



Treasures from Our Tradition

Sometimes when bishops are consecrated, they are not given the care of a diocese as an "ordinary." A very old tradition, however, assures that they are invested with a "see," a link with a local church. Many hundreds of places around the world were dioceses at one time, but are no longer. In England, for example, some of the historic dioceses such as London, Salisbury, and Manchester ceased to be Catholic at the Reformation and their

cathedrals passed to the Church of England. The reestablishment of the Catholic Church in the nineteenth century meant that new dioceses had to be created, such as at Liverpool and Westminster. Similarly, in Scandinavia the ancient Catholic dioceses vanished under Lutheranism. In North Africa, tiny dioceses disappeared under the sands or were swept

In the United States, some original dioceses never really developed as population centers, such as the old dioceses of Bardstown, Vincennes, Sault Ste. Marie, or Walla Walla. The tradition of "titular sees" assures that the ancient churches are always held in prayer, as the bishop celebrates Mass in its memory a few times a year.

Tradiciones de Nuestra Fe

Por siglos, Latinoamérica ha desarrollado una larga tradición religiosa con mitología espléndida. La palabra "religión" del verbo latín *religere* significa "atar" o "enlazar". Su función es unir seres humanos, los unos con los otros, con lazos de caridad y justicia. Una vez enlazados en comunidad, la religión los une al poder divino que rige el universo.

Entre las culturas andinas se encuentran mitos religiosos que muestran la importancia de este enlazamiento. Según la mitología Inca el universo esta compuesto por tres mundos: el cielo (Janan pacha), la tierra (Cay pacha) y el bajo tierra (Ucu pacha). Estos tres mundos están unidos por dos grandes serpientes, Yacú-mama (ríos) y Sacha-

mama (árboles), símbolos de la fecundidad.

Muchos piensan que los mitos son leyendas cuya función es el entretenimiento. En realidad los mitos no son fábulas, son historias que explican la verdad profunda del universo. Nos muestran como unirnos y enlazarnos para vivir una vida fecunda. En esta época de secularización, los cristianos no podemos olvidar ni la religión ni la mitología si queremos dar fruto como Jesús nos lo pide.

Keep Praying


St. Monica, whose feast we celebrate in August, is often

known as "the persistent mother." She watched her oldest son, Augustine, turn his back on his Christian faith.

Monica was exasperated. For years she gave up talking directly to her son on the advice of a local bishop, who told her that it was better to talk to God about Augustine then to Augustine about God.

The mother never gave up praying for her son. Eventually Augustine gave up his wild ways, was baptized, and later ordained and named bishop of Hippo. St. Augustine went on to become one of the Church's greatest scholars.

Today's readings address the importance of persistent prayer. Abraham, in spite of trepidation that he is bothering the Lord, continues to ask about the fate of Sodom and Gomorrah. Jesus, in Luke's Gospel, tells his disciples to "ask and you will receive; seek and you will find; knock and the door will be opened to you" (Luke 11:9). This is our charge: keep praying. 



Not in God's Name

You're invited to attend the next *Great Books and God Book Club* meeting at St. Vincent de Paul Parish on Tuesday, August 9th at 6:30pm, when we discuss *Not in God's Name: Confronting Religious Violence* by Rabbi Jonathan Sacks (2015, Penguin Random House).

In this powerful and timely book, Rabbi Sacks tackles the phenomenon of



religious extremism and violence committed in the name of God. Through an exploration of the roots of violence and its relationship to religion, he shows that religiously inspired violence has as its source misreading of biblical texts at the heart of all three Abrahamic faiths.

By looking anew at the book of Genesis, with its foundational stories of Judaism, Christianity, and Islam, Rabbi Sacks offers a radical rereading of many of the Bible's seminal stories of sibling rivalry: Cain and Abel, Isaac and Ishmael, Jacob and Esau, Joseph and his brothers, Rachel and Leah.

Persistence Pays Off

The story of Abraham's negotiations with God over the fate of Sodom and Gomorrah is an important reminder to us of just how freely we are invited to address God in our Judeo-Christian tradition. From Abraham to Jacob to Moses to Jesus, we meet models for robust encounters with our God who do not hesitate to bargain, wrestle, argue and intercede with loud cries and tears for what they want and need for themselves and those they love.

With all the skills of a marketplace trader, Abraham bids down God's destructive intent regarding the two sinful towns to a fraction of the original threat. Employing clever self-deprecating flattery, this Bedouin sheikh calms God's fury. After this encounter, it is clear that God has larger plans for Abraham in salvation history. This remarkable story sets the tone for later encounters between God and his people.

Jacob, the grandson of Abraham, steals his older brother's blessing, then wrestles God to a draw over the future of the sons of "Israel," the new name given him during the encounter, the word meaning "he wrestled with God." Jacob limps into salvation history by his own cunning, and God blesses him for it.

Moses often finds himself in the breach protecting the idolatrous Hebrews in the desert from God's wrath. He is allowed to meet God face to face and comes away with a glow so bright he has to

wear a veil. He is the model of intimacy that Jesus will fulfill at his baptism and transfiguration, the beloved Son in whom God is well pleased.

Jesus' disciples see this special intimacy he enjoys in prayer, and they ask him to teach them how to pray. He does more than that; he invites them into his own relationship with his Abba, instructing them to call God their Abba. Within that intimate identity, anything they ask of God will be given to them, as long as they treat others as God is treating them, which includes forgiveness.

Many saints, mystics and prominent thinkers have made the "Our Father" the focus of their final meditation on life and religion. Its seven petitions summarize everything we need from prayer. Its bold claim to be God's own child positions us deeply in faith and in the

network of believers who also believe that God keeps every promise and will welcome us into eternity after death. There is no greater expression of Jesus' own trust in his Father.

Jesus adds to his instruction on prayer a short parable about persistence. Sometimes called "A Knock at Midnight," the story of the man who comes to a neighbor seeking bread to feed some unexpected visitors illustrates the need to refuse to take no for an answer when we go before God. When we persist in prayer, our prayer deepens and our relationship with God deepens by being tested.

The parable was famously used by Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. in an early sermon to challenge the churches for sleeping behind locked doors when the world came begging for the bread of justice. King learned well the lesson of persistent prayer during the long struggle for civil rights for black Americans. Any prayer inspired by love and justice will be answered, we believe, but not without our own engagement with God's will over time and not without courage to see it through no matter what.

Jesus ends the parable by saying that persistence will win what even friendship does not gain. How much more confident we should be, then, knowing that friendship with God is always on our side when we pray.
