
This week, we'll focus on our Operational Expenses, which help keep the lights on, the church cool, and St. Teresa's employees from living a monastic way of life.

- We have significant administrative expenses that include insurance, hospitality, utilities, supplies, and furniture.
- We pay assessments to the Archdiocese of Chicago and Priests Retirement and Mutual Aid Association (PRMAA).
- We make occasional minor repairs to our buildings to maintain them properly.
 These are for minor repairs that would be made at any typical property.
- * Lastly, our social outreach ministries are a core and celebrated expense because this is our mission! In 2016, we started "Avila in Action" where we contribute a 6% of our weekly contributions to causes that are important to our parishioners. For last year, the total contribution to Avila in Action was \$30,000.

We'd like to dedicate this finance bulletin to Dave Hilko, a parishioner who passed away recently. It was Dave's idea to report St. Teresa's finances in a more transparent fashion. In fact, the majority of this text was drafted by him just before he passed away.

There are 351 parishes in the Archdiocese of Chicago; only 55 parishes have weekend attendance that exceeds 2,000. St. Teresa's 2016 October Count averaged 550 people at weekend Masses. The 2017 monthly averages are: January, 489; February, 570; March, 640; April, 705. In the Archdiocese there is 1 priest for every 1,525 parishioners; in the USA the ratio is 1:1,653 Catholics; 27 percent of US parishes do not have a resident priest. In comparison, South America has a ratio of 1:7,094 Catholics.

Treasures from Tradition

If you could somehow transport a third-century Christian into your twenty-first-century Sunday Mass, once the initial shock wore off he or she would be more or less at home with the structure of the first part of the liturgy, the Word. The second part might be more difficult to comprehend. The stumbling block would be the book. We have a book, a missal that is set down on the altar with a very precisely prescribed set of words for the priest to say and the people to sing at the Eucharistic Prayer. In the early days of the church, there were no set "formulas" for this prayer. The ancients would have raised

eyebrows at our "bookishness" since they preferred to let the prayers roll forth from a gifted leader of prayer. There was a basic shape to the prayer of thanksgiving, and almost general agreement that the words of Christ at the Last Supper ought to be included.

By the second century, Justin Martyr wrote that the presider "gives thanks at some length... and when he has finished the prayers and the thanksgiving, all the people present give their assent by saying 'Amen.'" In the world before books, people could memorize long passages of prose and poetry, and so it is easy to see how particular phrases or expressions passed from church to church.

Inmediatamente llamaron a doña María, quien pudo ser testigo de la milagrosa renovación. A Call to Our Higher Self

Sharing stories about a lost loved one is a powerful way to communicate the most enduring and touching parts of their lives. The stories people told at my mother's wake were mostly about her many efforts to organize volunteers to serve the most vulnerable. She had spent her life for others, even as she had often struggled to make her own ends meet. As we witnessed her transitioning from this world to the next, her memory called us to our higher selves through lives of service.

Similarly, when gathered to say goodbye to my Aunt Doris, everyone had stories to tell of her enduring sense of humor. This funloving jokester had constantly reminded us not to take ourselves too seriously. Our memories of her lifted our spirits by the love she had shown through humor. And, no one doubted where my father-in-law stood on important life issues, or any issue for that matter. Whenever his children repeat what they call his "sermons," they feel his challenge to speak their truth to the world.

in Jesus' eyes and touch. They shared how Jesus had believed in them in ways they couldn't. They shared the wisdom they had learned from Jesus' parables. And in their sharing, Jesus' presence came alive again for them.

What messages of hope did Jesus leave to lift his followers' spirits? Not only had Jesus appeared to them after his agonizing death, he went to great lengths to prove that he was still alive, healed and at peace. Don't we also cling to the vision that our deceased loved ones are at peace? Jesus assured them, "Behold, I am with you always, until the end of the age" (Matthew 28:20). Death may separate us, but the imprint of love we have shared will always be on our hearts. In the face of heartwrenching grief, Jesus promises

that love never dies or leaves us. As the disciples stood spellbound watching him being taken from them, they heard the promise of Jesus' return. How comforting to know that death does not have the last word.

How had Jesus modeled speaking and living the truth in the world? Jesus lived a life in solidarity with the poor and most vulnerable. He spoke words of new life, forgiveness, healing, freedom and intimate love. In the end, it cost him his life to challenge oppressive systems. His parting words were, "You will be my witnesses" (Acts 1:8). Confused and fearful, Jesus' followers were left wondering how they could keep the tenderness of his heart alive. Their dreams seemed shattered. Jesus reassured them saying, "You will be baptized with the Holy Spirit" (Acts 1:5), and "You will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes upon you" (Acts 1:8). That same true spirit of Jesus lives on in the way Christians live their lives today.

Jesus instructed, "Go, therefore, and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you" (Matthew 28: 19-20). What was he asking of us as Christians? As the church celebrates the feast of the Ascension, how it is calling you and I to our higher selves?
