The Way Forward

Procrastination is particularly subversive in that it consoles us with our intention to do good without ever doing it. Like other forms of denial, it reassures us that we are pointed in the right direction, basically virtuous, and will eventually get around to doing what is right. But we never actually do it, and are instead enmeshed in our excuses until we forget our original plan to change.

John Greenleaf Whittier, a 19th Century Quaker poet, captured the tragedy of postponing good: “Of all sad words of tongue or pen, the saddest are these, ‘It might have been.’”

A more contemporary voice, Scottish-Australian singer Colin Hay, speaks for a generation of idealists in his song “Waiting for My Real Life to Begin.”

In today’s Gospel parable, Jesus distinguishes between those who say they obey God but do not act, and those who resist God’s will but in the end accomplish it. Words are not enough; deeds show our true intent. In another parable (7:24-29), Jesus compares those who hear the word but do not live it to someone building a house on sand.

Jesus warns the chief priests and elders that though they claim superior knowledge of the law and observe ritual purity, they avoid the call to practice genuine love. They do not enter the kingdom themselves and keep others from doing so. Paradoxically, while the

self-righteous remain aloof, sinners recognize their need for God’s mercy and are taking the kingdom by storm.

Virtue appears to complete us, gaining God’s favor in the same way physical exercise builds muscle and improves our appearance. We look at others who lack discipline and often feel proud that we are not like them. Yet, as we distinguish ourselves from those who are morally weak, we isolate ourselves from humanity and forget the essential practices that measure true holiness.


Paul celebrates the mystery of *kenosis* — self-forgetfulness and self-emptying — in the hymn quoted in Philippians 2:1-11. Jesus did not separate himself from our human condition, but emptied himself of his divine prerogatives to become one with us in temptation and suffering. He emptied himself,

taking the form of a slave. He humbled himself, becoming obedient to the point of death. Though he was God, he accepted the most ignominious death possible — execution as a criminal on the cross.

If, in our pursuit of holiness, we imagine ourselves rising to heaven, we will pass Jesus going the other way, identifying totally with those who suffer most the hardships of the human condition in order to unite himself with them as a brother. True holiness is found not in splendid isolation from the troubles of others, or in personal perfection achieved by avoiding the annoying faults of others. We become whole by taking our place in the real world of family and community, by helping others who try our patience and waste our time and our resources asking us to accompany them on the up-and-down road of life. We are fulfilled each day we end up emptying ourselves for others. Giving ourselves away, we find ourselves again in God.

Jesus tells his disciples, and us: “For whoever wishes to save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for my sake will find it” (Matt 16:25). The parable of the two sons teaches hope. Even if we are late in realizing it, doing God’s will is the way forward. It is our way home.

Treasures from Our Tradition

Over time, the severe form of one-chance penance collapsed under lack of enthusiasm for its burdens and its public nature. As ordinary Christians prayed for the great sinners, it must have occurred to them that they were sinners no less, and they required a form of penance also. The Irish came to the rescue, never having had a public form of penance, but inventing a system called “tariff penance,” which was completely private, available to everyone, and wildly popular. After a detailed confession, priest and penitent would lie on the floor before the altar and recite a number of psalms. The priest then pronounced a judgment, a tariff, giving a task or a prayer to complete before reconciliation.

The surviving guidebooks for confessors make for hair-raising reading as the sins of which the Irish people were supposedly capable were catalogued and keyed to penances. Cattle or sheep rustling might require stripping down to sing psalms in an icy brook, for example, or adultery could be the occasion for rolling in a thicket of thorns. All of this might have stayed in Ireland had not the monks had a desire to travel, blazing across Europe with their theology and their rituals, and their sense that Christians needed strong medicine for sin and the assurance of God’s forgiveness. — Rev. Tradiciones de Nuestra Fe

Las actas de los mártires son documentos de suma importancia en la Iglesia cristiana. En ellas se encuentra el testimonio de hombres y mujeres que con su sangre dieron testimonio del evangelio. En esta documentación encontramos el testimonio de quienes vieron y presenciaron su martirio. Por ejemplo, un soldado dice de los mártires:

“Dormían en el suelo. No les vi quejarse en ningún momento y estuvieron todo el tiempo rezando y muy recogidos. . . magníficos, unos santos. . .”

Testimonios como éste eran comunes en los primeros siglos del cristianismo cuando en la Roma pagana se perseguía a la Iglesia primitiva. Lamentablemente, este testimonio no viene de hace 17 ó 19 siglos, más bien, viene del siglo pasado, siglo en el cual la persecución de cristianos se multiplicó por todas partes del mundo produciendo más mártires que ningún otro siglo.

El testimonio del soldado fue acerca del primer santo Argentino, Héctor Valdivielso Sáez y compañeros, quienes fueron asesinados por los comunistas en Asturias, España. Él fue uno de los más de 8000 cristianos martirizados en España, 30,000 en China, incontables en Latinoamérica y otros lugares durante el siglo pasado. — Fray Gilberto Cavazos-Gluz, OFM, Copyright © J. Necessary Repetition

Spiritual teachers tend to repeat themselves, and to repeat other teachers. Maybe there really aren't that many different truths to tell. Just a lot of slow, sleepy human beings—like us—who need to hear the basics over and over. Consider today's readings.

People complain that God isn't "fair," and Ezekiel answers that God is more than fair. People choose their own fates, and people can change. Even evildoers can turn, do right, and live. "Actions speak louder than words." A fresh new insight? Hardly.

Paul tells the Philippians he would truly be encouraged if those who claimed to be believers would, in fact, look to others' interests and not their own. "The proof of the pudding is in the eating." A novel idea? I don't think so.

In Jesus' story of the farmer and his sons, everyone knows the one who said he wouldn't work—but did—is way ahead of the one who said he would work, but didn't. "Talk is cheap." Heard that before? Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

The *Time Of Your Life Gala* and Get-Away Raffle support St. Teresa parish, including its outreach programs.



Those purchasing a table or individuals who wish to sit together need to include the names of those to be seated at their table or the name of the table host in the special accommodations section of the ticket form.




Last Chance to Connect to the Camino: Fr. Frank to Leave Prayers & Mementos at *La Cruz de Ferro*

La Cruz de Ferro sits upon a tall wooden pole. There are many traditions associated with *La Cruz de Ferro*.

One of the traditions is to attach prayers, holy cards and other small remembrances of loved ones to the wooden pole as a way to connect to the Camino and to also connect the Camino to life.

Update #11— MEP, Mechanical, Electrical & Plumbing Continues






