In Plain Sight

The king saw a man there not dressed in a wedding garment.

(Matt 22:11)

Our family has a baptismal garment worn by four generations of infants, beginning with Great Grandma, who was baptized in 1910. Her child, grandchildren and great-grandchildren all wore it when they were baptized — all but one. I was designated the keeper of the garment. It was delicate, so I kept it folded inside a cotton pillowcase in a safe place. When it came time for the baptism of Great Grandchild Number Three, I couldn't find it. Heartbroken, we had to go with a store-bought replacement. I guessed that I had accidentally thrown it out with some old sheets.

There are two parts to today's Gospel. The first is about a great feast to which those initially invited fail to RSVP. They're busy or not interested or even hostile to the idea of the feast. Upon their rejection, the host of the banquet sends out his servants to invite all and sundry, "good and bad alike."

A great feast, described luxuriously in Isaiah, of juicy, rich foods and pure, choice wines — why would anyone refuse? Sadly, there are those whose eyes are not open to abundance. Remember that great quote from Auntie Mame? "Life is a banquet and most poor suckers are starving to death." It's one thing to starve because there is no food or because others are hoarding. But to starve with an invitation to a banquet in hand —

how sad.

When we go to worship, I wonder how many of us fail to see the feast. I do. I go to direct the choir or out of habit or to be a good example to my young ones, but too often I miss it. And, if truth be told, sometimes we do a fair job of disguising the banquet as one long, tedious exercise. But still, what we need to be happy, healthy and holy is right there, if we only have eyes to see.

The second part of today's Gospel is a harsh encounter between the host of the banquet and a poor slob who showed up without his wedding garment. He is not only asked to leave, but bound hand and foot and cast out into the darkness.

Of course the point is not


style, nor is it a great idea to use this as an opportunity to castigate the folks who come to Mass in jeans. (Please don't!) The point is that just showing up isn't enough. We must prepare ourselves to take part in the feast, and the white wedding garment — or baptismal garment — is symbolic of that inner preparation.

What happens to the bright hope of our baptism? Do we misplace it, as I did our precious baptismal dress? Why do some people wander off? Hurt by the boorish behavior of a priest or Catholic school teacher or another member of our congregation? Rejected because of who we married or because we're gay or too liberal or too conservative or because we sent our kids to public school? Or did we just get bored or busy or lazy?

Maybe our baptismal garment shouldn't be tucked away in a safe place. Maybe it should be worn proudly in plain sight, precious and delicate as it may be. Maybe it grows brighter and stronger with wear.

Several years after we had to resort to the substitute gown, I was showing our girl child the clothes she had worn as a baby and there it was — the now 100-year-old baptismal garment, folded inside the pillowcase, right where I had left it. We might lose our faith, but we can find it again — and even pass it on to the next generation to wear proudly and in plain sight.

Treasures from Our Tradition

The confessional is a familiar setting in literature and drama. Everyone from Doestoevsky and Shakespeare down the line to Seinfeld has used the sacrament to tragic or comic effect or to reveal aspects of character otherwise hidden. All of this theater, from world classics to slapstick, has had a numbing effect on our own expectations, and has skewed how the culture looks at us and our struggle with sin and forgiveness, hope and healing.

Yet the artists are on to something. The reconciliation chapel is a place where hearts are laid bare, where honesty is the watchword, and people confess their deepest needs. It is also a place of rebirth, or at least realignment. It is, like the baptismal font, a place where something dies, and where something else is born. Today, although literature has barely caught up, the place is usually not the dark and gloomy cabinet of old; rather it is a chapel that speaks of peace, serenity, and the comfort of a welcome home. People in one parish were astonished recently to see their children skipping with delight as they left the place of their first confession. We have to wait a bit for world literature to catch up with this reality, but at least we can experience the joy of penance, the thrill of a new beginning, the assurance of God's love. — Rev. En esa tierra ella pidió la construcción de un templo donde ella misma sería altar para la gloria de Dios. Santiago mismo construyó la primera iglesia donde hoy se encuentra una gran basílica en honor de Nuestra Señora del Pilar. En el siglo XVIII, el Papa Clemente XII declaró el 12 de octubre como su fiesta en memoria de la llegada de los europeos al continente americano. 
Come to the Feast

Vengan a la Fiesta

“On this mountain, the Lord of hosts / will provide for all peoples / a feast of rich food and choice wines” (Isaiah 25:6). That’s what Isaiah tells us today. God is putting together a huge party for “all peoples,” to “wipe away / the tears from every face” (Isaiah 25:8).

And what does Jesus tell us? The reign of God, he says, “may be likened to a king who gave a wedding feast for his son” (Matthew 22:2). When the guests didn’t come, the king had his servants go out “into the main roads and invite to the feast whomever you find” (Matthew 22:9). We are called to deliver that invitation.

One of the themes woven into today’s liturgy is that of divine generosity. Asleep to reality, people often think they have “earned” what they have. In our better moments, though, we know that all our gifts—even the spiritual gifts—come through God’s generosity. Our vocation is to invite people, to remind them the tickets aren’t for sale. 

I pray that everyone will rejoice in the graces and hard work of so many of our fellow parishioners and make a meaningful gift that will lead us through a successful effort.






