


New this year - the after party! The fun won't stop at 11:00 pm. After party tickets will be available the night of the event.

There are 351 parishes in the Archdiocese of Chicago; only 55 parishes have weekend attendance that exceeds 2,000. Last year, St. Teresa of Avila's October Count was an average 545 people attending weekend Masses. In the Archdiocese there is 1 priest for every 1,525 parishioners; in the USA the ratio is 1:1,653 Catholics; 27 percent of US parishes do not have a resident priest. In comparison, South America has a ratio of 1:7,094 Catholics.

Treasures from Tradition

From the early medieval period, it was expected that the many bishops of Italy travel to Rome at least once every three years to give a report of their ministry, with a footnote

granting the bishops of Sicily a visit every five years. By the eleventh century, the idea of bishops visiting the tombs of the apostles was a very strict requirement for all within reasonable reach of Rome. The age of discovery and the expansion of the Church into remote corners of the earth made this an unreasonable burden in many cases, vet every bishop was required at least to send a representative to Rome every five years.

In 1911, Pope St. Pius X established the rule for a "quinquennial" (meaning "once in five years") report, called an ad limina. This literally means "to the threshhold," and refers to the expectation that the visiting bishop will go to the thresholds of the tombs of the apostles Peter and Paul and to a personal audience with the Holy Father. An exemption was given to so-called "mission territories," which in 1911 included the United States. The reports were still required, but could be filed by letter with an office of the missions called "Propagation of the Faith." This status was changed in 1917 and since that time all American bishops have been subject to the ad limina. These reports, carefully kept in the Vatican archives, are a treasure trove for historians, providing snapshots of culture and faith and a record of the Church's resilience even in times of persecution and change. — Rev. Depending on God

"Getting by with a little help from our friends" is not an idea that began with the Beatles. Certainly the idea

of "getting by with a little help from God" goes back at least to the first reading today from Exodus. How we get that help, however, is the key to this weekend's scriptures.

No matter how inadequate Moses felt to the task God had given him, he persevered—even though he needed help from the people around him. The Israelites especially depended on God for freedom. The woman in the Gospel, desperate and destitute, had no one to depend on, but

still she would not give up. She could not afford to bribe the unscrupulous judge, but she pestered him into weariness until finally he met her demands.

We sometimes need to turn to others to help us through difficult times; but if we always turn to God, we won't be disappointed, for our help, the psalm assures us, is from the Lord. Copyright @ J. S. Paluch Co.

Keep on Praying

Persistence.

That's a customary explanation given for the point to this Gospel story; only the way we have often presented it is to cast the judge in the role of the God-figure. Consequently, in our usual dramatic portrayals, God is implicitly the one who is slow to listen to the pleas of a poor and vulnerable widow — a woman without a husband, without status, without income, without security.

According to this account, God only grants the woman her claims because she pesters him to the point that God loses his patience and reluctantly gives in. Persistence triumphs.

But there's a problem with the picture this story paints. The judge, the God-figure, does not come across as someone we would want to emulate. The Gospel story tells us that he neither "feared God nor respected any human being." Beyond that, the sense we get is that God is someone to bargain with or pester to the point of wearing him down.

Fr. William Bausch, in the publication *Hungry*, *And You Fed Me*, suggests another possible way to understand this story. The question he asks is: "Why not see the widow as the image of God?"

So if the widow is now pictured as the God-like figure, it becomes possible to arrive at a whole new meaning for this parable. From this perspective the message is still about the importance of persistence, but the persistent one is



Today's Gospel story ultimately becomes the Christian answer to the painful reality of justice delayed and denied: namely, that God's plan for a kingdom of justice and peace will eventually be accomplished.

now presented as that person who — often against all odds — keeps resisting injustice, keeps renouncing discrimination, keeps opposing bigotry in all its dimensions.

The widow, then, takes on the role of a Rosa Parks, a person who endured until justice was achieved. The original meaning of the Gospel passage is still maintained, only now it becomes the constant commitment to seek justice wherever it is being denied.

This stance then insists we refuse to relent in our requirements to provide our children with adequate education and health care. It insists that all of us demand that our prisoners are treated with respect, that our soldiers are given appropriate health care, that our elderly are able to afford an adequate pension, that our planet is respected as a God-given gift.

It's a story about persistently hungering and thirsting for justice. The problem, though, is that throughout human history, multitudes have begged God to grant relief to those who are burdened with pain and sorrow.

And yet injustice remains. Peace seems hopeless. Bigotry persists

As a consequence, many lose heart. They find that perseverance in the face of repeated horrors is one of the greatest challenges that human beings have to face.

In his famous "Letter from the Birmingham City Jail," as quoted in Martin Luther King's book Why We Can't Wait, Dr. King writes: "We know through painful experience that freedom is never voluntarily given by the oppressor; it must be demanded by the oppressed. ... For years now I have heard the word 'Wait!'... This 'Wait' has almost always meant 'Never.' We must come to see, with one of our distinguished jurists, that 'justice too long delayed is justice denied.'"

Today's Gospel story ultimately becomes the Christian answer to the painful reality of justice delayed and denied: namely, that God's plan for a kingdom of justice and peace will eventually be accomplished.

In the meantime, we are called to "pray always without becoming weary." Persistence.
