



Treasures from Our Tradition

From the earliest centuries, we know that some Christian women desired to vow themselves to a celibate life to pray and serve. Some, but by no means everyone, wanted a kind

of monastic life. Others wanted to stay in the family home. By the fourth century, the church was celebrating the "Consecration of Virgins," a rite performed by the bishop, and involving a "veiling" of the woman. It was looked upon as a form of marriage with Christ, partly because in the culture of the day a woman's status in society was linked to a man. The prayers and ritual for the consecration of virgins were exactly the same as the prayers and ritual for the consecra-

tion of a bride on her wedding day. The public character of the rite gave the bishop the opportunity to commend the virgin to the faithful, and to threaten with punishment anyone who tried to turn her from her commitment. Eventually, the rite fell into disuse for women living in the world, and was reserved for nuns. The Second Vatican Council directed that it be revived and restored, and in nearly every diocese, single women have embraced this form of consecrated life. — Rev. James Field, Copyright © J. S. > libro de oraciones, un rosario y un escapulario. Como recuerdo del evento, muchos comulgantes regalan a sus amigos y parientes alguna estampita religiosa.

Las estampitas llevan imágenes de Jesucristo, la Virgen, los ángeles o los santos y son muy populares entre los latinos. Las ponemos en nuestros autos, en libros como la Biblia o libros de oración. Las tenemos en altarcitos domésticos o metidos en los marcos

de las fotos de nuestros seres queridos.

Muchos critican esta práctica recordando que en Éxodo 20:3-5, Dios prohibió el uso de ídolos. Esto la Iglesia católica nunca lo ha negado, pero recuerda que Dios también pidió imágenes de ángeles para la arca de la alianza (Éxodo 25: 17). En Números 21:8 mandó hacer una imagen milagrosa de una serpiente. Ninguna de esas imágenes es considerada un ídolo porque son imágenes al servicio de Dios y recuerdo de su presencia igual que las estampitas e imágenes religiosas. — Fray Gilberto Cavazos-Giz, OFM, Copyright © J. 
The powerful imagery of John's vision in the second reading from the book of Revelation shows us the company we keep when we have

faith in the name of Jesus. We join all living creatures, "countless in number" from "heaven, earth, under the earth, in the sea; everything in the universe" (Revelation 5:11, 13).

The dignity and majesty described in each reading are in stark contrast to the dark and pitiful image of Peter and the other apostles at the time of Jesus' arrest, trial, and crucifixion. What a relief that we can all be redeemed so completely! Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.



Our SPRED group is but one brick in our greater St. Teresa community, We want to share the gift of our love and invite you to our annual SPRED mass.





An Easter Reprise

I was thrilled by the musical "West Side Story" when I first saw it years ago. Early in the story Tony and Maria sing a romantic ballad, "Tonight." Later in the show they sing a reprise of the same melody. This time it takes on a different tone. Their hopeful optimism is threatened by street gang violence.

In literature and music, a reprise can take many forms. The reprise shows a development of a character or theme. It can be positive or negative, depending on the story.

There are a number of reprises in the Gospels. The Gospel writers were able to write in this way because they were writing many decades after the historical incidents and were aware of developments in the story.

In the events we hear recounted today, Jesus and seven disciples are at the Sea of Tiberias. The seven are fishing. This story is a reprise of a similar incident recorded earlier in which the disciples were also fishing. Then, they had caught nothing. In each case, Jesus instructs the disciples where to fish ... and the result is an astoundingly large catch.

In the first instance, Jesus used the catch to tell the disciples that they would become "fishers of people." They would bring into the reign of God those who would follow the Lord.

The disciples left everything and followed Jesus.

In the reprise of the catch of fish, Jesus builds on the teachings of the earlier catch. The disciples are ready for a new understanding and a new calling. First, we note that this whole scene takes place in the setting of hospitality. This is a Eucharistic scene. Jesus is the host who welcomes and feeds the guests. "A charcoal fire with fish and bread" was very wel-

on the sea.

Looking at the course of events and dialogue in this scene, we find a number of important reasons that this was added at the end of John's Gospel (whose first conclusion we read last week).

First, Jesus makes it clear that, as the risen Lord, he is truly a risen human person, not a spirit-person or an apparition. He builds a fire, prepares a meal and has breakfast with them.

Next, the catch of fish gives a lesson. The enormous quantity of fish is a reminder of the gracious bounty of

God. Always with Jesus, there is not just enough, there is abundance, even leftovers.

Finally, the dialogue between Jesus and Peter restates that Peter is the leader of the disciples. That fact itself is a gracious gift. Peter denied Jesus three times. Peter may now have doubts as to his role among the disciples. Jesus makes it clear that he knows Peter's failures and that, in his characteristic love and mercy, he forgives Peter and restores him to his role of leadership. The threefold "Do you love me" gives Peter the opportunity to reaffirm his love and commitment to Jesus.

Jesus had a call and a role for each disciple. In his resurrected presence among them, he strengthened their relationship to him and their resolve to carry on the mission he had begun. That mission was now theirs. It is now ours.

Jesus will reprise his encounter at the Sea of Tiberias with us, too, from time to time. In awareness and prayer, we will recognize Jesus standing on the shore of wherever we are in life. He will be gracious, show us mercy and strengthen us in the work he come to fishers who had spent all night has set out for each of us. We can respond with Peter, "Lord, you know everything; you know that I love you." He will say: "Follow me."
