that there is an *abundance* of what everyone in God's family needs to sustain and enjoy a life of comfort and opportunity. We can't fix the world, but we could add a few to our family circle and show ourselves that there is still enough for all of us.

# **Finance Council Meeting Minutes**

March 17, 2014

### **Key Discussion:**

Erica provided the financials and the Council reviewed them. Administrative Expenses are being watched along with the line item Maintenance & Building Repairs.

The Capital Campaign, Building Faith Together has raised to date \$580,000. Discussion arose around the realistic goal for the entire project. Justin with his experience in capital construction has seen an average increase of 10% from initial estimates. A contingency of \$100,000 will ensure that the project will be completed efficiently and cover any unanticipated building issues that may arise. This will bring the amount of the project to \$1.4 million.

The Land Sale is under contract and anticipated to close in mid June. During the last Council meeting in February parishioners were able to bring up concerns to the committee regarding how the money would be used from the sale. At this March's meeting, it was agreed that of the anticipated return on the sale of \$2.9 million we have designated:

- \$100k for the contingency on the building renovation and that any costs over \$1.4 million will have to go to Finance Council for approval
- \$90k for repairs to Parish Center to be in compliance with the Protecting God's Children directive;
- \$110k for repairs on the roof, gutters, and air conditioning in the rectory;
- The remaining \$2.6 million will be designated for future capital endeavors.

The Council discussed the best ways to be transparent to the parish during the Land Sale and the church construction. It was decided that minutes of our monthly meetings would be posted in the bulletin and St. Teresa's website.

Fr. Frank talked about the costs associated with protecting the children of the parish. Particular capital improvements must be met and are expected to cost around \$90,000.

The next Council meeting will be May 19<sup>th</sup> at 7:00 pm. Please note there will not be an April meeting.

#### **Treasures from Our Tradition**

One of the great Easter traditions is "mystagogy," an ancient word meaning "reflection on the mysteries." It is a style of catechesis, or passing on the faith. People who have shared an experience, in this case those who have been baptized at Easter, are urged to recall their experience, reflect on its meaning, and apply their insights to their new way of life.

There is an aspect of an experience that is simply not available until you've had it. For example, you may think you know weddings inside out; you've been to dozens, seen hundreds in the movies or on television, but until you've said "I do" to another, there is a certain knowledge unavailable to you. Those who go down into the waters of baptism as adults have similar experiences; they have all taken baths before, but not like this one! Mystagogy helps such persons to uncover the deep meaning of the experience, their sense of a

new beginning, of God's abundant love, of forgiveness, of community.

It takes time for the power of the Easter Vigil to work its wonders for us. Those who are newly baptized are called "neophytes," meaning "newly planted." The tender buds of spring need care and nurturing, and our new brothers and sisters need your prayer and your faithful example.




29th Annual Hunger Walk June 21, 2014 Soldier Field, Chicago

#### **SPRED Needs More Volunteers**

I recently became a Catechist with SPRED this past fall and was inspired from the get-go by the "friends" who are the catechism students and my now fellow "catechists" who volunteer their time. I had been trying to get more involved with the Parish and volunteering generally when I learned of the program. What hooked me was an announcement at mass during which Sally mentioned that many of the volunteers had been with the program for close to nine years. I realized that this program must be something very special if parishioners are sticking with it for so long.

At first, I was somewhat hesitant because I do not have any experience teaching or working with special needs children, but I learned that all I needed was a willingness to jump right in and join the group. I was further enticed to volunteer when I showed up for the first time and learned that a key part of the SPRED program was "agape" -- After catechist preparation sessions and sessions with our friends, we always share a meal and have a chance to talk about what is going on in our lives. I was wholeheartedly welcomed into the group as if I had been part of it for many years, along with everyone else.

I soon learned more about the SPRED structure and learned that the catechists meet one week

prior to the session with our friends. This way, we can prepare and share ideas about the themes of the upcoming gathering. Each week, I discover more about our friends and about their families and how much they appreciate having



the time wholly devoted to their faith formation. I had never considered that it is difficult for a child with special needs to sit still and pay attention to a traditional mass. I now know that SPRED gives our friends an opportunity to connect with their faith in a non-traditional setting that is better suited to their needs. Our friends are genuinely appreciative and we, the volunteers, are equally grateful for all they teach us.
