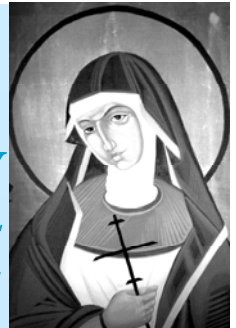

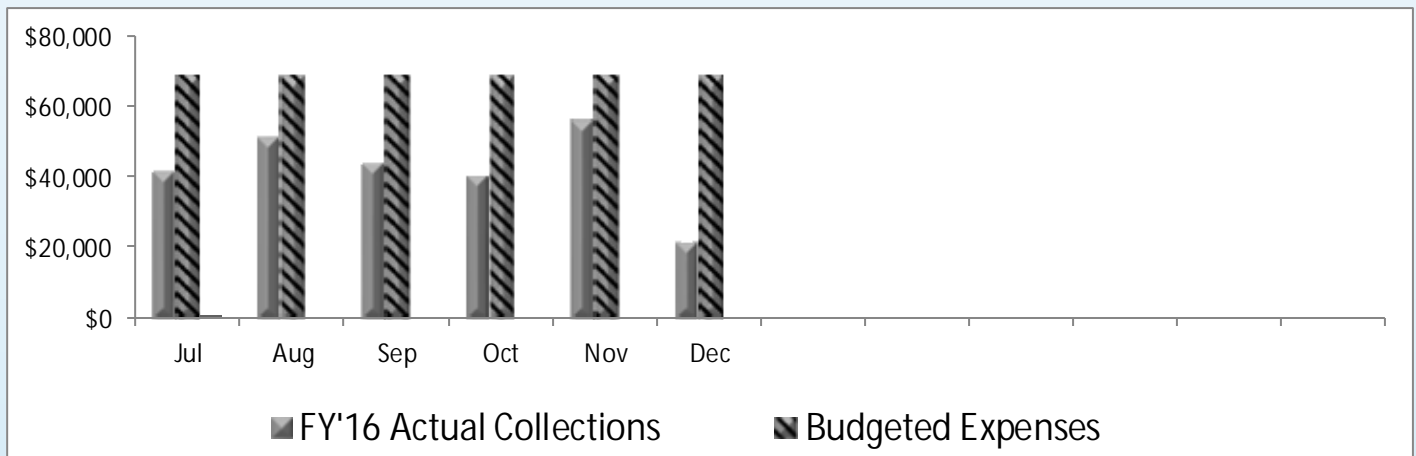

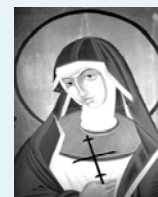

Treasures from Our Tradition

Many of our most treasured traditions link the liturgy of the church with the hearth of the home. The food on the table at certain feasts and fasts helps to extend the mystery into everyday life. Tonight, for example, many families of Italian heritage, especially those with links to the south of Italy, will settle down to the “Feast of the Seven Fishes,” or *La Vigilia*. It is a command performance for the whole family, as the saying goes: *Natale con I tuui, Pasqua conchi vuoi*, or “Christmas with your family, Easter with whomever you wish.” Seven different fish, some say one for each day of Mary and Joseph’s journey to Bethlehem, others say one for each sacrament, or one for each day of creation, are served. Eel and shrimp, lobster and crab, calamari, pasta with clam sauce, flounder and hake all abound, but most especially baccala, dried salted cod. Why? Many say that it is a way to pay homage to the beasts of the stable who witnessed the holy birth and relinquished their manger to make way for God. Tonight, if someone asks you to “pass the shrimp,” you’ll be able to shed a little light on a menu that is a delicious treasure in our tradition! — Rev. James Field, Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

A New Order

“O, Little Town of Bethlehem.” A Philadelphia clergyman named Phillips Brooks penned these popular words back in the mid-1800s, but the prophet Micah could have used them first. Micah knew that from small packages great treasures come. In today’s first reading, he knew that from tiny Bethlehem would come the Lord.

The writer in Hebrews explains that Christ came to us to do the will of God by establishing a new order and by becoming our perfect sacrifice. And Luke tells us that Elizabeth and John, the infant in her womb, understand that great and wondrous things are at hand with the coming of the Lord.

This is the Fourth Sunday of Advent. Soon we celebrate anew the fruit of Mary’s womb. As we are told in Hebrews, Jesus’ new order is being established even today. And as Micah proclaims, his greatness is reaching even now to the ends of the earth.

Jesús se está creando hoy mismo. Y como proclama Miqueas, su grandeza llega ahora mismo hasta los confines de la tierra.

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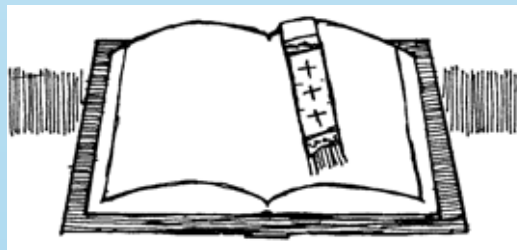

True Disciple

Why, out of all the women since the beginning of time, did God choose Mary to be the recipient of his most intimate of gifts? What was it about her that made her so appealing and so bewitching?

We usually refer to Mary as being “full of grace.” But the Greek word that Luke used literally means “favored to the greatest possible degree.” One author claims, “It was the strongest word Luke could use to show how much God loved Mary and prepared her.”

But, why her? What was it about this young girl that so attracted and enticed God? Something about this simple, teenager made God so excited he had to make contact. And so God sent his messenger, Gabriel, to announce to her the “good news of great joy.”

Perhaps it’s because Mary was an exemplar of faith, a prototype. She was a “being” person rather than a “doing” one. She was a “who-I-am” rather than a “what-I-do” type. She was a listener rather than a noisemaker.

The most admired American profile is just the opposite. We like the classic go-getter, the over-achiever. Doers get applause. “Being” people don’t. Consequently, we emphasize success and achievement.

In fact, with the advent of social media, we’re almost addicted now to telling it all on Facebook and LinkedIn and Instagram, and all the rest. Look at me. See what I’ve done. Check out my profile. Oooh and ahhh over my status.



Advent beckons to us all: It tells us to call a time-out on the field, find some quiet, and allow the word “reflect” to replace the demand to “get busy.”

Wow over my next picture.

That wasn’t Mary. She embraced simplicity. She experienced deep joy through being alone with the Lord in meditation. She was a contemplative, in the same line as those in religious communities like the Trappists and the Poor Clares and others who spend the majority of their day in quiet prayer — something many of us would consider “useless.”

Mary was a listener. She was perhaps one of the original believers in the value of the simple lifestyle. For example, when you look closely at her life, you notice that she wasn’t a preacher. She wasn’t an evangelizer. She wasn’t an activist.

Instead, she chose to perhaps be among the first to embrace the message later adopted by Francis of Assisi: “Preach the Gospel at all times, and when necessary, use words.”

Be present. Be open. Be available. Be receptive. Be quiet.

That’s the kind of person Mary was. And it was that collection of gifts that most likely enticed God.

Advent is a time in the church year to emphasize these same qualities. It’s a time dedicated to balance, to smoothing out all our busy-ness and fretful activity, to finding some rest in the midst of the holiday frenzy that accompanies Christmas.

Advent beckons to us all: It tells us to call a time-out on the field, find some quiet, and allow the word “reflect” to replace the demand to “get busy.” The Gospel of Luke recommends that we especially reflect on the person of Mary — the archetypal Christian, the summation of what the word “disciple” truly means: a listener.

Mary is the ultimate receiver of the divine in her life. She is the person who makes room for the Spirit to dwell within her, that same Spirit who caused Elizabeth to announce with wonder, “Nothing is impossible to God”; that same Spirit who will cause each of us to become pregnant with a Child who desperately wants to “dwell among us.” It can happen, if only, like Mary, we make room.
