

# Fiscal Year (07/01 - 06/30) Comparison to Date



- For the 2015 Fiscal Year, Sunday Offertory Collections are 3% above the budgeted collection amount. This results in a fiscal year to date deficit of \$266,152.
- For the 2015 fiscal year, the cost per family per week is \$37 as 430 families contribute to the Parish.
- Our goal is to fund all operations and expenses from the weekly collections, i.e. the goal is for the stripped bars to exceed the black bars in the chart above.
- St. Teresa's annual fundraisers assist in meeting funding gaps. It is the Finance Council's and Fr. Frank's goal to increase weekly giving to meet our ongoing expenses, and use the proceeds from fundraisers to fund special initiatives and outreach programs of the Parish.

## **Treasures from Our Tradition**

Marriage is ideally a parish event today, but in the first three centuries of the church's history, it was a household

celebration guided by civil law and pagan customs. Changes happened quickly after the Peace of Constantine in 312, and the fresh air after long persecution brought some creativity. The speech that the father of the groom's family gave before dinner or the veiling or crowning of the bride (or even the spouse's arrival at the honeymoon suite) attracted a prayer of blessing.

With amazing rapidity, worship was propelled out of the intimate setting of house churches to large public gathering spaces, and some parts of the marriage ceremony began to migrate with the growing community to the new spaces. In Rome, the veiling of the bride with the customary daily headgear of a married woman became the central liturgical act, accompanied by a biblical prayer for her integrity and fruitfulness. There were no vows as such (just as there are no vows to this day in the Orthodox marriage rite). In the liturgy, after hearing John's Gospel account of the wedding at Cana, the bride was veiled and blessed, and the priest gave the kiss of peace to the husband, who then gave it to his bride. The liturgy of Rome traveled far, and everywhere it went, marriage became a church celebration. — Rev. James Field, Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

# The Paschal Pattern

Pentecost is the Jewish feast of harvest, 50 (*pente*) days after Passover, when the blessings of the Exodus from Egypt are harvested and celebrated.

The Christian adaptation of this important liturgical feast reflects the same themes, as fulfilled in the death and resurrection of Jesus, which for us has become the new Passover and the decisive Exodus of all God's people — not just from historical slavery, but from sin and death. The gifts of the Holy Spirit poured out on the church are the new harvest, empowering disciples to sow the word of God throughout the whole world.

Luke's account of Pentecost in the Acts of the Apostles also repeats the story of the Incarnation at the start of his Gospel. Just as the Holy Spirit enabled Mary to conceive and give birth to Jesus, so the Spirit conceives and gives birth to the church, the body of Christ in the world, at Pentecost. This is why it was important for Luke to place Mary among the disciples in the upper room praying for the coming of the Spirit. Mary's faith inspires the faith of the disciples, who must say yes, as she did, for the church to be born.

Pentecost extends Christmas and Easter in time and space. Each successive generation of Christians is baptized into the mystery of the Incarnation. Each disciple is invited to come to maturity by accepting the Holy Spirit into every aspect of his or her human experience. The



The Spirit promises that the power of Jesus will be effective in our witness. But, like Mary, we must say yes and we must remain faithful so the mystery can unfold over time.

Paschal Mystery — the death and resurrection of Jesus — permeates our daily activities.

Whenever even one disciple acts with selfless love, the death of the Lord is revealed. Whenever one disciple joyfully reaps the harvest of selfless love in the community, the resurrection of the Lord is celebrated. This is the essence of the Christian life. This is the center of every Eucharist. Our sacrifices are his sacrifice and our lives are renewed by his resurrection. This is the source of our communion and our mission to the world.

Multiply this paschal pattern in every follower of Christ, and we begin to see the presence of the body of Christ in the world. So great a movement within history is possible only by the power of the Holy Spirit.

John's Gospel identifies the Spirit as Advocate, one who works with and within the church. The Spirit does not do everything, but helps us make Jesus visible and effective in the world. We are the hands and feet, eyes and ears, voice and touch of Jesus. The risen Jesus gives his disciples the power to forgive and to give God's peace. This is now our mission.

The Spirit reminds the disciples of everything that Jesus said and did. This is not just to instruct us, but so we can imitate Jesus. The Spirit promises that the power of Jesus will be effective in our witness. But, like Mary, we must say yes and we must remain faithful so the mystery can unfold over time.

Pentecost is not the end but the beginning of the story of Jesus, extended in history through us. We are the Incarnation for our time and place. The harvest fills us with the life of God, but also gives us a share of the seed meant for sowing so there will be more harvests.

Today is the birthday of the church. It is also a staging area where we gather to be nourished and empowered before being sent forth to witness to the message of Jesus. Let us be filled with breath, fire and energy as we take the Spirit into our world.
