
Time of Your Life Gala



- Charitable Outreach money received in 2016 (\$54k) has remained approximately flat compared to 2015
- Total Collections have increased 13% from \$548k in fiscal 2015 to \$621k in fiscal 2016
- General Donations have decreased 56% from \$40k in fiscal 2015 to \$18k in fiscal 2016

There are 351 parishes in the Archdiocese of Chicago; only 55 parishes have weekend attendance that exceeds 2,000. St. Teresa's 2016 October Count averaged 550 people at weekend Masses. The 2017 monthly averages are: January, 489; February, 570; March, 640; April, 705; May, 573. In the Archdiocese there is 1 priest for every 1,525 parishioners; in the USA the ratio is 1:1,653 Catholics; 27 percent of US parishes do not have a resident priest. In comparison, South America has a ratio of 1:7,094 Catholics.

Treasures from Tradition

At the heart of today's solemnity is a eucharistic procession, held in many parishes, that calls to mind the proces-

sion of Holy Thursday, yet has a purpose different from the somber adoration in the night watch. In the late Middle Ages, a procession through the city with the Blessed Sacrament was an occasion of heartfelt joy and great emotion. In a time when people seldom approached the altar to receive Holy Communion, the procession through the streets, past homes and workplaces, was a vibrant reminder that Christ was with them as a dear companion and guide.

Every year on this day, a joyful procession winds through the streets of Rome from the Lateran cathedral. A few years ago, Pope John Paul II, deeply moved at the sight of the throng accompanying the sacred host, said that we ought to feel profoundly united with the faithful everywhere in the world at such a moment. "Before our mind's eye all the Churches of the world, from East to West, from North to South, are present." Originally this feast was on the Thursday after Trinity Sunday, but after the calendar reform of 1970, its title was expanded from "Corpus Christi" to "The Body and Blood of Christ" and in the United States it was moved to the Sunday after Trinity Sunday. Even though Easter season ended two weeks ago, this beautiful feast is aglow with Easter light. —Rev. James Field, Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

Aún en nuestro tiempo, el Rito del Bautismo de Niños insiste que el padre, junto con la madre, deben ser los mayores maestros de sus hijos. Great-grandma's giant molasses cookies. Christmas pie. Grandma's Spam salad. We all have those must have-items when the family gathers together. These tastes and smells linger and keep us coming back for more. We can try to follow the recipe, but it is never quite as good as when it was made by the Allow yourself to become a part one who made it first. And we know if we return home for a visit and we don't get the dish we crave, we walk away knowing we missed out on something special.

When we try to make our own giant molasses cookies, there are specific ingredients, special tools and the right amount of time to make them perfectly. To get the right size, texture and taste, we can only get them from the source. Yes, we can go to the store and purchase molasses cookies that might look the same, but it just doesn't cut it.

It is the same with the Eucharist. It gathers the family together to celebrate over and over again. It lingers with us, even after we receive it, filling us and satisfying the craving. In today's second reading Paul reminds us that it is the one bread and one cup that makes us whole. This piece of Jesus we consume moves us into action and awakens a desire for justice, mercy and love. Ultimately, it brings us into union with our Creator, making us feel complete.

at times we can encounter false towers and unreliable service glitches, especially if we haven't kept current with the upgrades. We lose touch, we get disconnected. Even more regrettable, we may not even know what we are missing. We can get used to the choppy service, making excuses, telling ourselves we can't get the upgrade. Some of us even complain it would be too much work or take too much time to learn the new technology and refuse to change.

In a similar way, we often stand in the way of the possibilities we can have when we partake in the body and blood of Jesus. We choose not to let Jesus into our being or not to honor the sacrifice made to free us from sin. We choose not to follow the commandments given. We might even block the connection to the one who de-When we are in communion fends, refreshes and provides us with the best service plan in the world!

It is up to us whether we have a clear signal. Moses tells his people in the first reading that God afflicted them with hunger and then fed them manna. God provided manna daily and generously; this is still true today. Step out of the desert and receive Jesus in the word and the Eucharist. Acknowledge the connection to the past, present and future through what we eat. God gives us what we need.

Allow yourself to become a part of Jesus and he a part of you. All too often we receive the true food and the true drink but don't allow it to transform us. We take the gift for granted just like we take for granted all the energy and love that great-grandma put into those giant molasses cookies, thereby allowing the sacredness of the moment to be lost.

Our holy Communion is not just a symbol, but the true presence of the one who satisfies what we crave. The hunger is within each of us, and there is only one way to truly satisfy it. Go to the source to the Father who feeds us bread from heaven.
