## The Pearl of Great Price — The Right Relationship

Imagine that you just won the lottery. Imagine unearthing a large metal box full of coins while digging in your garden. Imagine falling asleep and seeing God in a dream offering you anything you wish for.

Stories of buried treasure, sudden wealth, wishes and dreams are among the oldest and most universal fables in human culture. The very thought of sudden wealth quickens the pulse. What if? Would all our troubles be over if we were rich? Would doors open to a new future?

Maybe. Wealth without wisdom is another common theme in fables. Wealth is really just another form of power, and having power increases our options but also complicates our lives. It can create indolence or attract false friends and ironically make us more avaricious and obsessed with money than when we were poor.

We quickly learn another popular saying, that money can't buy happiness or make us a better person. How many lottery winners later report that their sudden windfall proved destructive and distracting to the more important values of their personal lives, straining family relationships, blurring former career goals and lessening the discipline that once held their lives in focus and on course?

Jesus compared the kingdom of God to finding a treasure or a pearl of great price, but he was not describing earthly wealth or



power. His many parables drew people into the drama of how they might respond to God's grace. He stirred imaginations as the first step toward understanding that true happiness is found only in right relationship with God and with one another.

God was pleased when Solomon asked for wisdom, for this showed he was already wise and would be a good leader. Jesus ap-

pealed to the spiritual seekers in the crowd who already knew that finding God brings every other gift, and that life without God, even with wealth and power, would be empty and pointless.


Right relationship would bring justice to the world, and everyone would have what they needed to live a good life. An unjust world creates poverty, insecurity and competition, which drive many to pursue wealth as the answer to every problem. The kingdom of God comes not just as a gift but as an invitation to discipleship. Disciples commit to changing the world to alleviate the suffering and conflicts created by competition and insecurity. Possessing the true treasure of God's love enables us to give of ourselves freely in advocating for others, serving those in need, challenging power and wealth when it deprives others of justice and causes them suffering.

Life is short, and most of us get one chance to figure out what will make us truly happy. The Gospel offers a path that often seems paradoxical — that to find our life we must lose it, that only love given away freely comes back to us in joy, that seeking first the will of God is the secret of finding everything else we need as well.

Life's exit interviews — the testimony of those in nursing homes or on their deathbeds — affirm the truth that peace of mind and happiness come to those who develop and use their gifts to serve others. Wisdom is to know this early enough in life to apply it to our choices day by day. The direction we set will determine the outcome of our journey. Blessed are they who find the treasure of God's love and spend their lives giving it away to others.

## **Treasures from Our Tradition**

By the dawn of the fourteenth century, the sacrament of confirmation was ripe for a rescue, since vast numbers of the faithful never received it, and when it was celebrated, it

was done so in isolation from baptism and Eucharist. A bishop named William Durandus set out to reclaim this liturgy, but he had a creative touch and added some things into the mix that had never been thought of before. One was a slap. Oddly, he replaced the kiss of peace at the end of confirmation with a slap on

the cheek that endured to modern times. This "wake-up call" was related in his imagination to a custom in the military, wherein ceremonies of knighthood and investiture involved a symbolic wound as a sign of willingness to suffer.

Within every congregation today there are people who have memories of fretting through their confirmation liturgies, anxious to know how enthusiastic a slap the bishop would bestow. Durandus loved symbolism and had a reason for every ritual and practice, but his creative spin on the celebration shows how sadly adrift confirmation was from its anchorage in baptism, how far off-course from its home port of the Eucharistic community. — Rev. 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Por eso se hizo fraile dominico e hizo varios viajes a España en defensa de los derechos humanos de los amerindios ante los reyes de España, los cuales le dieron tierras en Venezuela y Chiapas para poner en práctica su teoría humanista acerca de los indígenas.

Hasta el fin de su vida este fraile y teólogo dominico luchó por los derechos de los nativos americanos, buscando convencer a los reyes españoles y a los Papas que la conquista no favorecía la evangelización de los pueblos. Gracias a sus esfuerzos se abolió la esclavitud indígena y se instituyó el diálogo, en lugar de la espada, como instrumento de conversión. — Fray Gilberto Cavazos-Giz, OFM, Copyright ⊕ J. S. Out of all the things he could have asked for, Solomon chose to ask for understanding, and was

rewarded with it. We would do well to wonder what we would ask for if God made us the same offer. Actually God does make us the same offer each and every day, by granting us another day of life, a bit of the earth's goods, some gift or ability, some call to goodness, some portion of the divine will. Each of these is a "prize." We should stop and examine what we are going to do with our prize: keep it or use it selfishly, or put it at the service of the spread of the gospel? Copyright © J. S. ## Summer Mission this Weekend

We welcome Fr. Geofrey Andama and Fr. Alexander Selakpi as our summer missionary speakers this weekend. They are both priests of the Archdiocese of

Chicago and natives of Uganda in Africa.

They will be speaking on behalf of the Saint Therese Youth Development Center International (STYDEC International) of Ghana, a Catholic notfor-profit organization dedicated to Youth Ministry, Evangelization and Education in the most



rural parts of Ghana, where there is no running water, no portable drinking water, and no electricity. Children have to walk several miles each day to school in a nearby town and back, and usually do so, many a time on empty stomachs and no water to drink while in school. Most of these villages have not yet been evangelized, and Bishop Bemile of the diocese of Wa in Ghana asked STYDEC to help spread the Gospel in these areas.

This year there are two main projects for the Mission Appeal. One is to provide one nutritious meal a day for the over 1,800 children in the most deprived parts of northern Ghana. The other is to build a Catholic Boarding High School to provide quality affordable education for the youth in the most deprived communities in northern Ghana.

This will cost an estimated two hundred thousand U.S. dollars to build and furnish. All funds collected from this Mission Co-op at St. Teresa Parish will go directly to these two main projects.
