

Many thanks to everyone who came out to the St. Patrick's party for refugees. Thanks to the generosity of our commu-




nity we will be sponsoring a refugee family very soon.





Treasures from Our Tradition

When the Protestant Reformation took hold, the fairly recent achievements of the Church in regard to the sacrament of marriage were reviewed with a critical, reforming eye. In

general, Protestants returned to an earlier view that marriage was a civil matter.

In the Catholic Church, the Council of Trent took the question up in 1563, and decided to shore up its teaching on the sacramentality of marriage. They identified many threats to this, including secret marriages and easy divorce. So they enacted laws that still govern our practice today: to be valid, marriage consent must be exchanged in the presence of a priest and two witnesses. Ever

since Trent, marriages must also be announced three weeks in advance to the community, and recorded in a register. In some places in the world, the "banns" are still posted in the public square. In the United States, parishes sometimes publish the "banns" in the bulletin.

Anyone who has ever watched a soap opera has seen the standard scene of a minister announcing gravely, "If there is anyone here present who sees any reason why these two should not be married . . ." This bit of drama has no place in the Catholic liturgy, but survives among Protestants who broke with us before Trent edited this cliffhanger out of our public prayer. — Rev. extendiendo esta devoción desde 1978 cuando fue aprobada por el Papa Paulo VI. En todas partes se puede encontrar la imagen de la Divina Misericordia, Jesús de pie con rayos rojos y blanco-azules que brillan desde su corazón hacia el mundo. Lleva el lema: Jesús, confío en ti.

La finalidad de esta devoción es recordar al pecador que la misericordia de Dios es infinita e inagotable. Es una misericordia que debemos imitar para que la paz pueda reinar en nuestros corazones y en nuestra tierra. — Fray Gilberto Cavazos-Glz, OFM, Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

Joining the Company of Believers

What will help you to believe? Today's scripture

readings tell of faith and doubt. They offer stories "recorded to help you believe," as the passage from John's Gospel (20:31) remarks today. There is an urgency about this. On this Second Sunday of Easter we are challenged to join the company of believers—countless men and women who witnessed the power of the apostles' faith.

There is no doubt that this power comes from Jesus Christ. The second reading, from the book of Revelation, reports John's mystical vision of the Son of Man, who proclaims, "Once I

was dead, but now I live" (Revelation 1:18). The Gospel gathers everyone but Thomas to see the Risen Jesus and receive the Holy Spirit from him. Like Thomas, we who have come along later must have faith so that we can have life. Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

Cycle of Divine Life


When a close friend or family member has died, many of us function on "automatic pilot" for days or even weeks. We operate on memories, on previous feelings and convictions. It is not easy for us to adjust to the new reality — that our loved one is no longer with us. We ask: "How do I live life now? The old and familiar are gone. How do I carry on?"

The Gospel this Sunday reflects some of the feelings of Jesus'

closest disciples shortly after his painful death. The scene portrays a range of thoughts and emotions about what had happened. Of course, from a distance, it is impossible to be certain what went on in the souls and psyches of the disciples. Perhaps a good measure would be to ask ourselves what would be going on inside of us in these circumstances.

The disciples did not expect the physical presence of Jesus. Their beloved teacher and friend had been killed two days before. All except one of them had abandoned him; one had denied knowing him; and another, who was not there in the upper room, had betrayed him. An additional disciple, Thomas, did not show up that day. Perhaps he was so overcome with grief that he had to be alone with himself. We are not told.

The doors to the room were locked "for fear of the Jews." It is true that the disciples could have feared that what had happened to Jesus could befall them, as well. It

is also true that when these lines were written 60 or more years later, the Christian community was suffering rejection by the Jewish community. Their reading of these lines about Jesus' encounter with the disciples would give them hope.

In the upper room, the disciples may well have been feeling guilty for abandoning Jesus. In Pope Francis' vision, this upper room that night was like a field hospital. The wounded disciples were assembled in need of care. The divine physician enters the scene and administers the first dose of healing — a merciful and welcome dose of inner peace.

You and I need to welcome this divine physician into our lives to administer the peace of his care and healing to our own souls. And we need to keep doing this. If we are at peace in ourselves, we can be at peace with others and with whatever life throws at us. That is the way it was with the disciples. But Jesus' field hospital ministry is not going to send the healed and restored disciples home to do nothing. Immediately, he reminds them of what they heard before but had forgotten: "As the Father has sent me, so I send you." That little twoletter word, "as," set it up for the disciples and their followers all the way down to us. We are sent "as," or "just like" the Father has sent Jesus; the disciples are brought into the mission and ministry of the Savior. No wiggle room here. Get out of the field hospital and do Jesus' work of bringing others in and giving them the gifts of God's mercy and healing. Then they can repeat the process.

To seal all this, Jesus takes them back to the foundation of the world. God's Spirit breathed life, and creation lived with the life of God. Jesus repeats that scene and breathes new life into the disciples. They are then sent forth.

We pick it up here today. The Jubilee of Mercy is Jesus alive and well in the church, bringing care and healing ... and sending. The cycle of divine life goes on as it passes through us.
