

Treasures from Our Tradition

What day is today? Ask most folks strolling home from church today and they will reply "Palm Sunday." Not too long ago, to-

day was known as the "Second Sunday of the Passion," and in 1970 it was renamed "Passion Sunday." This made some sense, since the procession recalling Christ's entry into Jerusalem is usually only celebrated once in a parish on this day, but the Passion is proclaimed solemnly at every liturgy. In its most recent incarnation, the name for this day includes both aspects of the celebration: "Palm Sunday of the Passion of the Lord." In the United States today, most worshipers are provided with palm branches, although in northern Europe pussy willows are favored, and in Italy olive branches are the norm.

When our calendar was reformed, the entire structure of the week to come was revised even as the traditional name, "Holy Week," was retained. The major benefit of the restructuring of our calendar is to help us see that the Triduum, the great three days beginning at sunset this Thursday and extending until sunset on Easter Sunday, is at the heart of the Christian life.

Today, as you ponder the Lord's Passion, you may consider your response to so great a gift. Centuries ago, good Christians vowed to go on pilgrimage to Jerusalem. Today, at least once in your lifetime, promise to participate faithfully in the liturgies. Now begins the Church's annual baptismal retreat: don't be left out! — Rev. James Field, Copyright \odot J. Tradiciones de Nuestra Fe

La liturgia oficial de la Iglesia para el Domingo de Ramos es algo paradójica. Entramos proclamando Hosannas con cantos y

vítores y al poco tiempo estamos gritando: "¡crucificalo, crucificalo!" Según el rito la lectura del Evangelio y la consagración de la Eucaristía se hacen dentro del templo, pero se comienza afuera del templo con la bendición de los ramos.

En Estados Unidos y otros países latinoamericanos se usan palmas en lugar de ramos. En Europa, normalmente, se usan ramos de olivos. Últimamente en Colombia para proteger la palma de cera del Quindío, se les ha pedido a los fieles que usen ramitas de plantas o ramos de flores. Estoy de

acuerdo hay que proteger el ambiente, pero admito que prefiero las palmas, ya que es difícil poner un ramo de olivo o de flores detrás de una imagen sagrada colgada en la pared. Esta es una costumbre latina que nos recuerda que los "hosannas" y el "crucificalo" del domingo de ramos nos acompañan todos los días del año. — Fray Gilberto Cavazos-Glz, OFM, Copyright © J. S. Passion

The word "passion" connotes deep, focused engagement. It also relates to passivity, interestingly. The deeply passionate person in the Gospel narrative from Luke is Jesus. He appears passive, but he is not. He is wholly self-possessed and wholly present for the one day that begins on Thursday evening at his last meal with his apostles and ends with his burial before sunset the next day. Then follows the long Sabbath silence.

The narrative of the Passion is read whole and without pause on the Palm

Sunday of the Passion. This story, found in each of the Gospels, is unchanging. We are the ones who change. Each year, we bring ourselves with another year's history to hear and heed the story we so badly need. Life has its way with us, and we look again to the Passion narratives to learn to follow. 

Palms Tell the Story

When I was young, I used to spend a lot of time at my grandma's house. She was a refugee from Ireland, who, like so many others, came to this country to find work.

To this day, one thing in particular stands out in my mind whenever I think about my grandma: her deep faith. On every wall of her house, for example, it seemed there were pictures of the Sacred Heart of Jesus and the Immaculate Heart of Mary and the baby Jesus, and a multitude of other faith-related artworks that were popular at that time.

But what caught my eye even as a kid was that these works of art were often enhanced by the presence of a single palm leaf—leaves like the ones we hold in our hands on this Sunday.

I later came to realize that these same palm leaves show up in the unlikeliest of places: behind bedroom mirrors, tucked away in taxicab visors, woven into crosses, and placed behind crucifixes and other holy pictures.

All of this has made me wonder why these palms are so important to people, why bits of palm have been given so much prominence. What is it about them?

Maybe it's because these simple palms remind us of The Greatest Story Ever Told — a story so boundless that we Christians repeat it every year and revere it as the most significant spiritual event that ever took place. But maybe it's also because the palms go even further than that. These palms also tell

our story, the story of our own faith life.

Five weeks ago, we received ashes on our foreheads and were once again reminded of our sinfulness and our need for a radical change in our lives. But those ashes did not just come from the bottom of someone's fireplace. They were the result of blessed burned palms.

Today we are five weeks older. The palms we now hold in our hands are new green leaves, reminding us that we are a part of this great story; that it isn't just something that took place 2,000 years ago; that this drama is ongoing; and that we are each involved in our own way in being a part of the conspiracy and the betrayal that happened that night.

These palms can remind us, for example, that we have played the role of Peter in our own lives: lying and denying. They can remind us that we have played the role of John: abandoning. They can remind us that we have played the role of all the rest: arguing about who among us is the greatest. They can even remind us that we have played the role of Judas: betraying.

But here's the good news about these palms: They can also remind us of the miracle of reconciliation that can be ours.

They can do that by reminding us of that great meal we celebrate together to this day, the meal at which Jesus told us, "I am among you as one who serves." They can do that by reminding us of Jesus' words of indescribable mercy spoken to the thieves crucified on either side of him: "Today you will be with me in Paradise."

These palms that five weeks ago reminded us that we are dust, and to dust we will return, now remind us that we are also graced by love, an abundant love that goes before us and beckons us to follow.

Lent begins with palms and ends with palms. The question is: What will we do with their promise and their challenge?
