## Pay Attention

Today we hear Jesus telling us another parable. It's the one about the seed sown in different kinds of soil and what happens to it. The seed is the word of God: the four kinds of soil are four kinds of people. There are those who never accept the word; those who believe for a while but fall away because of persecution or hardship; those who believe, but in whom the word is choked by worldly anxiety and the lure of riches (that's most of us in developed countries, I'm afraid); and those who respond to the word and produce fruit abundantly.

It's a parable many of us have heard so often and know so well, that we cease to listen — a common temptation of longtime believers. We've been to church since childhood. We've heard the Gospels read every Sunday. So when we're busy — and when are we not busy? — the hour we have for Sunday worship finds us distracted by our to-do list or our worries or just plain tired. We fail to really attend to the message. We're the third kind of soil — distracted by opportunities.

Isn't it odd that Jesus speaks about distractions to this particular audience? First-century Palestine couldn't have boasted too many "worldly distractions," at least from the vantage point of the 21st century. What else did they have to do but grow their crops, care for their animals and children, eat, sleep and listen to Jesus? No television, computers, cell phones, iPods, cars, or shop-till-you-drop. If there were distractions that choked the word then, how is the word to survive now?

And don't let the irony escape us: that we long-term believers fail to pay attention to a parable about paying

attention. Jesus describes us too well as he quotes a passage from Isaiah. We are people who hear, but remain deaf to the word. We see, but remain blind to God's presence. As Isaiah says, "They close their minds and hearts, lest they be converted and I heal them."

What is the punishment or consequence for not attending to God's word? That's like asking, what do we lose when we fail to hug our children or fail to eat nourishing food or fail to place ourselves in the presence of beauty? We lose the hug, the nourishment, the beauty. We lose out on simple pleasure, delight, joy. When we fail to attend to God's word we lose all that

is contained in God's word: the message for us, the light for the path, the food for the journey, our connection with the divine. We lose purpose, direction, wisdom, holiness.

Why don't we take the good that is offered to us, and why-oh-why do we look for satisfaction in what is bound to disappoint us? It must be a universal issue. A personal example: I know of no greater pleasure than the feeling of having my work done — the writing assignment, the clean bathroom, the phone call to the insurance company. But I will deny myself that pleasure until I can no longer avoid it. Why?! Original sin, I suppose. Even St. Paul said he did those things he didn't want to do and failed to do what he wanted to do.

How does the word survive in all this rocky, thorny, barren distracted, procrastinating, apathetic soil? The word will survive because we who are so indulged eventually discover that nothing else satisfies us. We get tired of being rocky and thorny and barren. We were created to be rich soil for the word. The prophecy of Isaiah is true: God says, "My word shall not return to me void, but shall do my will, achieving the end for which I sent it."

# Finance Council Meeting Minutes March 17, 2014

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## **Key Discussion:**

Erica provided the financials and the Council reviewed them. Administrative Expenses are being watched along with the line item Maintenance & Building Repairs.

The Capital Campaign, Building Faith Together has raised to date \$580,000. Discussion arose around the realistic goal for the entire project. Justin with his experience in capital construction has seen an average increase of 10% from initial estimates. A contingency of \$100,000 will ensure that the project will be completed efficiently and cover any unanticipated building issues that may arise. This will bring the amount of the project to \$1.4 million.

The Land Sale is under contract and anticipated to close in mid June. During the last Council meeting in February parishioners were able to bring up concerns to the committee regarding how the money would be used from the sale. At this March's meeting, it was agreed that of the anticipated return on the sale of \$2.9 million we have designated:

- \$100k for the contingency on the building renovation and that any costs over \$1.4 million will have to go to Finance Council for approval
- \$90k for repairs to Parish Center to be in compliance with the Protecting God's Children directive;
- \$110k for repairs on the roof, gutters, and air conditioning in the rectory;
- The remaining \$2.6 million will be designated for future capital endeavors.

The Council discussed the best ways to be transparent to the parish during the Land Sale and the church construction. It was decided that minutes of our monthly meetings would be posted in the bulletin and St. Teresa's website.

Fr. Frank talked about the costs associated with protecting the children of the parish. Particular capital improvements must be met and are expected to cost around \$90,000.

The next Council meeting will be May 19<sup>th</sup> at 7:00 pm. Please note there will not be an April meeting.

### Treasures from Our Tradition

With the Reformation, some early Protestants, including the "Anabaptists," rejected infant baptism in favor of "believer's baptism." Against Orthodox and Catholic prac-

tice, which favored baptism as soon as possible for a newborn, these movements desired that the candidate for baptism speak for him- or herself at a mature age, not through godparents as an infant. Today, it is clear that they were rejecting a very ancient practice (even as early as the second century) of

baptizing children of all ages. Children came first in ancient baptismal ceremonies, and someone would speak for them. Gregory of Nazianzen wanted to delay the baptism of children to three years of age, since at that age they could retain at least some impression of the liturgy. He made an exception for the very ill, who were to be baptized ahead of the annual Easter baptism. That means that infants and children were normally baptized together with adults, and that everyone received confirmation and the Eucharist.

The tone of the early bishops' writings is generous and compassionate, and seeks to build up the Eucharistic assembly by widely celebrating the gift of the Holy Spirit. If a priest celebrated baptism, then the gift of the Spirit was postponed for the bishop, but with no regard for the person's age. So, until the fifth century, confirmation was for infants, too. —Rev. James Field, Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

#### Tradiciones de Nuestra Fe

En el año 2001, Carlos Manuel Rodríguez Santiago se convirtió en el primer laico caribeño beatificado por la Iglesia. Su vida fue ejemplar en la caridad y en el amor a la

liturgia, pues promovió la participación de los fieles de una manera activa, mucho antes de que el Concilio Vaticano II así lo pidiera. En 1963 una colitis rectal muy severa lo llevó a los brazos de Cristo resucitado, a la edad de 44 años.

Carlitos, como muchos lo llaman, trabajó en la Universidad de

Puerto Rico y fundó un grupo apostólico laical en el Centro Católico de dicha universidad. Allí pudo obrar por el desarrollo del humanismo cristiano, la participación activa de los laicos en la liturgia de la Iglesia y por la renovación de la Vigilia Pascual. Solía decir que los cristianos "vivimos para esa noche" como cumbre y centro de nuestra fe.

Carlitos es modelo para los laicos comprometidos con su fe. Él insistía no sólo en una participación activa en la pastoral de la iglesia, sino también en la liturgia de la Iglesia en una época donde la Misa todavía se consideraba obra exclusiva de los sacerdotes. — Fray Gilberto Cavazos-Glz, OFM, Copyright © J. ## Giving of Oneself

Scientists have recently begun to discuss the idea that the primary force behind all life in the universe is self-gift.

This is how everything from galaxies to human babies are born and sustained.

If we read the opening of today's passage from Isaiah correctly, we see that he anticipated twentieth-century scientists by over twenty five hundred years. Using the self-giving example of the rain and snow clouds that water the earth that then yields fruit, which in turn

is given over to nourish creatures, Isaiah leads us to understand that the primary force behind all life is the word of God. The ultimate giving of that word, we believe, was Jesus Christ, who, in the greatest revelation of divine love, gave of himself on the cross.

To what degree are we in touch with that self-giving God in whose image we are made? To what extent do we really follow the self-giving example of Christ into whose death and resurrection we were baptized, whose ultimate self-gift we celebrate every week in the Eucharist? With God's help, our lives can be like Isaiah's rain and snow, and we will not return to heaven until we have done our part to make the earth fruitful. Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

## Renunciar a Sí Mismo


Los científicos recientemente empezaron a debatir el hecho de que la fuerza primordial detrás de toda vida en el


