

October Stewardship Numbers

- Food pantry service was up 46% this month distributing 1,169 bags of groceries;
- Loaves & Fishes volunteers and chefs served 22% more meals this month: 390 guests, 3,236 meals served year-to-date;
- 41 families were photographed for our photo directory;
- 21 volunteers served up 11 gallons of pasta, 5 gallons of sauce, 60 ft. of garlic bread, and over 200 meatballs:
- 32 donors gave life at our blood drive, which was run by six volunteers;
- Five people signed up for automated contributions via Give Central;
- 31 new individual or families have registered as parishioners (welcome!);
- Eight families hosted a post-Mass hospitality.

It costs more to help more. Our ministries are expanding and we are joyful to serve others. The budget for our social outreach programs has nearly doubled over the past few months as our programs increase their reach.



Treasures from Our Tradition

Advent is a time rich in family traditions. Many of them have been so effectively absorbed into our culture that their

religious origins are hidden. Some of us will set candles in our windows tonight. The custom began in Ireland during the so-called "penal" days, extending from 1691 to the "Catholic Emancipation" in 1829 and beyond. There were harsh penalties and fines for not attending the government church. Priests were forced into hiding, but people were resourceful and determined in guarding their faith. At Christmas, Irish families, particularly in the

countryside, placed a lighted candle in the cottage window and left the door unlatched, hoping that a priest might come by and celebrate the Christmas Mass for them.

The possibility of the Mass coming into the family home gave rise to other Irish customs at the beginning of Advent. The cottage received a fresh coat of whitewash, the threshold was swept especially clean, and fresh curtains were hung in the windows. The house was scrubbed until it gleamed, including all the pots and pans, and all garments and table linens were laundered. The custom of the Irish window candle was so admired in Catholic Europe that it was widely copied there, and now finds a welcome in households that may not exactly expect a priest to wander in!

Esta creencia tiene siglos de ser discutida por teólogos cristianos como Ambrosio, Agustín, Buenaventura y Tomás de Aquino, pero fue solo

con la Constitución *Ineffabilis Deus* del Papa Pió IX en 1854 que pasó a ser doctrina oficial de la Iglesia. La enseñanza de la Inmaculada Concepción de la Madre de Jesús insiste que María nació y permaneció sin pecado. Según el teólogo franciscano Juan Duns Escoto, María fue salvada del pecado desde el vientre de su madre Ana. De esta manera Jesús pudo salvarla no después de haber pecado como ha hecho con nosotros, sino antes de que ella hubiera pecado.

The Coming Kingdom




Open Our Hearts

Advent tells us to go forward. Hope is always in the future. Tradition points the way but can change in the face of surprises. God is free to do new things, and the biggest surprise of all is that God consults us and invites us to create the future together.

So there is no staying behind to defend the past or to think we can control the trajectory of history to keep everything the same. Doors open. A fresh spirit is upon us. Advent is about renewal and adaptation. We are pregnant with the future, and so birth is inevitable, bringing both tribulation and joy. We can only go forward.

A week from now, on December 8, Pope Francis will open the Holy Door of St. Peter's Basilica to begin a Year of Mercy for the church. He has invited us to get beyond the thickets of judgment and conflict that have characterized our church for too long. He speaks of pilgrimage, of missionaries of mercy, of forgiveness through the sacrament and in our personal relationships, of delving into the scriptures to recover the radical message of mercy.

If we want to travel light, like Mary on the road to visit her cousin Elizabeth, we must leave behind our baggage. Mary and Elizabeth carry the one thing necessary, expectation and promise, the forerunner leaping up in the presence of the savior. We hold the same mystery by our baptism, rebirth in water and the Spirit. "Mercy" is our nametag for

the year, our passport to freedom from old wounds, unfinished business, resentments and revenge that have stifled our souls. Time to let go and let God sort out the blame and heal the hurts so everyone can move on.

Change is difficult. Jesus saw that it would take an earthquake of new attitudes and the shaking of the heavens to bring forth the new creation out of the shell of the old. He told his disciples not to be afraid, but to stay awake, to be ready to move when crisis opened the way forward. Mercy is a revolution, for it changes the story. The landscape expands, mountains are razed, valleys filled in, a road appears in the wilderness. Stones are rolled back from old tombs, rivers once blocked flow again, deserts bloom

and trees, dormant or dead, blossom and bear fruit again.

A year of mercy is called a "jubilee," from a Hebrew word for ram's horn or trumpet. It was proclaimed every 25 or 50 years to remind the people about the covenant God formed with Israel when they were led up out of slavery. As God freely chose them and loved them, so they were to love one another. Debts were to be forgiven to restore the balance in the community between the rich and poor, the gifted and the needy. The land and the animals were to be allowed to rest so they could regenerate. It was a time of gratitude and generosity.

When Jesus returned after his baptism and time in the desert, he went to Nazareth, his hometown, and in the synagogue declared a jubilee year by reading Isaiah 61: "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me and has anointed me to announce good news to the poor."

Pope Francis is calling us to celebrate such a year in the church, just as Jesus did. This special time of openness to God's grace will mark 50 years since the close of the Second Vatican Council on Dec. 8, 1965, which is also the feast of the Immaculate Conception of Mary. May she open our hearts to Advent and to the mercy Jesus was born to give to the world.
