- Our goal is to fund all operations and expenses from the weekly collections.
- St. Teresa's annual fundraisers assist in meeting funding gaps. It is the goal of the Finance Council and Fr. Frank to increase weekly giving to meet ongoing expenses and to use the proceeds from fundraisers for special initiatives and outreach programs.
- This year, the Christmas Collection was \$33,580; the Greenery sale netted \$1,511.

There are 351 parishes in the Archdiocese of Chicago; only 55 parishes have weekend attendance that exceeds 2,000. St. Teresa's 2016 October Count averaged 550 people at weekend Masses. The 2017 monthly averages are: January, 489; February, 570; March, 640 In the Archdiocese there is 1 priest for every 1,525 parishioners; in the USA the ratio is 1:1,653 Catholics; 27 percent of US parishes do not have a resident priest. In comparison, South America has a ratio of 1:7,094 Catholics.

Treasures from Tradition

Not until the thirteenth century do we find a mention of a locked tabernacle. There's some evidence for eucharistic towers also, but often these were in an obscure corner of the church, or even in the off-limits sacristy. Many of us grew up "making visits" to Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament, but it's clear this would raise some medieval eyebrows in confusion! To the present day, the Eucharist is always reserved only in a side chapel in many cathedrals. The principal focus in a cathedral is always on the altar, symbol of Christ, and on the cathedra, symbol of the pastoral ministry of the bishop.

In your parish church there is probably a "sanctuary lamp," a permanently lit candle or oil lamp indicating the presence of the Blessed Sacrament. Sometimes it's in a red glass, not for any particular reason except that it's easy to find. There is a story of a bishop missioned to Papua New Guinea who was distressed to find no sanctuary lamps burning in his new diocese. The people patiently explained that their churches were woven of grass, and that they decided to place a chief's standard, a trident, in front of the tabernacle. That was a sign in their culture that the "chief" was at home, like raising the flag over Buckingham Palace. The bishop, an Irish import, didn't appreciate the British reference, so he ordered the candles back. The first church to burn to the ground was the cathedral, and after two more, the chief's tridents returned. — Rev. James Field, Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

Tradiciones de Nuestra Fe

Vicente Ferrer, patrón de los obreros de la construcción, falleció el 5 de abril de 1419. Este santo varón nació en Valencia, España, en 1350, vivió y predicó el Evangelio en una época muy difícil del cristianismo. Además de la peste, guerras y otros problemas sociales, la Iglesia estaba dividida por dos o tres hombres que insistían ser el verdadero Papa.

Vicente, un religioso dominico, dedicó su vida a reconstruir la Iglesia promoviendo la virtud de la caridad interna y externa mediante una predicación que relacionaba la Palabra de Dios con la vida cotidiana. Vicente se valía de la teología, poesía, repetición y otros medios para inculcar la sabiduría bíblica en sus oyentes. De esta manera supo construir la fe tanto en los fieles y en la Iglesia como comunidad.

Los cuadros de este santo español normalmente lo presentan con una llama ardiente en una mano y en la otra, con una Biblia abierta. De esta manera los artistas subrayan el amor ardiente que los cristianos debemos tener por la Palabra de Dios, un amor que Vicente edificaba en el corazón de los fieles. — Fray Gilberto Cavazos-Glz, OFM, Copyright © J. 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Jesus' Ministry Summarized

The story of the raising of Lazarus from the dead is the single longest story (apart from the Passion) in the Gospel of John. In it we find a summary of most of Jesus' ministry. We see his very human nature as he is moved by Martha and Mary's sorrows and as he himself weeps at the tomb

of Lazarus. He is the wisdom of God's Word made flesh as he explains to his followers that the death of Lazarus will serve as a sign of the glory of God. He crowns the miracles he works in John's Gospel (which began with the most "human" miracle of making new wine at Cana's wedding) by raising Lazarus from the dead—a "preview," if you will, of his own death and resurrection to come. This portrait of Jesus reminds us, as we near the end of our Lenten journey, that he is with us, knows us, understands us in every moment of our lives. He knows the joy of our human feasting, he knows the sorrow of our weeping. As we prepare to walk with him through the days of Holy Week, we are filled with faith that—through Christ— God's glory will be with us in every moment of our lives and—with Christ—in our life everlasting. If you or your family are looking for a different kind of experience this summer, something that is not simply a holiday or a retreat, then the Mariapolis might be just for you.



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O God, Take Our Stones Away!


Poor Martha. Experiencing utter exhaustion, she and her sister, Mary, cared for Lazarus while he was ill. But now, Martha steps into leadership, picking up the practical pieces of the job at hand. We imagine her making food for scores of visitors, overseeing funeral arrangements, providing necessities for burial as she tries to control her grief. Culture and tradition suddenly have given Martha many stones to carry.

We all carry stones that block the light of God. We pray for a clean heart, a heart where God's light can continuously shine inwardly and radiate outwardly in service to others.

We pray to be released from our prejudices, our stereotyping and dishonest inclinations. Every stone we carry can turn outward into falsehoods about others. We become so buried beneath our own cynical notions that our stones turn into hypocrisy, growing larger until they entangle us in an empty grave where the light of faith gets blocked.

When Martha hears that Jesus is near, she goes out to see what she can do for him, ready to care for another's need. She doesn't give in to cynical thoughts. Instead, through these words, she hands him her stone of grief: "If you had been here, he might have been able to withstand it."

Seeing the pain of the stone she carries, Jesus asks her: "Do you believe what I've told you? Me. Not those others, but me." Again, Martha refuses to give in to cynicism and doubt. She tells him her answer: "Yes."



We all carry stones that block the light of God. We pray for a clean heart, a heart where God's light can continuously shine inwardly and radiate outwardly in service to others.

This passage in John's Gospel says Jesus arrived in Bethany and is perturbed by what he sees. He is bothered, dismayed, maybe even agitated by the scene of insurmountable public hypocrisy his friends and followers are encountering. In the background are the whispers of the hypocrites, waiting to trap Jesus. "See how he loved him!" they cry out followed by their caustic mockery, "Yes, but, if he really did, then ..."

"Take away the stone," Jesus says to the community. A simple command to stop placing stones in each other's way of light and faith. The stone before the tomb traps Lazarus; he is unable to come into the light.

Jesus exclaims, "Unbind him, free him!" as if to say "Let Lazarus be active in his community once again."

The stone is taken away, not by Lazarus, but by others. Given the

responsibility for making sure that Lazarus is whole again, it is the community who was told by Jesus to remove the barrier of the tomb, to release him from the trappings that hold him back.

Their hearts have been changed, resurrected in order to help him. As Jesus prays to his Father in their midst, it is the community that is also receiving a new beginning.

Listen again to the words of the prophet Ezekiel: "O my people, I will open your graves and have you rise from them. I will put my spirit in you that you may live."

Our God is a God of mercy, kindness and forgiveness. We are bound up by our sins as well as the sins of others — the ones they have inflicted and those we have inflicted on them.

When resurrection is given, it comes as mercy. Do we become communities of grace as a result of the mercy we have been shown? Do we allow our hearts to be transformed, opened to welcome those who have suffered and struggled?

All communities can be resurrected by mercy, forgiveness, charity. Resurrection gives us clean hearts and ready hands. Those hands are sorely needed by the Marthas among us as together we care for what would follow the day after our brother's resurrection.
