Next month's challenge: bring a friend!



Treasures from Our Tradition

Although our tradition carries a long memory of marriage as a sacrament, it may surprise you to learn that for nearly eleven centuries, there was no single wedding ceremony approved for use in the Church. While we have evidence of

priests blessing marriages as early as the second century, in the early period church leaders relied on civil authorities to manage marriage for everyone in society. In most cases, society yielded its authority to sanction marriage to the male heads of households.

From ancient times, marriage had been a family affair, managed by the father of the family, who acted as priest and guardian of family tradition.

Each head wanted to keep the family gods alive, and so he would arrange for brides for his sons, paying a "bride price" as compensation for the loss of a skilled household worker. As creepy as that sounds, it was a step up from the kidnapping practice of earlier years. Even after the kidnapping raids stopped, the customs remained. Every wedding contained the ritualized kidnapping of the bride, the husband abducting his bride from the festivities, carrying her over the threshold to prevent her father's gods from following her into her new religion. There, he fed her a piece of "sacred cake," initiating her into a new way of life. It's fascinating to see how customs endure, long after we have completely rejected the values and attitudes they originally expressed!

Surprises

Life is full of surprises, some pleasant, some not. The

scriptures are filled with stories of God's surprises cropping up when they are least expected: younger children obtaining the inheritance; the lowliest being seated highest up; an itinerant preacher, killed like a criminal, exalted to eternal, heavenly glory.

Anybody who has planned a wedding or similar event knows that they are filled with opportunities for surprises. For the bridegroom in today's Gospel story, who has no direct contact with Jesus, the pleasant surprise came because somebody else paid attention and had faith in Jesus.

We may think that the point of today's familiar story of the wedding at Cana is that when we have faith in Jesus, our lives will be pleasantly changed. A Christian, however, needs to have a broader perspective and realize that to have faith in Christ means that somebody's life—not necessarily our own—will be surprised for the better. Copyright © J. 





Reflection

January 17 — January 23

"Do whatever he tells you." (John 2:5)

Everybody loves a wedding. The affection so ardently expressed by the bride and groom, the festive dresses, the handsome tuxes, the glorious flowers, the sacred music, the thrilled gathering of family and friends, the heartwarming laughter that fills the halls of the reception, the spontaneous dancing that motivates everyone to join in ... all of it creates a moment of unforgettable joy and delight.

And let's not forget the wine. Jesus certainly didn't!

John, the author of this Gospel reading, tells us that the God whom Jesus reveals first broke into human history at a wedding feast — in the midst of all the joy and dancing and laughter. John even suggests that this supreme expression of human love best reveals who God is, the kind of God that he is, as well as the kind of communion that can exist between God and a human being.

It's like the abundant overflowing of wine. But it also tells us something more. And it's through the words of Mary, Jesus' mother, that we find what that "more" is.

In the midst of all the festive happiness, it seems that there's a problem. Mary is the first to notice it and so she immediately informs Jesus that something very important is missing: the wine.

Jesus' response is strikingly abrupt, even rude: "Woman, how does your concern affect me?" This

is not the type of response one would expect from a son to a mother, especially Jesus to Mary.

But, if the reply of Jesus to his mother is surprising, even more so is her reaction to it. Mary does not allow it to deter her. Instead, she tells the servants — and, by extension, you and me — "Do whatever he tells you."

By doing what she did, Mary became the first person to demonstrate that the correct response to the presence of Jesus is trust — trust in his word; trust in his self-surrender; trust in his relationship with Abba, his Father. Her trust, in fact, sets the stage for Jesus' first miracle. In doing so, the mother of Jesus is the first to show each of us what true belief in Jesus looks like. It looks like a trust that is unconditional, even in the face of apparent rejection.

Mary also helps us to understand the meaning of the action Jesus takes as a result of her direct intercession. The old wine of God's message through Moses was not enough. The stone jars filled with water for ritual washings give way to the new dispensation of grace, which flows abundantly like wine at a wedding feast.

The first covenant, focused on obedience to the Law, can only take the community so far, and then a new covenant in grace is revealed. Moses the Lawgiver steps aside for Jesus the Bridegroom. Water keeps us alive, but love gives us life. People need water, but also the "new wine," a new view of God and the gift of God's unconditional love flowing in our lives and overflowing into the lives of others.

The water into wine symbolizes Jesus' gift that transforms us. This wine gives joy to our hearts, focuses our minds, strengthens our wills and moves us beyond the stone jars of routine filled with the water of duty to feel again the joy of the wedding dance.

Mary, the compassionate mother, sees the couple's need and moves with confidence to meet it. She is our model and inspiration. Her words to us are simply, "Do whatever he tells you."
