


Kerry O'Brien: Carpenter and owner of Kiwi Carpenters, Ltd is using his woodworking skills to build coat racks for the parish center.

Treasures from Our Tradition

Ash Wednesday is not observed by Eastern Christians, perhaps because, at least in Orthodox practice, weekdays are not proper days for the Divine Liturgy. Typically, "Great Lent" has a bit of a prelude. On "Meatfare Sunday" the

faithful have their last chance to eat meat for the entire period of Great Lent. A week later,

"Cheesefare Sunday" has dairy on the menu for the last time until *Pascha* (Easter). At twilight on Cheesefare Sunday, officially called "Sunday of Forgiveness." the church gathers for

"Forgiveness Vespers." The faithful identify with Adam and Eve, forgiving one another in order to experience God's forgiveness. The desire to set aside all bitterness, and to achieve har-

mony and reconciliation in the family and with one's neighbors gives a remarkable energy to the transition into the days of penitence. At the end of the vespers liturgy, the décor of the church is changed to reflect the new season.

How is your Lenten fast going? Imagine the Eastern tradition. No meat, no fish, no dairy, no wine or oil. Some traditions permit vegetable oil; everyone goes without olive oil. Happily, strict fasting is not permitted on the Sabbath or the Lord's Day, so on Saturday and Sunday the fast is somewhat mitigated, and wine and oil are allowed. If the Feast of the Annunication falls during Great Lent, then fish may be served. — Rev. James Field, Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

Esto se hace en un espíritu de mutualidad entre los hijos e hijas del creador.





Lenten Regulations

Abstinence from meat is to be observed by all Catholics 14 years old and older on Ash Wednesday and on all Fridays in Lent.

Pantry

Fasting is to be observed on Ash Wednesday by all Catho-

lics 18 years old but not yet 59. Those who are bound by this may take only one full meal. Two smaller meals are permitted if necessary to maintain strength according to one's needs, but eating solid food between meals is not permitted.

The Paschal fast, as well as abstinence, are prescribed for Good Friday and encouraged for Holy Saturday.

Regulaciones de Cuaresma

La abstinencia de carne es para ser observado por todos los católicos de 14 años o mayores en el Miércoles de Ceniza y todos los viernes de Cuaresma.

El ayuno es para ser observado el miércoles de ceniza por todos los católicos de 18



años, pero aún no 59. Los que están obligados por la presente puede tomar sólo una comida completa. Dos comidas más pequeñas se permiten si es necesario para mantener la fuerza de acuerdo a las necesidades de uno, pero comer alimentos sólidos entre comidas no está permitido.

El ayuno, así como la abstinencia Pascual, se prescriben para el Viernes Santo y alentó para el Sábado Santo.

Lectio Divina Process



- **1. Read** Take your time and read the passage. Read the passage a second time. Listen for words or phrases that strike you, and listen in your heart. What does the text say that everyone should understand?
- **2.** Think Read the passage again, slowly. Take your time to consider what words or phrases strike you. What does the text say to me, today, and to my life?
- **3. Pray** Read the passage again, slowly. Consider now how God has spoken to you and respond back to Him. What can I say to the Lord in response to His word? What conversion of the mind, heart, and life is the Lord asking of me?
- **4. Rest** Now take some time to simply remain in the presence of God.
