# **Finance Council News**

Do you know how your money is spent? Would you like to help St. Teresa of Avila Parish fulfill its mission? The Finance Council needs your help.

In 2014, 2015, and 2016, our parish could not cover the daily operating expenses with our Sunday and holy day collections. How can you help? Be informed about our finances and continue to be engaged at St. Teresa.

We rely on our main fundraiser, *Time of Your Life*, to cover a large portion of our operating expenses. Naturally, this puts a lot of pressure on the event and its organizers. We'd like this and other fundraisers to pay for special projects, such as fixing the 20-year-old boiler, installing a new air conditioner, or expanding our current building. We do not want to use our main fundraiser to cover daily operating expenses such as health insurance, utility bills, or salaries.

The Finance Council is rolling out a new initiative. Our goals are to:

- Show you where your money goes;
- Increase the number of parishioners who use Give Central;
- Increase the consistency and size of contributions.

There are 351 parishes in the Archdiocese of Chicago; only 55 parishes have weekend attendance that exceeds 2,000. St. Teresa's 2016 October Count averaged 550 people at weekend Masses. The 2017 monthly averages are: January, 489; February, 570; March, 640; April, 705. In the Archdiocese there is 1 priest for every 1,525 parishioners; in the USA the ratio is 1:1,653 Catholics; 27 percent of US parishes do not have a resident priest. In comparison, South America has a ratio of 1:7,094 Catholics.

## **Treasures from Tradition**

The custom of genuflection is not found everywhere in the


Catholic Church. In fact, it is a bit of breach of etiquette to genuflect in most Eastern Catholic Churches. If you're visiting an Eastern Catholic or an Orthodox church, the "when in Rome" rule should be adopted. Watch what the home team is doing! Usually, Eastern Catholics and Orthodox reserve a small portion of the eucharistic bread for the dying in a cupboard or eucharistic dove, but it is not a center of attention or devotion. The rule is to make a profound bow, called a "metasis," toward the altar—bowing deeply while making the sign of the cross.

East and West split years before we Westerners began to reserve the Blessed Sacrament prominently in our churches. Thus, the East never changed the original custom of bowing toward the altar. Increasingly, as tabernacles became more widespread in the West and moved into prominent placement within churches, we replaced the bow toward the altar with a genuflection toward the Blessed Sacrament when its place of reservation is visible.

In a church where the Blessed Sacrament is reserved in a special chapel or off the main axis of the building, normally you should bow toward the altar when you enter your pew, because the Eucharistic table is the principal sign of Christ's presence in the church building. If you have ever participated in the liturgy of Dedication of a Church and Altar, there is no mistaking the altar's significance: it is first slathered with chrism and then adorned with a brazier billowing clouds of incense that fill the whole church as a sign of prayer and presence! — Rev. En junio de 1885, las campanas de una modesta capillita anunciaron el recibimiento de

una imagen de san Cono que llegó en procesión. Desde entonces esta costumbre italiana se fue haciendo parte integral de la devoción cristiana en Uruguay.

Cono fue el hijo único de una pareja anciana que vivía en la ciudad de Teggiano, Salerno. Según la leyenda, una noche mientras dormían, esta pareja soñó un cono de luz que brotaba de la madre. Al nacer el niño decidieron llamarlo Cono. Desde muy niño, Cono mostró un afán por las cosas de Dios y a los dieciséis años ingresó a un monasterio benedictino siguiendo el consejo de una voz interior que lo invitaba a consagrase al Señor. A los dieciocho, su monasterio se llenó de luz y una voz anunció su muerte, y al día siguiente falleció. — Fray Gilberto Cavazos-Glz, OFM, Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co., Inc.

# Proclaim the Christ

Over the past few decades, California pediatrician Dr. Harvey Karp has popularized the idea of the "fourth trimester." Theorizing that human infants (due to their growing head circumferences) are necessarily born three months too soon, he proposes a method of parenting that simulates life in the womb by incorporating rocking movement, skin-on-skin contact, and rhythmic sounds that echo a mother's heartbeat, as ways to ease newborns into their new existence post-birth.

Following the death and resurrection of Jesus, their friend and teacher, the disciples of the early church faced a transition just as shattering and transformational as the one from womb to world. Their understanding and experience of life had been fundamentally altered in their encounter with the risen Jesus. And, we could say, in the 40 days from resurrection to ascension, Jesus offers the disciples their own "fourth trimester" of sorts to become acclimated to this new way of interacting with him.

But just as their time with the earthly Jesus ended, so too will the time they share with him postresurrection. And after the ascension once again they will transition to a new way of being in this world, a new way of being connected to Jesus, the True Vine, and listening for the voice of Jesus, the Good Shepherd.

In today's Gospel Jesus prepares his friends for this time that will come. He assures them, "I will



In all that we encounter, we can hold on to Jesus' promise, "I will not leave you orphans." We know that we have an advocate who remains with us and an attentive parent who holds us close ...

not leave you orphans." This verse in John is the only time the term "orphan" is heard in all four Gospels. And it gives us a new image of Jesus, that of a parent. In this parenting, Jesus is joined by a new figure he introduces as the "Advocate ... the Spirit of truth."

The disciples are moving into a new time — one of great hope and also of great pain. Shortly after promising to send them the Advocate, Jesus tells the disciples why they will need one: "If they persecuted me, they will persecute you" (John 15:20).

Our first reading picks up after Stephen is stoned in Jerusalem — the first of the apostles to be martyred. As many disciples are scattered from Jerusalem, Philip finds himself in Samaria. Instead of seeking shelter and protection, we are told he "proclaimed the Christ to them" thereby sharing the joy of the good news at every opportunity. The second reading is drawn from the First Letter of Peter, who, tradition suggests, wrote it shortly before his martyrdom in Rome. Peter urges the community to "always be ready to give an explanation to anyone who asks you for a reason for your hope." Indeed, that is the audacious message of these first followers of Jesus — continue to proclaim the Christ to all who will listen even as your very lives are demanded of you.

In our own lives as Christians we also face challenges, persecutions and transitions. Some may be as simple as bearing with a difficult coworker or cranky child, but others (the death of a spouse, mental illness, addiction) may demand everything of us. In all that we encounter, we can hold on to Jesus' promise, "I will not leave you orphans." We know that we have an advocate who remains with us and an attentive parent who holds us close as we embrace a new reality. We now are the ones who must proclaim the Christ to a world desperately in need of mercy and love.

May we always be ready to give an explanation for our hope.
