

- In the graph above you will see that we have not yet met our budgeted expenses with our Sunday collections. We are on budget with our total income versus expense. Total income includes Sunday, Christmas and Easter collections, fundraising and miscellaneous donations.
- Our goal is to fund all operations and expenses from the weekly collections.
- St. Teresa's annual fundraisers assist in meeting funding gaps. It is the goal of the Finance Council and Fr. Frank to increase weekly giving to meet ongoing expenses and to use the proceeds from fundraisers for special initiatives and outreach programs.
- This year, the Christmas Collection was \$33,580; the Greenery sale netted \$1,511.

There are 351 parishes in the Archdiocese of Chicago; only 55 parishes have weekend attendance that exceeds 2,000. St. Teresa of Avila's 2016 October Count averaged 550 people attending weekend Masses; the 2017 January Count averaged 489 people. In the Archdiocese there is 1 priest for every 1,525 parishioners; in the USA the ratio is 1:1,653 Catholics; 27 percent of US parishes do not have a resident priest. In comparison, South America has a ratio of 1:7,094 Catholics.

Treasures from Tradition

By the early 1950s some scholars were calling for the restoration of Communion of the faithful on Good Friday,

since by then only a priest received, consuming the host from the Holy Thursday repository. In 1955 the new Good Friday liturgy was timed to begin at three o'clock everywhere, and included the option of Holy Communion, but without the Precious Blood that had originally been part of the liturgy. Today, there is increasing debate among theologians. Some feel that it would be better to fast from the Eucharist on Good Friday, focusing on the mystery of the cross and highlighting the Easter Communion. Others say that

this Communion infuses the sadness of the day with awareness of Christ's victory. It is not a day of mourning, of course, and the Passion according to John grounds the liturgy in a sense of Christ's victory over death and the triumph of the cross. The tradition is rich and varied, and we are still in the early stages of recovering an ancient way of doing things.

Why do we call the day "good"? The English and Dutch languages share this name, and its origin stems from the name "God's Friday." The traditional name for the day in Latin is *Feria VI in Parasceve*, which translates as "The Sixth Day of the Week of Preparation." Other languages make do with "Holy Friday." In another part of England, as in Denmark, the people used to call it "Long Friday," a good description for a quiet day without work and no chance for play or a good meal! —Rev. Tradiciones de Nuestra Fe

Empezó nuevamente la Cuaresma, este tiempo anual en que recordamos y celebramos los cuarenta días que Jesús pasó

en el desierto, donde fue tentado por Satanás. El mismo nombre "Cuaresma" recuerda la importancia del número 40 en la tradición judeocristiana. Cuarenta fueron los días del diluvio, los días en que Moisés y Elías pasaron en la montaña de Dios, y los años que el pueblo de Israel caminó por el desierto a la tierra prometida. El número 40 en la Biblia simboliza las pruebas y dificultades de la vida terrenal. Cuarenta es el número de la preparación para algo importante y de crecimiento en la vida.

La Cuaresma cristiana que se remonta hasta el siglo IV no sólo conmemora los días que Jesús pasó en el desierto, sino que debe ser un tiempo para reflexionar acerca de nuestra propia vida con sus pruebas y dificultades. El Papa León Magno describe la Cuaresma como un retiro durante el cual los fieles, recordando el ejemplo de Jesús, se preparan para celebrar la Pascua con un corazón purificado y la práctica perfecta de la vida cristiana. — Fray Gilberto Cavazos-Glz, OFM, Copyright © J. Don't Be Anxious

People have, it seems, a natural penchant for misplaced emphasis on unimportant things. They can easily get caught up with what they're having for dinner or what they will wear.

Often it is a tragedy that helps people to refocus on what is really important. What I shall wear is an irrelevant question when I am facing surgery or chemotherapy. What's for dinner is immaterial to those living through grief or unemployment.

In today's Gospel, Jesus tells us not to worry. He doesn't say, "Don't eat. Don't cook. Don't buy clothes." He says, "Don't worry." Jesus asks us not to relinquish our responsibilities but to let go of our anxiety. Anxiety betrays a lack of trust and Jesus reminds us that "Your heavenly Father knows" all that you need (Matthew 6:32). Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co., Inc.



Lenten Regulations

Abstinence from meat is to be observed by all Catholics 14 years old and older on Ash Wednesday and on all Fridays in Lent.



Fasting is to be observed on Ash Wednesday by all Catholics 18 years old but not yet 59. Those who are bound by this may take only one full meal. Two smaller meals are permitted if necessary to maintain strength according to one's needs, but eating solid food between meals is not permitted.

The Paschal fast, as well as abstinence, are prescribed for Good Friday and encouraged for Holy / Saturday.

Regulaciones de Cuaresma

La abstinencia de carne es para ser observado por todos los católicos de 14 años o mayores en el Miércoles de Ceniza y todos los viernes de Cuaresma.



El ayuno es para ser observado el miércoles de ceniza por todos los católicos de 18 años, pero aún no 59. Los que están obligados por la presente puede tomar sólo una comida completa. Dos comidas más pequeñas se permiten si es necesario para mantener la fuerza de acuerdo a las necesidades de uno, pero comer alimentos sólidos entre comidas no está permitido.

El ayuno, así como la abstinencia Pascual, se prescriben para el Viernes Santo y alentó para el Sábado Santo.

Worry or Tender Trust

These late February texts combine to describe the God given gift of trust. The Gospel asks the great question of "why worry?" The wildflowers don't worry. The birds don't worry. Why should you? If God cares for them, why would God not equally care for you? The Isaiah text speaks of God's tenderness as like that of a mother towards an infant. A mother gazing into the eyes of a newborn embodies trust — just as the child in that eye-lock is learning how to trust. The Corinthians passage advocates that stewards be "trustworthy," and implies that establishing trust is about taking care of what has been entrusted to us.

Many people today argue that they are spiritual but not religious. I often argue that you can't have one without the other. The spiritual aspects of one's self needs tending by the religious as well as the religious side needs tending by the spiritual. How do we guard the tender trust within us without trustworthy stewarding of religious or other institutions? Imagine if schools or teachers, priests or pastors, lawyers or politicians were not worthy of trust. Then the spirit within us withers. When religious or other kinds of institutions lose their way and people don't find meaning or value in their work, they can become dispirited and feel a great unraveling of the connection between the inner and the outer life of trust.

says "the term [spirituality] glows so strongly that it is hard to say anything really bad about spirituality." This alone "ought to make us wonder." She also says there are at least 92 definitions of spirituality, mostly arguing that it is a good warm feeling or a thing.

My favorite definitions of spirituality are a *sense of meaning* and a *sense of connectedness*. The prelude to both meaning and connection is trust. Each child needs her or his mother's eyes to be dependable so that he or she can grow up as a trustworthy person. We develop an inner glow so that we can create outer connections that are meaningful. We become builders of trust so

that others may trust — especially so that those who mistrust or have never found trust in their mother's eyes have a way to find the tenderness God wants to give them.

Many of us are reeling from extraordinary volatility — in the church, in the environment, in technology. Families struggle with how to tend their young in these times of great change. I find that acknowledging how rapidly things are changing helps me practice trust. I don't mistrust what is happening so much as see it, notice it, say it, remark upon it.

The kind of terrorism and public violence we see today has been hard to comprehend. Many have tragedy fatigue. We can't even remember the latest horrific event given how frequently these tragedies occur. The sad outcome is this: we forget the awesome tenderness of God towards us. We worry. Then we start to worry about worrying.

Instead we could become more spiritual, more religious, more full of meaning and of connection. We could become meaning makers, stewards of great gifts. We could gaze with the eyes of an infant who learns to trust by looking into the tender eyes of God.

We could pray today's psalm: "Trust in him [our tender God] at all times, O my people! Pour out your hearts before him [our tender God]" (Psalm 62:9).
