

New Year's Resolution: Parish Transformation

Over the next few months our parish will be reflecting upon how our we are living out the mission of Christ in our community. I want us to think of this process as an extended retreat. We need to enter into this process with openness to where the Holy Spirit is calling us to go. The



final product of the Parish Transformation process will be a strategic plan that includes specific actions, goals, and timelines that we will want to accomplish. However, it is important that we remember this is not meant to be simply a corporate planning process. This is an opportunity for us to grow spiritually, both as individuals and as a parish, and to take the next step in our collective faith journey.

The Archdiocese is providing us with a facilitator (at no cost to the parish) to guide us through the process. Our facilitator will provide an independent perspective that will allow him/her to ask honest questions of us and challenge our assumptions. S/he will also be able to share with us ideas from over other 170 parishes that have already participated in Parish Transformation have come up with through their discussions.



Treasures from Our Tradition

Merry Christmas! Share that cheerful greeting with some folks today. They may wonder if you have had any Elvis sightings lately, attended Star Trek conventions, or were Cleopatra in a previous lifetime. Despite the skeptics, to-

day is solidly within the Christmas season. In fact, in some strands of the Christian tradition it represents the clearest manifestation of the mystery of the Incarnation. On Christmas Day, for example, the Gospel reading is the Prologue of John's Gospel, which reveals the glory of Christ shining through our humanity precisely in his baptism.

At any rate, this is an ancient feast, celebrated first in Egypt sixteen centuries ago. More than most other ancient people, the Egyptians understood the life giving properties of water. On this day, they drew water from the Nile, so central in the history of their people, and reserved it in honor. Many other places copied the custom, so that St. John Chrysostom wrote of people in Antioch gathering at midnight to collect flowing water into vessels they brought from home since "today there is a blessing on the water." At home for dinner tonight, decorate the table with beautiful bowls of water and white candles, toast one another with goblets of sparkling water, and light a Christmas candle in the window one last time.

Esta práctica de bautizar, no solo al nuevo creyente sino también a su mujer y a sus hijos, poco a poco, quedó solo en bautizar los niños del original creyente. El mundo en aquel tiempo estaba basado sobre la familia así como muchas culturas latinas de hoy.

El bautizo infantil nació en la Iglesia primitiva y al pasar de los siglos llegó a transformarse en un rito religioso muy importante en la catequesis del nuevo cristiano. El niño viste de ropita blanca que recuerda la presencia de Cristo en su alma, se le regala una vela que lo invita a brillar con la luz de Cristo y se le da una madrina o un padrino que le enseñará a vivir en Cristo. — Fray Gilberto Cavazos-Glz, OFM, Copyright © J. Manifesting the Spirit

The Christmas season closes this Sunday with the Baptism of the Lord. This feast is a sister to last week's feast of the Epiphany. Each of them celebrates an "epiphany," or a manifestation of the Spirit of God in Jesus—first in his birth, and now at his baptism.

The divine Spirit is manifested in all of the scriptures for this feast. Psalm 104 highlights the Spirit of God creating and renewing the earth, while the reading from Isaiah describes God restoring Israel. In Luke's account of the baptism of the Lord the Holy Spirit descends upon Jesus. And the letter to Titus reminds us that the Holy Spirit was "richly poured out" on us also, through the "bath of rebirth" (Titus 3:5, 6). Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

Rise and Walk...A Christmas Story

Vernon was late for the Christmas dinner at St. Teresa on December 25th.

Although the meal service was over and most guests had left the hall, a parishioner welcomed him and made sure that he would sit and be helped to the same nice warm dinner everybody else had enjoyed earlier.

He sat at a table where volunteers chatted and relaxed after serving the meals. They engaged in conversation with him: He was tired and discouraged, he said with tears in his eyes: In his difficult life, Christmas for the past two years had been a specially harrowing time: both his parents had been robbed and killed on Christmas day two years ago.

Hard news, a brutal eye opener on what reality can be like for others.

Tired. How could he not be? You are homeless, reluctant to go to the shelter and be robbed, unable to afford a proper roof over your head, and yet you try to stay out of the cold. Riding the train or the CTA all night will shelter you from the cold but, of course, you won't sleep and fatigue will accumulate.


I still see him, with his head lowered, slouched on the chair, without real shoes on his feet, just some old rubber clogs.

Around our table sitting with him a cross-generational sample of our parishioners: a father in his middle fifties with his two children, young adults in their twenties, another father, probably 10 years younger, my husband and I, seniors in our early seventies.

I asked Vernon, "What is it that you need most?"

"Not give up," he responds, "I am so tired."

I asked him, as I had other guests during the course of the meal :



"Do you have a cell phone, a number where we can reach you?" He said, "No I don't. I have asked for a government phone but it takes a long time."

Not having a phone makes it nearly impossible to get out of homelessness: no way to connect, find jobs, or contact helpful institutions. Hence, the government phone program.

As I was explaining that basic reality to the younger people at the table, I notice that one of the fathers is busy helping Vernon try on shoes that he had just handed to him. The shoes were badly needed; they fit and Vernon laced them up.

The other father said: "It would be no problem for me to get him a phone." As we discuss that option, one of the young women who is sitting with us leaves the table. "Believe it or not," Vernon says, "I have a college degree in social work." What happened? He shrugs and smiles sadly. "Things got bad."

We are making plans for him to come back for the next *Loaves and Fishes* on the following Friday (January 1st) when we will give him a phone. He agrees, sort of.

Then, the shoe-giving parishioner tells us: "Well, I think my daughter has located a phone for him, she will be back soon."

Things look good, I thought, and left the table to resume the job I was doing before Vernon's arrival.

A few minutes later, I see him, with a big smile on his face, holding a little shopping bag with a phone and instructions inside. He shares his phone number with me. His many issues are not solved, yet he has risen from the depth of despair, and is walking.

My Christmas story ends here, or does it? Maybe the reference to the paralyzed man in the Gospel has come to your mind and you are wondering on the good that we, and especially young people, can bring to others.

Maybe you will draw other lessons from its happy, but probably short-lived, ending.

Maybe you will ask yourself, as I do every day, how do we find a way to empower Vernon and many other like him, not only to rise but take real steps leading to durable autonomy?

Many do-gooders, sociologists, philanthropists confront this vastly complex issue. They study it and write about it. No easy answers seem to surface. Yet, maybe we can pool resources, research, and learn from projects that have succeeded.

Projects that serve the poor can not only give them food, but can also empower them through training, teamwork, and accountability. Projects that could start very modestly, with a minimal goal.

For inspiration, we can start by reading "Begging for Change - The dollars and sense of making non profits responsive, efficient, and rewarding for all" by Robert Egger, Harper Business Publishers.
