# Avila in Action Update





- In the graph above you will see that we have not yet met our budgeted expenses with our Sunday collections. We are on budget with our total income, versus expense. Total income includes Sunday collections, Christmas, Easter, fundraising, and miscellaneous donations.
- Our goal is to fund all operations and expenses from the weekly collections.
- St. Teresa's annual fundraisers assist in meeting funding gaps. It is the Finance Council's and Fr. Frank's goal to increase weekly giving to meet our ongoing expenses, and use the proceeds from fundraisers to fund special initiatives and outreach programs of the Parish.

There are 351 parishes in the Archdiocese of Chicago; only 55 parishes have weekend attendance that exceeds 2,000. Last year, St. Teresa of Avila's October Count was an average 545 people attending weekend Masses.

In the Archdiocese there is 1 priest for every 1,525 parishioners; in the USA the ratio is 1:1,653 Catholics; 27 percent of US parishes do not have a resident priest. In comparison, South America has a ratio of 1:7,094 Catholics.

### **Treasures from Our Tradition**

Last week's "Treasure" noted that the official headgear of the pope, the tiara, has been set aside in favor of the miter. Although Pope Paul VI had a coronation in 1963 to begin his ministry as pope, he later gave his tiara away to the Catholics of the United States as a stimulus to end poverty. He took care to say that he was not abolishing the tradition

of coronation, but his successor, Pope John Paul I, decided to have an inauguration to begin his tragically short term. His successors have chosen inauguration as well. Pope John Paul II felt that a return to the coronation custom would be inappropriate since the Church was mourning the sudden death of a man already nicknamed "The Laughing Pope."

So the end of coronations came about not because Paul VI gave the crown away. There are more than twenty tiaras on hand at the Vatican. One is used every year to crown the famous statue of St. Peter, whose sandaled foot has been eroded to a bright shine by the hands of millions of pilgrims. Today, it is left to the individual pope to decide whether he will begin his formal reign with a coronation or an inauguration. Pope Benedict chose an inauguration, as did Pope Francis. —Rev. 

### Our Father in Faith

The Letter to the Hebrews today sings a hymn of praise to Abraham and to his faith, upon which are

founded the religions of Judaism, Christianity, and Islam. Abraham is called "father" in faith by more people on earth than anybody else, numerous as the sands of the seashore or the stars of the heavens. Hebrews tells us it was this foundational faith that led Abraham to obey God's call when he heard it, though he was called to journey to a land he did not know and told he would father a mighty race through a marriage he thought was barren. But Abraham's faith, the author of Hebrews tells us, was his realization of

what he hoped for, and the evidence of what he could not see. How often are we, in simple daily events of our own Christian vocation, called to an unfamiliar place or told we are to do something we do not believe we can? 

### Mission Weekend: August 19-20

During the weekend of August 19-20, a representative from the Brothers of St. Charles Lwanga will be speaking at all the Masses. The Brothers of St. Charles Lwanga were founded in 1927 and are the first indigenous order of men in Africa, south of the Sahara Desert.

The Brothers of St. Charles Lwanga devote their lives to educat-



ing youth and training them in artisan work, especially carpentry and joinery, brick laying and concrete practice, tailoring, shoe making, mechanics and plumbing. The Brothers are accredited for their quality works and innovations, charity and voluntary service to the needy and national service in their localities.

The beneficiaries of their summer mission appeal are St. Kizito Orphanage Primary school Kiteredde and St. Joseph's Vocational Technical Secondary School Kiteredde. St. Kizito and St. Joseph's are both mixed day and boarding primary and secondary schools respectively. They are dominated by orphans and with majority parents low income earners. Some students live with HIV/AIDS, some come from child headed families or are looked after by their grandparents unable to do any work for income. A good number of the students are orphans and of helpless cases.

After the brutality of the 1979 Liberation War, the region has suffered, first from HIV/Aids which is now transgenerational, and currently from draught that has affected key crops, leaving people with almost nothing to eat and sell for their income.

### The goal of their Mission Appeal is to improve the Sanitation of St. Kizito Orphanage and St. Joseph's Schools.

The funds are intended to assist these schools buy water tanks and harvest rain water to provide students with safe drinking water while at school. The students have to travel for a long distance to fetch water from nearby swamps and water springs. This affects their learning and challenges of water borne diseases especially typhoid remains a big problem to these schools.

# Lectionary Themes for August: We are not alone


Even though the end of the current liturgical year is still a few months away, we will detect hints of urgency in the sacred texts for August. We will hear whispers of judgment, punishment and reward, as well as warnings that we must be prepared to meet the Lord whenever and however he appears. A repeated emphasis on faith will challenge us to take stock of

our fidelity and perseverance (Aug. 7), and the importance of discipline will be affirmed (Aug. 21). Discipline is, of course, derived from the word "disciple," and refers here to our willingness to let Jesus teach and form us in the ways of truth, justice, mercy and humility. Humble people know where they stand; they do not put on airs or seek out honor. They are, in a word, exceedingly truthful or down to (the) earth (*humus*) from which they came and to which they shall return. From this humble posture, Jesus' disciples are to reach out to the poor, the crippled, the blind and the disenfranchised. The needs of God's least ones become their daily agenda (Aug. 28).

As we move together through August, in prayer and in service, Jesus will make mention of the sufferings entailed in being faithful. Jeremiah was thrown into a cistern for speaking the truth to those who didn't want to listen (Aug. 14). But he survived, as did his faithful ancestors Abraham, Sarah, Isaac and so many others through the centuries. These

survived not by power or might but by their faith, hope (Aug. 7) and trusting reliance on God.

We shall also be reminded this month that ours is not a provisional or territorial God concerned only with certain elements of humanity. On the contrary, God's concerns are universal and all-inclusive. Through Trito-Isaiah (Aug. 21), God will affirm, "I know their works and their thoughts, and I come to

gather nations of every language; they shall come and see my glory. ... They shall proclaim my glory among the nations."

With such lofty goals to attain, and with keen awareness of how far-off and even impossible these goals may seem to be, we might become bewildered. When we examine the authenticity of our faith and our responsiveness to grace; and when we measure our weaknesses against the task at hand, we might become discouraged. However, the sacred texts are never without hope. As in every month, we are buoyed up by the encouragement they offer.

On Aug. 28, the unnamed author of the Letter to the Hebrews will assure us that God, whom we love and worship, does not speak a message so frightful that we are forced to beg for silence. There is no blazing fire or gloomy darkness where our God lives. No, our God is surrounded by countless angels in festal gathering. Yes, our God is judge of all, but our God's name is Mercy and our God's ways are loving, forgiving and compassionate. All the goodness of our God has been revealed to us in Jesus, who, through his passion, death and resurrection, has mediated a new covenantal relationship with humankind. Because of that relationship we live courageously, joyfully and serenely, full of hope and peace.

Early in the month (Aug. 14), the author of Hebrews offers even further encouragement. Not only are we strengthened and made secure by our relationship with God but we are also in communion with all those who have gone before us in faith. As the ancient author so eloquently wrote, "we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses ... let us rid ourselves of every burden and sin ... and persevere in running the race ... keeping our eyes fixed on Jesus." Imagine yourself in a great amphitheater. Crowding the stands are those whose races have come to a happy end. Victors in Christ, they are cheering us on. There are no thumbs turned downward in this arena. As we make laps, our supporters are urging each of us to persevere. Jesus is there too, seated at the right of the throne of God, who is showing a big thumbs-up. Let us not grow weary or lose heart. We tread in the footprints

of winners, not losers.

Our running mates also extend help. If we pull together as one, and encourage one another along the way, we become much-needed enablers for one another. With so much support coming our way — from God, from the great cloud of witnesses and from our fellow travelers — surely we can persevere in the "race" that will lead us home to God.
