# **Shoe Drive for Immigrants**



## **Treasures from Our Tradition**

Just as the early church consecrated women living alone in the world, today that consecration is available to women who take solemn vows as cloistered nuns (different from

religious sisters), women who follow a way of life in communities called "secular institutes," and laywomen. Oddly, the ritual is not permitted for religious sisters. The prayers talk about the woman's self-gift to Christ, and her self-gift to the Church. Up until recent years, this was a solemn ceremony performed only for cloistered nuns under certain circumstances. In its new form, we have a ritual that revives a very ancient and little-known way of life. Today, a woman

can live independently at home, without association with any religious sisterhood or institute, yet be consecrated to holiness and service. Normally, a ring and/or a veil may be given in the liturgy of consecration. It is a rite very different from religious profession, where the sister makes promises or vows, and is rather an expression of approval and blessing for a way of life already embraced. Unlike ancient times, which valued actual virginity, the new rite may be celebrated for anyone provided there has never been a marriage and the woman has always lived a virtuous life. — Rev. ## Tradiciones de Nuestra Fe

El 25 de abril la Iglesia conmemora a Pedro de Betancur (1626–1667). Originalmente de las Islas Canarias, a la edad de 24, se trasladó a Cuba. En 1651 llegó a Guatemala

con la ambición de predicar a Cristo. Esto lo hizo, no como sacerdote ni religioso. El fue como laico, reconociendo su deber bautismal de evangelizar.

En 1655 ingresó en la Orden Seglar Franciscana y como laico quiso poner en práctica la espiritualidad franciscana, ayudando a los pobres. Con su propio pan o casa el alimentaba al hambriento y amparaba al indigente. A todos recordaba la necesidad de la

salvación y en la simplicidad de su mensaje derretía el egoísmo de los ricos. Les abría el corazón enseñándoles a compartir con los más pequeños de sus hermanos y hermanas.

Eventualmente su nobleza de espíritu atrajo a hombres y mujeres que deseaban compartir su apostolado y fundó la Orden Betlehemita. También fundó la primera escuela de niños en Centro América convirtiéndose en el alfabetizador de Guatemala. Así dio ejemplo de lo que la Iglesia debe hacer por el pobre y marginado. — Fray Gilberto Cavazos-Glz, OFM, Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

It is faith, not birthright, that makes us part of the company of believers. In the passage from the book of Revelation we learn that the flock that follows this Lamb of God will also be washed in his blood. They will endure a time of trial before they enjoy eternal life. 



# Hear and Follow


When today's older Catholics were voung, almost everything we learned about our faith was in catechisms. These learning tools were intended to describe our faith in ways beginners would understand, memorize and repeat.

Catechisms were constructed in a question/answer format. They were successful learning tools with a measurable outcome, but in retrospect they had at least one glaring flaw: They referred to the Bible but seldom quoted the words of the Bible.

I can still remember my first college theology class. It revolved entirely around reading and studying the Bible. What an eye-opener! I was stunned by the freshness, the depth and the power of such rich material. It was like hearing the Original Voice instead of about it.

Then came another new experience: a pope — Pope John XXIII — encouraging us to read the Bible, study it, pray from it. The that he and God are totally united Second Vatican Council restored the Bible to its place as the primary source of all theology and tradition. Pope John reassured us that the truth of the Gospel had not changed but that our understanding of it was growing.

The council gave fresh impetus to the study of God's word, and this influenced our Catholic approach to spirituality, meditation and prayer. A renewed focus on the Liturgy of the Word at Mass restored regular preaching, especially about practicing justice in the world.



When we *listen* deeply through meditating on God's Word, then we will be motivated and strengthened to follow.

Today's Gospel reading, for example, gives us a scene fraught with threat and conflict. The issue is Jesus' claim that "I and the Father are one." Jesus is boldly asserting and that all those who "hear" Jesus and "follow" Jesus are hearing and following God.

To the people of the synagogue, this was utter blasphemy. They were so incensed that they wanted to stone Jesus, (John 10:31-33).

What this passage from the Bible emphasizes is that we need to grasp as clearly as we can the two characteristics Jesus considers indispensable for those who call themselves members of his flock: "My sheep hear my voice ... and they follow me."

#### Hear and Follow

First, we must "hear" Jesus. What better way to do that than by reading and absorbing his teachings in the Gospels; in the letters of Paul; in the marvelous Exodus tales of rescue from enslavement; in the preaching of the prophets about how mercy, not sacrifice, is most pleasing to God; and in the promise contained in the hope for One who will come to liberate us from suffering and death?

And then we must take up the most difficult task of all: We must follow. Not just worship. Not just praise. We must undertake the hard work of doing, of following.

Here's how Fr. Jose Anotonio Pagola sums up what following Jesus means: "It is to believe what Jesus believed, to love what Jesus loved, to defend the dignity of the human person as Jesus defended it; to be with the powerless and vulnerable as Jesus was; to be free to do good as Jesus did; to trust the Father as Jesus trusted Him, and to face life and death with the great message of Easter: Hope! Victory!" (Following in the Footsteps of Jesus, Convivium Press, 2010).

When we *listen* deeply through meditating on God's Word, then we will be motivated and strengthened to *follow*. The reward? We, too, become one with the Father! Alleluia!
