Refugee Family Update

A few months ago, St. Teresa Parish began sponsoring a new Syrian refugee family. In addition to supporting the family with money for rent and furniture, volunteers have begun to meet with the family weekly. The first meeting included Karim, Latifa and their 19-month-old daughter Bisan along with four volunteers, a translator, and a representative from Catholic Charities. In this meeting, Karim and Latifa indicated that their biggest need is to learn English. Karim is currently enrolled in an ESL class and is hoping to enroll Latifa in a class as well. Karim is currently employed as a tailor.

The family appears very eager to adjust to American culture. Karim said he rides the bus and purposely gets lost to learn his way around. Latifa sees a doctor twice a month currently for prenatal care. Her parents and brothers live a 15-minute walk away so it is nice to have a family support system in place. Bisan is 19 mo. and is an adorable little girl. She is very happy, loves cookies, music, dancing, and other kids.


In the second meeting, one volunteer brought her son, who played with Bisan and helped engage a shy Latifa. Volunteers focused on ESL tutoring, engaging the family through play, placing word cards on various furniture, and reviewing the colors and alphabet. Latifa used Google translate to help her communicate with the volunteers. (One volunteer had helped the family set up their WiFi earlier in the week). Latifa was very gracious and prepared tea and rice pudding for the volunteers before they left.

- In the graph above you will see that we have not yet met our budgeted expenses with our Sunday collections. We are on budget with our total income versus expense. Total income includes Sunday, Christmas and Easter collections, fundraising and miscellaneous donations.
- Our goal is to fund all operations and expenses from the weekly collections.
- St. Teresa's annual fundraisers assist in meeting funding gaps. It is the goal of the Finance Council and Fr. Frank to increase weekly giving to meet ongoing expenses and to use the proceeds from fundraisers for special initiatives and outreach programs.
- This year, the Christmas Collection was \$33,580; the Greenery sale netted \$1,511; Easter Collection was \$23,400; the Rice Bowl Collection for Catholic Relief Services was \$5,100.

There are 351 parishes in the Archdiocese of Chicago; only 55 parishes have weekend attendance that exceeds 2,000. St. Teresa's 2016 October Count averaged 550 people at weekend Masses. The 2017 monthly averages are: January, 489; February, 570; March, 640; April, 705. In the Archdiocese there is 1 priest for every 1,525 parishioners; in the USA the ratio is 1:1,653 Catholics; 27 percent of US parishes do not have a resident priest. In comparison, South America has a ratio of 1:7,094 Catholics.

Treasures from Tradition

The fact that many monastic churches do not have a prominent tabernacle shapes the patterns of liturgical prayer. Monastic communities often protect the ancient value of "receiving from the same sacrifice," meaning that the communicants are assured that what they eat and drink in the Holy Mysteries actually comes from the same celebration. It surprises many to learn that the Church does not foresee, nor does it provide for, Communion of the faithful from the reserved Sacrament. Liturgical laws have long defended your right to receive from the same sacrifice, the same Mass, that you attend.

At one time, of course, the bread for the Eucharist was the ordinary bread of the day, except unleavened, probably prepared at home. It was broken and distributed to the faithful. Early on the loaf itself was referred to as the hostia in Latin, meaning the "sacrifice," the same word for the sacrificial animal in Jewish worship, and for Jesus as the Lamb of God. By giving his life on the cross, Jesus became the hostia for us. To this day in the Greek Church, one of the tasks of the priest's wife is to bake the bread for the Divine Liturgy, sometimes in a bakery oven dedicated to that purpose and called a "Bethlehem."

Today's familiar individual hosts first appeared in the eleventh century at about the time when tabernacles were coming into use. The turn away from "bready" bread allowed the hosts to be reserved since they did not spoil like regular bread, and made the annual "Easter duty" counts easier. — Rev. James Field, Copyright © J. S. 

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Serious Stuff

The famous comedian George Carlin used to do a routine called "stuff" — referring to all the possessions we accumulate and cling to so dearly. Here are some things he said about "stuff":

"The whole meaning of life is trying to find a place for our stuff. That's what your house is — a place to put all your stuff. Your house is really just a pile of stuff with a cover on it. It's a place to keep your stuff while you go out and get more stuff. You then have to buy a bigger house because you've run out of room for all your stuff, and you have to have more space for more stuff."

He pointed out how addicted we can become to our possessions, leading to the simple yet profound question: "Do you own your stuff or does your stuff own you?"

In contrast to all this fascination with "stuff," today's Gospel of John ends with these striking, hope-filled words: "I came so that they might have life and have it more abundantly." But what does Jesus mean by the word *abundantly*? Is he referring to the acquisition of more stuff, more possessions, more things, more gadgets?

Quite the contrary. What Jesus is really talking about is our openness to receiving a gift, a grace. It is the grace we find when we believe that only God can fill the hole in our soul. And, it comes precisely when we abandon the incessant acquisition of more and

more stuff.

Jesus is talking today about that down-deep emptiness in our lives — an emptiness that all the "stuff" in the world just doesn't seem to fill up. He's talking about our most fundamental need to feel that our lives are ultimately about something far richer and deeper than the stuff we so crave.

Ultimately, Jesus is talking about developing an *abundance mentality*, a way of thinking and acting that says: "There is enough for everyone, more than enough food, love ... everything!" When we live with this mind-set, we begin to see the miracle of what we give away multiplying to the point of having plenty left over.

Abundance mentality is the opposite of a "scarcity mentality" that wants to hold back, refuse to share, and keep only for ourselves.

Almost one in six people in the United States live in poverty. Experts say that social service agencies, such as food banks and organizations that assist with housing, utilities and transportation costs, report an increasing need for assistance from people who made donations in the past but now come seeking aid for themselves!

Globally, the numbers are even more alarming: Nearly half of all children live in poverty and far too many die of easily preventable diseases. It's estimated that 80 percent of all people on the planet live on less than ten dollars a day; even worse, many work in abysmal conditions for almost no pay. Abundance is a word most people throughout the world wouldn't even understand or comprehend. Yet, we do — because material abundance is all around us.

The problem for many of us, is that too often we think it refers only to the garnering of more stuff. Jesus is trying to help us understand in today's Gospel, and throughout his whole ministry, that true abundance comes not from what we possess, but from how deeply we love, how generously we share.

Jesus sends each of us an invitation: Spend less time acquiring more stuff and more time developing a mind-set of abundance, an abundance mentality.
