

See What You've Never Noticed

Raise your eyes and look about.... Then you shall be radiant at what you see, your heart shall throb and overflow. (Isa 60:4a;5a)

In our house, the Nativity scene appears gradually. On the First Sunday of Advent, just the stable, made out of old barn wood from one of our sheds. Then in a few days, some animals; then Mary and Joseph. It drives the kids nuts that Baby Jesus doesn't appear until December 24, and along with him, the star, an angel, the shepherds and another sheep.

Beginning on Christmas
Day, after the wrappings are
cleared away to be burned in our
traditional Christmas bonfire, the
magi start their journey from
behind the couch and make their
way closer and closer until they
arrive today at the baby's side.

Our older kids like to joke around with the Nativity characters, and we might find an angel in a lamp or a shepherd in the kindling basket. One year on Epiphany Sunday we awoke to find the stable missing and just the characters in place. It turns out one of the little boys borrowed it for his Lego guys. But without the stable, the characters were more visible, their little painted faces lit up, their delicate beauty more evident.

Twenty years ago my parish was in the midst of a renovation and for nine months we worshiped in the church basement. There were new Mass times to accommodate the crowd, new places to sit and



new faces — or old faces we had never noticed. New friendships were formed during those nine months. When our world is disturbed, some may only see what they lost, but if we allow it, we might see what we've never noticed. We might see something that

will make us "radiant at what we see" and our "hearts throb."

In the stories, that's what happens to the shepherds and the wise men. It's what happens to Mary as she takes in all the strange words about her baby boy and stores them in her heart. It's what happens to Joseph as he trusts his dreams and his God.

But it is not what happens to Herod. There are those — and some of them are very powerful — who will not see. There are wise people and innocents and holy families in this world, but there are also Herods who are, in every age, bent


on destruction; who will, in order to save themselves, destroy everyone on their path and, ultimately, themselves.

Perhaps it's a good idea to practice seeing beyond our stables. Perhaps it's a good idea to move some stuff around or get rid of it so we can see more clearly what is important. Perhaps it's a good idea to focus on the faces of those we love dearly and those we may not have chosen, but who are put on our path to love. Perhaps it's a good idea lest we cooperate in Herod's schemes just so that we might keep our comfortable-but-confining stable walls around us.

Today is Little Christmas in our house. We have one last big family meal, one last present to the children, one last day when we sing the carols and light the tree. Sometime during this coming week we will turn off the Christmas lights, put away the ornaments and the Christmas CDs, movies and books. It's up to us to keep Christmas in our hearts and continue to see what we hold dear. It's up to us to practice gratitude and help our children learn to do so as well. For with a grateful heart, one can see the graces offered to us. And with an ungrateful heart, our eyes are blinded, and we have the potential of becoming a little Herod in our little world. God help us.

Treasures from Our Tradition

Epiphany celebrates the wake-up calls of life, the showings of God's majesty and power in the person of Jesus. The feast alerts us to look for

signs of the Lord's grace and action in our lives today. In this context, the call of the Second Vatican Council to reform the sacramental life of the Church, including our pattern of care for the sick, is indeed a holy

awakening.

Prior to the 1960s, our care for the sick had collapsed in the popular imagination into something everyone called "last rites." An immensely complicated ritual, with anointing accompanied by quickly muttered Latin prayers, was enacted for a marginally

conscious person at "death's door." By the time a priest was called, the sick person might not be able to receive viaticum, or derive much personal benefit from the ritual. The healing effects of the sacrament, investing suffering with the dignity of a link to Christ's cross, and the immense assurance of forgiveness for a person reviewing the life journey, were hidden. Suddenly, an epiphany swept through the Church, and the way we care for the sick was utterly transformed. It took several centuries, however, for the Church to reach that moment of renewal. —Rev. Según una canción de Ricardo Arjona "Jesús es verbo, no sustantivo". Y tiene razón. Hay que recordar que Juan no escribió en español, ni siquiera en inglés. El evangelista escribió en griego y aplicó el concepto filosófico del logos a Jesús. El logos, de la filosofía griega se manifiesta en

Jesús de Nazaret. Para los griegos esta noticia era asombrosa, porque logos quiere decir palabra activa, es decir, el verbo que actúa y por el cual todo es creado. Juan declara que Jesús es este Verbo, él es el Dios que lo hizo todo y en el cual todos tenemos vida si actuamos como él.

Partners in the Promise


As a society, during these days we can be in some-

thing of a "postpartum" depression. Our celebrations of Christmas and the New Year are over, and after today many of us will put away the decorations and the last visible remnants of the celebrations of the past weeks. The apostle Paul today uses the expression "partners in the promise." This is an uplifting phrase for us to reflect upon, and to think of as our own calling in these days following the birth of the

Lord. What is this promise? We can find it in the gifts the magi bring: it is a promise of being a royal priesthood (gold), a holy nation (frankincense), a people set apart for self-giving (myrrh). We find more of the promise in Isaiah—a light shines upon us! In the psalm we know a promise of a world of flowering justice, profound peace, the poor rescued, pity for the lowly and the poor. This is the promise; and one of the best ways for us to lift ourselves out of any possible low spirits we may be suffering is to live out our partnership in this promise each and every day. 


Ministry of Care


