


In this bulletin, we'll focus on St. Teresa's Capital Income. What money is represented in "Category X"?

There are 351 parishes in the Archdiocese of Chicago; only 55 parishes have weekend attendance that exceeds 2,000. St. Teresa's 2016 October Count averaged 550 people at weekend Masses. The 2017 monthly averages are: January, 489; February, 570; March, 640; April, 705; May, 573; June, 541. In the Archdiocese there is 1 priest for every 1,525 parishioners; in the USA the ratio is 1:1,653 Catholics; 27 percent of US parishes do not have a resident priest. In comparison, South America has a ratio of 1:7,094 Catholics.



Treasures from Tradition

The achievement of the late 1960s and early 1970s in enriching the "euchology" or "words of thanksgiving" avail-

able in the Church's prayer is important on many levels. Ecumenically, it means that the Latin Rite now reflects the wealth of the East in having more than one prayer available to the Church. Pastorally, it actually acknowledges the place of the assembly in prayer, which is particularly clear in the Masses with Children. In fact, the traditional prayers of the Eastern Church served as models for our new prayers.

In the East, what we call the Eucharistic Prayer is called the *anaphora*, and there are three main families of *anaphora*. Each family has a different "recipe" for arranging the usual parts of these prayers. All *anaphora* have "intercessions" included, but the Churches of Antioch place them toward the end of the prayer, Alexandria prefers them at the beginning before the "Holy, Holy," and Syria puts them at the very end. One branch of the Syrian family is unique in not mentioning the words of Jesus at the Last Supper. The Roman Canon we once prayed exclusively has some connection with the Alexandrian family, but once the signal for creativity was given, all the wealth of every prayer tradition was on the table, and our Sunday Mass has been greatly enriched. —Rev. James Field, Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

Bolivia. En dicho lugar, un descendiente de los reyes incas, Francisco Tito Yupanqui buscó esculpir una imagen de la Candelaria. Su primera imagen fue colocada en la iglesia por su párroco, pero llegó un nuevo párroco quien la sacó del templo por tosca y fea. El pobre de Tito viajó a Potosí, Bolivia, donde emprendió cursos de escultura. Con el tiempo esculpió otra imagen de la Candelaria. Esta vez estudió varias imágenes de María y mandó ofrecer una Misa a la Santísima

Trinidad pidiéndole la inspiración necesaria para esculpir una imagen digna de la Virgen. Los años de práctica en su arte, unidos a su devoción, le ayudaron a esculpir una imagen fina y bella que en 1583 fue colocada en su propio santuario.

La Virgen de Copacabana tiene uno de los primeros santuarios marianos en América Latina. Curiosamente, se celebra el 5 de agosto, día que María hizo nevar en la antigua ciudad de Roma, Italia, para mostrar dónde deseaba tener su primer templo. — Fray Gilberto Cavazos-Giz, OFM, Copyright © J. An Understanding Heart

I love stories that contain genies. They can teach us a great deal about what is important in life. Most of us know that if you hold a lamp that contains a genie, then the genie is supposed to grant you three wishes. In most of these stories, once any character becomes the master of the genie, things usually go wrong. Having anything one wishes for isn't as easy as it sounds.

The master of the lamp may wish for money, but later finds out that the money is cursed. The master may wish for power, but later finds out that the sacrifices made for power drives him or her to madness. It's very hard to be given anything for which you wish because the wish usually backfires.

But, there are wishes that don't backfire, and the Scriptures today give us some insight to how we would best avoid calamity if we ever become the master of a magical lamp or, more likely, find ourselves in daily prayer. In the first reading, Solomon gets a gift from God. Solomon can have anything for which he wishes. What an amazing opportunity! He knows that he is responsible for leading his kingdom. Should he ask for great wealth? Should he ask for impenetrable palaces? Should he ask for numerous followers on Twitter? No. None of these. Instead, he asks for an understanding heart.

If you ever find yourself in possession of a genie, that is the right answer. Make your wish for wisdom and a heart full of compas-

sion. It is important to be careful what you wish for, because there is always a chance for a sequel.

To help us understand the benefit of a gift that can last and last, in rapid fire rhythm, Matthew's Gospel has Jesus sharing a series of quick anecdotes with his disciples. The kingdom of heaven is us have the wisdom to know what like this. The kingdom of heaven is like that. In each of the stories a gift is given to the main character such as treasure, wealth, success, but no matter what the circumstances of the story, there is always a choice to be made. What happens when you find a great treasure? What happens if you are so successful that your household is blessed with both new and old wines?

In the many-faceted characters that Jesus presents, we can see ourselves — a laborer, a merchant, a scribe. All of us have different

choices to make within our personal lives or professional occupations. But, what quality can transform any occupation to be nearer to the kingdom of heaven? The wisdom to discern the good from the bad. The wisdom to know what to do. The wisdom of an understanding heart.

Now, and at any point in history, it is easy to become critical of others. We might pray or have prayed, "O God, we wish for the times of Solomon when the leader of the land had wisdom. Why can't our leaders have an understanding heart?" We might even nestle up to the conceit that "If I were in charge, I could do things better than him or better than her." Wouldn't it be nice to have a genie to grant us three wishes so we could change the world order?

The moral of our Scriptures is, in fact, that we do have such a gift. We have the ability to ask God for an understanding heart to help to do here and now. What a different world it would be if we had the wisdom to pray for wisdom and worked diligently to apply it to our everyday decisions. Only then would all our stories end well. The stories would end like the kingdom of heaven which Jesus was known to proclaim, and the sequels would be equally magnificent.


Seeking a Leader
