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## October Stewardship Numbers

- Food pantry service was up 46% this month distributing 1,169 bags of groceries;
- Loaves & Fishes volunteers and chefs served 22% more meals this month: 390 guests, 3,236 meals served year-to-date;
- 41 families were photographed for our photo directory;
- 21 volunteers served up 11 gallons of pasta, 5 gallons of sauce, 60 ft. of garlic bread, and over 200 meatballs:
- 32 donors gave life at our blood drive, which was run by six volunteers;
- Five people signed up for automated contributions via Give Central;
- 31 new individual or families have registered as parishioners (welcome!);
- Eight families hosted a post-Mass hospitality.

It costs more to help more. Our ministries are expanding and we are joyful to serve others. The budget for our social outreach programs has nearly doubled over the past few months as our programs increase their reach.



### Treasures from Our Tradition

In 1974, a revised ritual of penance was given to the Church, and at forty years distance, we still are discovering its treasures and tentative about some of its provisions. The rite reaches deep into our tradition for

an early insight: when we turn to God, we are restored to life in the Church.

There are three different forms of penance. The familiar individual confession is preserved, but with tremendous enrichment. It is less rushed, anchored by a reading from scripture, and the confession of sins is seen as an opportunity to pro-

claim faith in God's power to save. In a sense, what is "confessed" is the penitent's faith in God's gift of forgiveness. The priest suggests a penance that may be directly connected to the virtue that the person seeks as a means of overcoming the fault. There are formulas for contrition suggested, but the penitent might even express sorrow for sin and desire for mercy in his or her own words. The prayer of absolution grounds the event in the life and ministry of the Church. Harking back to the joyful dance of bishops leading penitents into the church, the rite now ends with a prayer of thanksgiving for God's mercy, and may include the gesture of laying on of hands. After forty years, we struggle to claim this rite forged of memory, tradition, and grace. History tells us to be patient; we do not always recognize a treasure at first.—Rev. Casi siempre los pobres son más generosos que los ricos o la clase media. St. Teresa's next monthly Children's Participation Mass will be Sunday, November 8th at the 9:00 am.




All children are invited to help as greeters, collection basket ushers, or gift bearers at these Masses. Children in 4th grade and up can serve as lectors upon receiving preparation.

## Give It All

Pope Francis often speaks of the plight of the poor. He also speaks of the resources of the rich. It is those who have resources who react to the pope's words. They are the ones who have access to the Internet, media and so forth. The poor don't get to hear or read the pope's text. It is the "rich" who know that Pope Francis critiques the excesses of capitalism.

In an article that appeared in *The National Catholic Reporter* last summer, Hofstra University research associate Phyllis Zagano pointed out that in the lives of most of us in the United States and comparable countries, we have little contact with people who are the truly poor of the world, those who live on less than \$2.50 a day. Not having to live in such conditions ourselves, it is hard for us to fathom the plight of half the population of the earth.

Our lives are generally so far remved from abject poverty that we can go on easily from day to day continuing the lifestyle that we are accustomed to or that the media and advertisers propose to us. It is easy for us to be oblivious to the hurting members of our greater family throughout the world, and some even in our midst.

Pope Francis calls on us to examine our lifestyles, our values. He asks how it can be that it is front page news when the stock market drops a few points and there is no report when a person dies in the street.

Today's readings from 1



... there are so many ways that money and possessions control us. Social pressure, advertising and just ordinary greed control our lives and our decisions. We are repeatedly encouraged to get more.

Kings and Mark call us to examine our lifestyles and our values. What do we cling to? What holds us captive or possesses us?

Jesus says that the scribes clung to places of honor and wanted others' esteem. They behaved so they would look good and pious. Underneath this show, however, the scribes were insincere and even stole from the widows.

On the other hand, it was the widows whom God used to teach an important lesson. The widow of Zarephath risked the very last food she had to feed a stranger. God rewarded her with enough to live on for a year.

The widow who came to the temple treasury gave her very last two coins. At the same time, rich people put in large sums from their surplus wealth. Jesus said that the widow put in more than all the

other contributors because, from her poverty, she gave all she had.

The issue is: What controls us? Status and money controlled the scribes and the wealthy.

Those with much were possessed by their goods. The widows in both stories were not possessed by what they had, even though they had nothing else. They would part with what they had for the benefit of another.

Today there are so many ways that money and possessions control us. Social pressure, advertising and just ordinary greed control our lives and our decisions. We are repeatedly encouraged to get more. It becomes hard for us to part with what we have. Even when we do part with money or possessions, we want to make sure that we get a tax deduction for our gift. That is not a true gift from the heart. That is a calculation, a business deal with ourselves. We are looking to get something back for our contribution. If we do not need that tax deduction for living expenses, it, too, should be given. The money still possesses us if we must have something back for giving.

Our giving from our need will not change the world overnight. But it will change us. That's a start.
