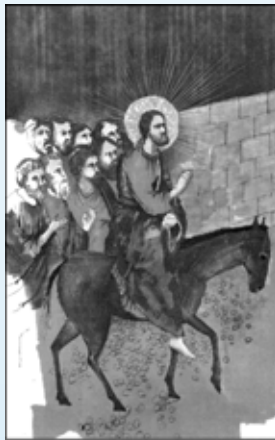
## Solidarity in Suffering

A quote sometimes attributed to Dorothy Day answers the question of just what Pope Pius XII could have done to stand up to Hitler when the Jews were being rounded up and shipped to concentration camps: “He could have ridden into Berlin on a donkey.”

This quotation, true or not, captures the drama of what Jesus did when he entered Jerusalem to celebrate Passover. The city was ruled by Herod, puppet king under the Roman occupation, with the complicity of the temple establishment.

Jesus’ symbolic ride fulfilled the prophecy of Zechariah (9:9) and mocked the triumphal entrance of all conquering generals on white horses. His action was provocative in the extreme, and its symbolism would not have been missed by the authorities. Jesus had no power and far less prestige than any pope in modern times, and such a stunt was the first act in a drama that ended with his crucifixion.

Our Palm Sunday liturgy is only theater if it has no effect on our Christian commitment to follow Jesus in our own world so marked by violent threats to anyone foolish enough to speak truth to power. We have enough examples of prophets killed for challenging the status quo: Gandhi in India; Dietrich Bonhoeffer and Franz Jägerstätter in Nazi Germany; Stephen Biko in South Africa; Martin Luther King Jr. in the United States; Benigno Aquino of the Philippines; Oscar

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Romero and the Jesuit martyrs of El Salvador. What social justice issues await new leaders in our own time?

This year we read Mark’s Passion, a straightforward account of the final hours of Jesus’ life, from his anointing in Bethany to his entombment. Our faith communities listen to this annual reading of the Passion to set the stage for Holy Week. Lent has brought us through 40 days to this threshold of the core mysteries of our faith, where the full cost of discipleship is revealed. This is the way of the cross.

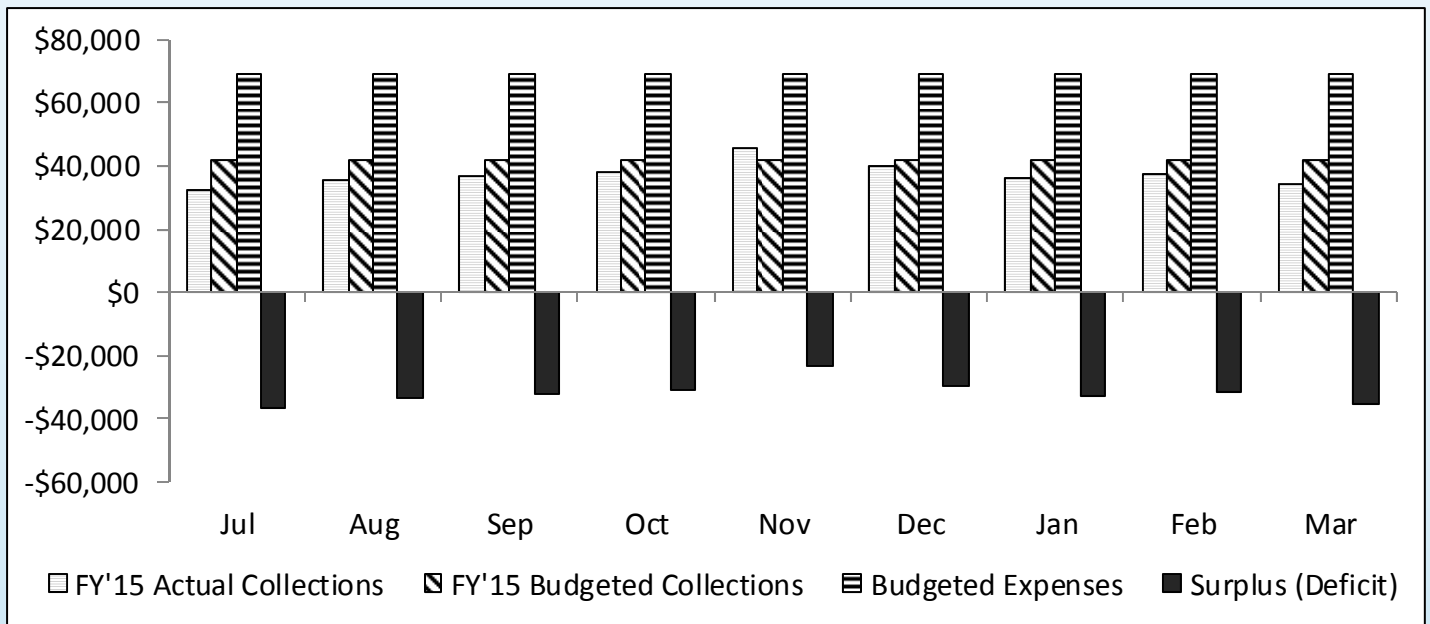
For most of us, our share in the suffering of Christ will be neither public nor dramatic, but accomplished in our daily struggle to be true to our principles and faithful to our promises. For those who live to old age, there will be no lack of

sacrifice and pain to join with the suffering of so many in our world, the vast cloud of witnesses who give themselves to their families and communities by fulfilling their responsibilities and bearing the common burdens that hold life together for everyone.

Some of the most difficult kinds of suffering are barely visible, but contribute greatly to the network of love that defines us — the patience to accompany the weak without judgment; the courage to support those most excluded by our society: the mentally ill, people in crisis, those set apart, the undocumented, refugees, the imprisoned. Being with Christ is not just imitating his love, but loving him when he is hidden in those who seem unlovable, distant and different, the least of our brothers and sisters (Matt 25).

By participating in the Palm Sunday procession and listening actively to the Passion, we are invited once again to review our own place within the real liturgy of the world — the “work of the people” that makes us the church in the modern world, witnesses to Christ, advocates for all those in need. The body of Christ that dies on the cross is all of us. The body of Christ that is raised from the dead to new life is all of us. Our solidarity in suffering becomes our shared resurrection.

## Fiscal Year (07/01 - 06/30) Comparison to Date



- For the 2015 Fiscal Year, Sunday Offertory Collections are 10% below the budgeted collection amount. This results in a fiscal year to date deficit of \$286,734.
- For the 2015 fiscal year, the cost per family per week is \$37 as 430 families contribute to the Parish.
- Our goal is to fund all operations and expenses from the weekly collections, i.e. the goal is for the striped bars to exceed the black bars in the chart above.
- St. Teresa's annual fundraisers assist in meeting funding gaps. It is the Finance Council's and Fr. Frank's goal to increase weekly giving to meet our ongoing expenses, and use the proceeds from fundraisers to fund special initiatives and outreach programs of the Parish.

## Treasures from Our Tradition

Is today “Palm Sunday” or “Passion Sunday”? Though now known officially as Palm Sunday of the Passion of the Lord, confusion is understandable, since before the 1969 reform of the calendar two separate Sundays bore these titles. Passion Sunday was a week before Palm Sunday. To add to the confusion, the Gospel accounts of the Passion of the Lord were not read on Passion Sunday, but on Palm Sunday! On Passion Sunday, the cross and statues were veiled in full purple drapes. The organ had fallen silent at the beginning of Lent, and now the sanctuary bells were replaced by wooden clappers. The introit (opening chant) for the old Mass of Passion Sunday hints at a reason for reform: “Do me justice, O God, and fight my fight against a faithless people” (Psalm 42). This liturgy was laden with references to the “infidelity” of the Jews, a theme that gave rise to inflammatory preaching and, in some places, attacks against the persons and property of the Jewish people. This does not stand as a “treasure” of any sort in our tradition. Our authentic tradition, rather, is the ability to reflect and repent and to seek reconciliation with the Jews, our brothers and sisters in the love and service of God. — Rev. James Field,

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## Tradiciones de Nuestra Fe

El Domingo de Ramos o Domingo de Ramos es una solemnidad extraña en el calendario cristiano. Al conmemorar la entrada triunfal de Jesús en Jerusalén, la Iglesia nos recuerda lo fácil que es darle la espalda a Jesús. Las misas de este domingo, cuando se celebran de acuerdo a las normas, comienzan en la calle, fuera del templo, en el mundo. Allí se proclama el Evangelio de la entrada a Jerusalén, se bendicen los ramos o palmas, luego, con cantos alegres y llenos de hosannas los fieles entran al templo para continuar con la celebración de la misa, en la cual, la lectura de la Pasión tiene un lugar prominente. La lectura de la Pasión está dividida entre el narrador, Jesús, los personajes de la Pasión y el pueblo. De nuevo, si la misa se celebra propiamente, desde sus bancas, los fieles proclaman las palabras del pueblo, gritando: “¡Crucifiquenlo!”

Los dos evangelios de este domingo nos recuerdan lo fácil que es abandonar al Señor. Los mismos cristianos que afuera del Templo le cantaban hosanna piden su muerte dentro del Templo. Los mismos que en la calle le celebraban con ramos, lo coronan con espinas en el santuario. — Fray Gilberto Cavazos-Glz, OFM, Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

## Prophetic Anointing

The solemnity of today's readings invites us into silent contemplation of the mystery of our redemption. There are so many levels on which to understand the events of the Passion. The woman who anoints Jesus acts prophetically in a way that the other disciples do not yet grasp. Anointing is for priests, prophets, and kings, and also for the preparation of the dead. It is for healing and for holiness. Her action acknowledges the imminent events of the passion and death of the Lord, and points toward his resurrection and triumph over evil and death. He is priest and victim, prophet and God, King and Lord. All these things are acknowledged in her prophetic anointing.

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## Unción Profética

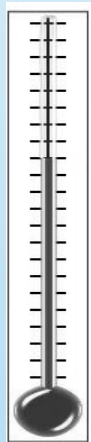

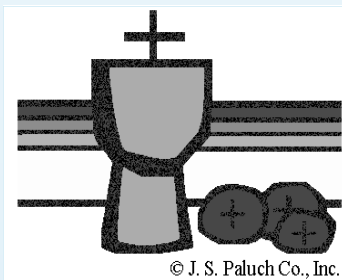

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### Lenten Regulations

Abstinence from meat is to be observed by all Catholics 14 years old and older on Ash Wednesday and on all Fridays in Lent.

Fasting is to be observed on Ash Wednesday by all Catholics 18 years old but not yet 59. Those who are bound by this may take only one full meal. Two smaller meals are permitted if necessary to maintain strength according to one's needs, but eating solid food between meals is not permitted.

The Paschal fast, as well as abstinence, are prescribed for Good Friday and encouraged for Holy Saturday.



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### Urgent: Food Pantry Needs Thursday Drivers



St. Teresa's Food Pantry is **urgently and immediately seeking three (3) new volunteers to join the Thursday Food Pickup Team.**

Every Thursday, a volunteer driver picks up our food order from the Greater Chicago Food Depository (near Midway airport) using a cargo van rented from the Home Depot (1232 W North Ave). Additional volunteers meet the driver at church to help unload the delivery van and arrange food into the pantry.
