


Join us on June 25th for an easy 5k walk along the lakefront to raise funds for our food pantry. Each participant

Treasures from Our Tradition

Last week's article no doubt raised an eyebrow with the image of deacons scurrying through the streets with fragments of Eucharistic bread from the bishop's liturgy.

These would be dropped into the chalice at outlying celebrations, presided over by presbyters, to express unity with the bishop, reminding them that they were not free agents. The Council of Laodicea forbade the custom of the *fermentum* in the year 348. One of the rules of interpreting law is that people don't make laws about things that aren't happening. So, by mid-fourth century, we have an important clue that what had once been a Roman custom had become widespread.

Interestingly, when the Church of England (and its related bodies) went through a liturgical renewal in the midnineteenth century, they reclaimed this custom from the mists of history. Today, it is the custom in some Anglican dioceses for a fragment of the host from the bishop's Holy Week liturgy (what we call the Chrism Mass) to be carried to every parish. On "Maundy Thursday" (our Holy Thursday), the fragment is dropped into the chalice to signify the parish's communion with the bishop. This modern revival of the *fermentum* is different from the "co-mingling" action we are used to, in which a fragment of the consecrated bread is dropped into the chalice just before Communion.



There is no charge to walk. St Teresa's Food Pantry gets a \$12 credit at the GCFD for every person we register and bring to the walk: from age zero to 100 -- age and mobility don't matter. This is easier to do this year and up to 10 people can be registered at one time. The website will indicate that there is a fee to walk but you need only add St Teresa's agency number (A01459) as the promotional code to have all 'fees' waived.

Taking a Risk


Jesus lived a risky existence. Today we read that Jesus accepted an invitation to dine at the house of a Pharisee. Jesus was pretty hard on the Pharisees, often calling them hypocrites. Going to dinner at the house of a Pharisee was opening himself up to scrutiny and confrontation.

To complicate matters, a woman who had a reputation as a public sinner decided to crash the Pharisee's dinner party. How did she get in? Her presence would be an embarrassment for the host.

This woman must have found something in Jesus that made taking the risk of inviting herself into the house worthwhile. Was it that she had already come to know Jesus and had felt the power of his presence and the freeing of his forgiveness? It seems that she must have had some such encounter with Jesus that endeared him to her. Otherwise, how would she have had the courage to enter this private residence uninvited?

Inside the house, we find the woman standing behind Jesus, who was reclining at table, as was the custom. She loved Jesus. She perceived that he had been snubbed by the host: It was customary to provide water so that guests could wash the dust and dirt off of their bare feet, but Jesus had not been afforded this courtesy.

The woman had been so moved by Jesus that now she hurt for him. Her love called her to fulfill what the host neglected. She cried for Jesus and allowed her

tears to flow on his feet. She bent down and wiped his feet with her long hair. Then she anointed Jesus' feet with expensive ointment.

Would this be an uncomfortable scene? It would be for me—to be a part of it or even to witness it. And to make it more uncomfortable, the host Pharisee let his displeasure be known. At that point, Jesus told a parable to make a point regarding this woman, her life, her love and her actions.

It became apparent that at some time Jesus had granted forgiveness of this woman's sins. Her overflowing love had drawn her into this house and to minister to Jesus ...no matter what the risk. She was rewarded with Jesus' words of mercy: "Your faith has saved you; go in peace." She had already been forgiven; she loved; she ministered; her inner beauty was announced to the world.

Immediately after this scene the evangelist states that Jesus journeyed from place to place "preaching and proclaiming the good news of the kingdom of God." That was the good news that this woman had already encountered.

And Luke adds,
"Accompanying him were the
Twelve and some women," a few
of whom he lists. We wonder: Was
this woman from the scene in the
Pharisee's house now among those
who accompanied Jesus? We don't
know. But Luke makes sure that we
do know that there were women
among those who went with him on
his mission. Over time, was the role
of the women diminished? Why
would that happen?

This Sunday we can reaffirm what we find in the Gospels. We can accept that Jesus did not put distance between himself and women who loved him, who ministered to him and who ministered with him and the Twelve.

Let us meditate on this scene and bring it into today's context in the church. Is something different now? Is anyone missing? What has changed? Can we be more like Jesus? How do we do that?
