





## Treasures from Our Tradition

By now, trees are beginning to appear in living rooms throughout the parish. To a complete outsider to our culture, it must seem an odd thing indeed. The "roots" of this custom are in liturgical drama: religious plays performed in the churches and town squares of medieval Europe. The favorite theme for this time of year was the "Paradise Play," a dramatic history of the human race from the Garden of Eden to the birth of Jesus in Bethlehem. The language and music varied from place to place, but one fea-

ture was always in place: a great tree decorated

with apples. As a prop, it provided lots of material for the actors: the temptation, shelter for the manger, and a reminder of the wood of the cross. Soon people began to bring "paradise trees" into their homes, decorating them with gifts and lighted candles.

Many Germans give credit to Martin Luther for transforming the "Paradise Tree" into the evergreen Christmas tree. Walking home on a starry Advent night, he was so awed by the beauty of the night that he hauled a pine tree inside and decorated it with lighted candles. Americans were holdouts. It took until 1856 for the Commonwealth of Massachusetts to decriminalize Christmas decorations, the old Puritan dislikes falling before the waves of Irish and German immigrants with traditions firmly in hand! — Rev. España, este doctor de la Iglesia junto con Teresa de Ávila fue reformador de la Orden Carmelita. Muchas órdenes religiosas del siglo XV sufrieron grandes decadencias. Por eso mientras los Protestantes se separaban de la Iglesia, los religiosos descalzos, recoletos y observantes buscaban reformar órdenes religiosas, como la Orden de la Bienaventurada Virgen María del Monte Carmelo, uniéndose siempre más a la

Iglesia Romana.

Para los reformadores católicos quedarse en la Iglesia no fue fácil, ¡sin embargo se quedaron! Aunque sus reformas fueron apoyadas por los Papas, muchos de ellos como Juan de la Cruz tuvieron que aguantar muchas oposiciones y persecuciones para lograr sus reformas. Estas reformas ardían con el deseo de amar bien a Cristo Jesús y a su cuerpo que es la Iglesia.

praying that they may grow in their ability to discern what is righteous and good. And Luke speaks to us of John, who was foretold by Isaiah and who sings a similar song—"Prepare the way of the Lord," for salvation is at hand.







Tens of thousands of senior sisters, brothers, and religious order priests have dedicated their lives to sharing their faith.





# Hoping You'll Return

"It seems life has played a game on me, I'm lost in a sea of misery. My love has turned his back on me; heartache, why won't you let me be."

"Baby, have some mercy. Please don't make me beg on bended knees, oh please. Mercy, mercy, mercy. Please have mercy on me."

Can you imagine Queen Latifah singing that? Well, she does. This version was written by Gail and Vincent Levy. The interlude goes: "How can I face life without you? What would I do if we were through?"

The people of Israel could have sung this song, too. "Mercy, mercy, mercy." How often had they been overrun by invaders? How many times had they been carried off into slavery? How often had they been unfaithful?

Generations had suffered the sorrows and indignities of being overrun and losing all their possessions, even their temple of worship. As the song says, "It seems life has played a game on me, I'm lost in a sea of misery. My love has turned his back on me ..."

Centuries marched on. The people prayed to God for mercy, and God heard their cry. Baruch says, "God will bring them back to you. ... For God has commanded that every lofty mountain be made low and that the age-old depths and gorges be filled to level ground, that Israel may advance secure in the glory of God."

Mercy became a reality to the Israelites. "The forests and

every fragrant kind of tree have overshadowed Israel at God's command. For God is leading Israel in joy ... with his mercy and justice for company."

The people's lives were being restored through the mercy of God. But centuries later there was another takeover of the people of Israel, this time by the Romans. The people could again sing: "It seems life has played a game on me, I'm lost in a sea of misery." "Mercy, mercy, mercy, Please have mercy on me."

And then John the Baptist comes on the scene proclaiming, as did Baruch, "Every valley shall be filled and every mountain and hill shall be leveled. The windings shall be made straight and the rough ways smooth, and all mankind shall see the salvation of God." Mercy comes in Person ... the final restoration is set in motion. The Advent of the Lord is upon us.

In 2015 we, too, can sing: "I'm lost in a sea of misery. My love has turned his back on me: heartache, why won't you let me be." This time the Babylonians have not taken over the people of God; the Romans have not occupied our cities. Other challenges confront us: new forms of hatred and violence: the allure of the media and consumer goods; countless misplaced, refugee and migrant people; the hungry, the ill, the homeless, the elderly, those who are different or not acceptable in society.

"It seems life has played a game on me, I'm lost in a sea of misery. ... Baby, have some mercy. Mercy, mercy, mercy, please."

Pope Francis challenges us with a special opportunity to receive mercy and to give mercy. We all need mercy — to make this world the place it is meant to be.

The song says, "I wait for you every single night, hoping you'll return and make things right." We are now in Advent, waiting again on a new return of the Lord. This Tuesday we begin the Year of Mercy, receiving and giving mercy in old and new ways. The heartache, misery, loneliness of this world will be transformed by the mercy of God in Christ — mercy that is received and shared by us, his disciples.
