A Steward's Story

I first realized what "stewardship" was in 2003 when I I "do" activism, then I have to "care" was interviewing activists to answer the sociological question of how and why some people, particularly heterosexual people, chose to be involved in a lesbian and gay social movement organization.

It was in one of these interviews where I met Gloria, a married woman in her late 50s from the Pacific Northwest who had two heterosexual sons. She told me, "...the bumper sticker on my car says, 'To believe is to care, and to care is to do. So, it's just, you can't *not* be doing [activism] things."

Gloria's words were transformative and left an indelible mark in my psyche. Like a logic problem, if about others; and if I care about others, then could I "believe" in nothing? No!

From this point on, I began a journey to strengthen my soul (along with my body and mind) in unison, connecting my caring with doing in my faith, activism, and social communities.



There are 351 parishes in the Archdiocese of Chicago; only 55 parishes have weekend attendance that exceeds 2,000. St. Teresa of Avila's 2016 October Count averaged 550 people attending weekend Masses; the 2016 Advent Count averaged 558 people a weekend; Christmas Count 780 people. In the Archdiocese there is 1 priest for every 1,525 parishioners; in the USA the ratio is 1:1,653 Catholics; 27 percent of US parishes do not have a resident priest. In comparison, South America has a ratio of 1:7,094 Catholics.

Treasures from Tradition

As soon as Christmas ends, people begin planning for Easter! Originally, the source of our Paschal Triduum was but a single

liturgy extending from Saturday sundown to sunrise on Easter Sunday. The two days leading up to the liturgy were days of fast, not only for the elect, but for the church preparing to baptize them. A fifth-century pope explained that the church imitated the apostles, who were in hiding with their grief from the arrest of Jesus, and therefore sacraments, even penance, were forbidden.

Inevitably, though, people wanted to come together, and so eventually a Liturgy of the Word developed for Good Friday. This was the first step to-

ward today's shape of the Triduum, and gradually new ideas were embraced, including the veneration of the cross and a simple Communion service. Interestingly, the Word remained central, since we know that in those days the pope did not receive Communion at this liturgy, even though the faithful had that option. In the other churches of Rome, priests and people received Communion under both species. Although the custom of Communion on Good Friday took hold, it did not endure past the Middle Ages. The central liturgies of the year slowly unraveled and disappeared from parish life. Remember that there were no seminaries in those days, and books were a rare luxury. Most priests could only manage to celebrate a simple "low" Mass, and few parishes could afford the ritual books that would guide a priest through the complex forms. Holy Week remained important in private devotion, but for a time the liturgies virtually disappeared. — Rev. James Field, Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

partir de 1980 las autoridades eclesiásticas, civiles y gubernamentales han intentado revitalizar esta fiesta por varios motivos.

Las autoridades eclesiásticas la usan para renovar el cristianismo añadiendo las enseñanzas y prácticas del Concilio Vaticano II a las tradiciones antiguas. Las autoridades civiles la utilizan para incrementar el comercio y el turismo en la región. Los gobiernos de Chile y Argentina la ven como un enlace benéfico entre ambas naciones.

Three Missions

Today we begin with one of the "servant songs" from

the book of Isaiah, a song prophetic of Jesus' ministry of service. Isaiah's mission is not only to bring back the children of Jacob to gather in Israel; it is also to be "a light to the nations" (Isaiah 49:6). Jesus Christ, as servant, will be the fulfillment of the ancient prophecy and the basis of the new.

This Sunday we begin a series of readings from Paul's letter to the Corinthians. Here Paul is identified by his mission: he is an apostle of Jesus Christ. The church at Corinth to whom he addresses this letter is also identified: it is part of the universal church of God. The Corinthians are called to holiness, as are all Christians.

Though the feast of the Baptism of the Lord was celebrated last Monday, today's Gospel also alludes to the importance of that event. The reading emphasizes that Jesus "outranks" John: his baptism in the Spirit will eradicate sin. Jesus accepts John's baptism, even though it is he himself who is the Lamb of God. Copyright © J. S. A Clear Call

When I graduated from high school in 1980, my godmother gave me a gift that was truly puzzling: Betty Crocker's Cookbook. I had no interest in cooking, and it was difficult to imagine how such a quaint book could have any relevance in my life.

As an 18-year-old woman, I had not yet sensed a "call" or vocation, yet my godmother saw future possibilities that were not on my radar: a wife and a mother. Now the cookbook's well-worn pages testify to where and when I was responding to an ever-evolving call. Some pages hold memories of the necessity of finding recipes to create frugal meals when money was tight. Other sections help recall the satisfaction of following step-bystep instructions for canning vegetables and baking bread "from scratch," and sticky pages trigger warm memories of baking desserts for a mom's bible study. That quaint, puzzling gift was a confident statement about my future calls, and a certain expectation that I would offer nourishment to others.

The Scriptures on the Second Sunday in Ordinary Time are a reminder of how frequently it is family, friends or mentors who will recognize our latent gifts and offer us a glimpse of where we will be called to serve. Our often-foggy vision gains a bit of clarity when others – through their confident words and actions – empower us to claim our gifts, to take on new responsibilities, and to accept that

we, indeed, are being called by God.

In the Gospel, we hear John the Baptist boldly and confidently proclaim Jesus as the "Lamb of God" and the "Son of God." These powerful titles lent the weight of authority and credibility to Jesus as he begins his public ministry. Not only did he establish Jesus' solid credentials, John stated that Jesus "ranks ahead" of him. If Jesus ever struggled with discouragement in his calling because of the incessant attacks by religious leaders, or if the frustrations of not being understood by his closest friends and relatives wore him down at times, it dorse and lift up the gifts of others, must have been a source of strength to recall the words of the Baptist in this encounter, and the assurance

that John saw the "Spirit descend and remain" on him.

As Jesus lived out his call as the "Lamb of God" and "Son of God," he witnessed that God's love, mercy and compassion knew no boundaries. While John the Baptist initially recognized that Jesus "might be made known to Israel," the words of the prophet Isaiah in the first reading attest that God desires salvation for all peoples and nations. This passage underscoring the servant's awareness that his call had a wider scope than originally anticipated may have been in Jesus' mind and heart as he brought God's tender love and compassionate care to the outcasts, the unclean and the Gentiles. Jesus responded to a "call within a call" - the phrase St. Teresa of Calcutta used to explain how her unique vocation unfolded - as a "light to the nations," as Isaiah foretold, his call extending far beyond Israel.

The Scriptures this Sunday hint that our calls from God are dynamic, and that they often come through the words of others, inviting, encouraging and challenging us to claim our gifts with confidence.

The readings this Sunday invite us to reflect: What figurative "cookbooks" are within our power to give to others, encouraging their calls to be a source of nourishment? Like John the Baptist, can we enknowing that their light may eclipse our own?
