## Parish Transformation Update

We recently began our Parish Transformation process at Saint Teresa of Avila. Over 20 parishioners, along with Father Frank, have committed themselves to weekly meetings to establish the mission and vision of our parish and create an action plan to fulfill them. This transformation is facilitated by the



Archdiocese of Chicago, and we follow in the footsteps of other parishes in the diocese who have successfully completed this process. We would like to keep the entire Saint Teresa community involved through regular updates in our bulletin.

Our first meeting laid the plans for our work ahead. Maureen, our facilitator from the Archdiocese, shared with us the overall objectives of this project - to create a mission narrative that will guide our parish to create and prioritize a meaningful action plan for our community. Maureen also had the opportunity to hear about Saint Teresa of Avila from the committee members: Who was Saint Teresa? What is the history of our parish? What are our current ministries? Who attends our church and partakes in the Sacraments? What is the financial situation in our parish?

The second meeting kicked off with small group discussions on the mission and ministry of Jesus. As we talked about His mission of salvation, healing, love, and inclusion, we thought about what we currently do at Saint Teresa's to follow in His footsteps. We also identified existing challenges. We reviewed the results from the Parish Transformation survey to explore areas of strength and areas of need. Thank you to all who filled out this survey.



Sunday is a "Little Easter." Today, after several decades of intense liturgical reform, it is more proper to think of today as a "Big Sunday." On every Sunday of the year, the Church is obliged to assemble, keeping the day holy. In most places, we hardly attain the goal of gathering all who are in Christ by baptism. Look around today and see what a Big Sunday looks like!

Our tradition speaks of remembering, anamnesis, as the antidote to "amnesia," the tragic forgetting of who God is and who we are as

God's most beloved creation. On this Easter day, we are at our very best. We remember who God is, and we remember who we are in God's eyes: beloved sons and daughters, reborn to eternal life in baptismal waters. We rekindle our candles and reclaim our baptismal promises. As a "Big Sunday," today also reflects the character of festivity and leisure that should mark every Lord's Day. We wear "Sunday best" today, and we may take some time, especially in the northern states, to stroll through a budding garden. 



## At the Dawn

The Gospel for Easter Day is really the culmination of the rich scriptural narrative from the Vigil service the night before. Salvation history comes full circle from the Garden of Eden, where sin brought death into the world, to the garden tomb of Jesus, the new Adam.

Mary of Magdala is the first witness to the resurrection as she arrives at first light to discover the empty tomb. She runs to find Peter, representing the church, and the Beloved Disciple, who shows that the heart sees before the mind understands. They depart, leaving Mary in tearful bewilderment. But her baptism of tears will end in the Easter proclamation that love is truly stronger than death. Jesus is alive, and he is now the source of life for us all.

Our own Easter faith must make the same journey to faith through love, even though all we see at first is loss. Death appears to triumph, but first light reveals that something mysterious has happened here. These burial cloths and the face cloth rolled up nearby tell a different story. Death could not contain Jesus; no winding shroud or heavy stone could keep him entombed. Liberation has occurred, a new and final Exodus that confirms that death is not the end. Our older brother Jesus has made passage through death to eternal life and has opened up the way for all those who follow him.

How appropriate that we hear this proclamation at Eucharist, where Jesus is always among us.



Death appears to triumph, but first light reveals that something mysterious has happened here. These burial cloths and the face cloth rolled up nearby tell a different story.

His Real Presence in the Word, in the bread and wine and in one another, reveals our holy Communion as the risen body of Christ.

Jesus is now in the world through us and wherever his Spirit moves and inspires people. We will hear further accounts of the appearance of the risen Jesus — to Mary and the other women, to the disciples on the road to Emmaus, to the apostles in the upper room and on the shore of the Sea of Galilee. We will be challenged to find him in the world, especially in the poor. The stranger on the road, welcomed to our table, will reveal Jesus. The wounded neighbor, crucified by poverty and injustice for the sins of the world, will reveal Jesus.

The liturgy gives us 50 days to find Jesus in the Word, in the breaking of the bread and the sharing of the cup, in our prayers and in our going forth to serve others. We are formed and prepared for Pente-

cost by entering the sacred rites and by looking for Jesus in our world. Everything reveals God, and everywhere is holy ground; all our thoughts, words and actions are illuminated by grace and overflow with new life.

The Holy Week we began in sorrow ends in joy. The altar table of Jesus' self-sacrificing love is strong enough to bear our suffering and despair, our unanswered prayers and inexplicable losses. In retelling the story of Jesus, our minds are opened and our hearts burn within us. What we bring to God through Jesus is consecrated and transformed. The broken lives we place on the altar, we take up again suffused with light and power.

Easter sets our lives in motion. The first disciples ran to and from the tomb. Two disciples ran all the way from Emmaus to Jerusalem to tell the others they had seen the Lord. The first faith community, broken by failure and sorrow, regrouped on Easter Sunday to begin their mission to the world. A new day has dawned, for them and for

"This is the day the Lord has made, let us rejoice and be glad" (Psalm 118).
