

There are 351 parishes in the Archdiocese of Chicago; only 55 parishes have weekend attendance that exceeds 2,000. St. Teresa's 2016 October Count averaged 550 people at weekend Masses. The 2017 monthly averages are: January, 489; February, 570; March, 640; April, 705; May, 573; June, 541; July, 463; August, 510. In the Archdiocese there is 1 priest for every 1,525 parishioners; in the USA the ratio is 1:1,653 Catholics; 27 percent of US parishes do not have a resident priest. In comparison, South America has a ratio of 1:7,094 Catholics.

Statement of Cardinal Cupich on the Rescission of DACA

Today President Trump ended the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) program and the dreams of nearly a million young people covered by the executive order and applying for inclusion. In the past the president stated that the Dreamer story "is about the heart," yet today's decision is nothing short of heartless. The Dreamers are now left in a 6 month limbo, during which Congress is supposed to pass comprehensive immigration reform, a feat they have been unable to achieve for a decade. In fact, this inability to agree on a just immigration system led President Obama to sign the executive order protecting minor children brought to this country by their parents.

As the considerations of the "heart" seemed to be insufficient to keep protection in place, Congress must now act decisively and swiftly. An immediate first step is for our leaders to pass legislation that will protect those previously covered by the DACA program, while they deal with the long-overdue comprehensive reform of our immigration system. They must be guided by compassion and respect for human dignity, and honestly consider the substantial evidence that deporting these young Americans would do great economic harm to the states where they reside

With the bishops in this country, we remain committed to upholding the dignity of all persons and the fundamental right of all to live free from fear in the nation founded on that promise.


Called to be a Catechist?

Treasures from Tradition

On Good Friday, at the heart of the Triduum, the commemoration of the Lord's Passion is colored by sobriety and decorum,

but this Thursday the mystery comes in a luminous celebration of Christ's victory. In its deepest origins, the Exaltation of the Holy Cross is the feast of a dedication of a church, since in the year 335 the Church of the Holy Sepulchre was dedicated on September 13, and on the following day the "true cross" discovered by St. Helena was brought outside to the faithful for veneration. It is a great feast of the Eastern Church, which often marks it by having the whole assembly prostrate themselves on the floor honoring the life-giving cross.

At the core of the tradition is the quest of Helena, mother of the Emperor Constantine, to acquire the cross and the nails of the Crucifixion from the ruins of Jerusalem. When she was satisfied that she had found them, thanks to the healing of a sick man whose body was placed on the cross, she had her son fund the building of the great basilica. The history of the relic is complicated, especially because it was carried off by invading Persians in the year 614 and "went missing" for fifteen years. Thursday's feast does not celebrate the relic, but rather the life-giving cross from which salvation flows. It's a good day to look around your house or office: Don't those walls look bare without a cross? What better day to remedy that? —Rev. James Field, Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

Tradiciones de Nuestra Fe

Durante todo el mes de septiembre se celebra el mes de la herencia hispana. Esta fiesta responde a una presencia hispana

que tiene su inicio con la llegada de los españoles a la Florida en 1513, hace 501 años. Los españoles estuvieron en 24 de los ahora 50 estados de Estados Unidos. Eventualmente, como bien sabemos, Florida, el Suroeste y Puerto Rico pasaron a manos de los estadounidenses.

Desde nuestra incorporación a este país hemos ido creciendo en presencia e influencia. La primera obra literaria en español publicada en EE. UU., fue un sermón de don José Agustín Caballero en 1804. En 1808 inició la prensa hispana en EE. UU. con el periódico *El Misisipi*

en Nueva Orleáns. Este fue el primero de los medios de comunicación en español en esta nación. En 1822 se eligió el primer político Hispano como representante estatal de Florida.

En 1865 la primera oficina para la pastoral católica entre los hispanos nombró al sacerdote Gabriel Serrano *pastor hispanorium* (pastor de los hispanos) en San Francisco, California. En 1970 el sacerdote Patricio Flores fue el primer hispano en ser consagrado como Obispo en y para Estados Unidos. En 1972 celebramos el Primer Encuentro Nacional de Católicos Hispanos donde nos auto nominamos un pueblo en marcha. Y seguimos caminando. — Fray Gilberto Cavazos-Giz, OFM, Copyright © J. S. God Watchers

In the ancient world watchmen were extremely important

people. They kept communities safe, and were there to alert them to any impending danger or attack. Before locks, alarms, and security systems, watchmen were the protectors, the safety measure. So when the Lord charges Ezekiel as a watchman today, it is a weighty charge. So weighty, we learn, that if Ezekiel fails

to sound the alarm for those around him and they perish in a state of wickedness, Ezekiel will be held responsible! This profound connection between God's will on earth and in heaven is repeated in today's Gospel, where Jesus instructs us that we are to be the security force, the watchers placed on alert that nowhere in the Body of Christ, the church, will there be any two members of the one Body who are not reconciled. Scripture tells us that Jesus reconciled all things in heaven and on earth through the blood of his cross. But we are given the mission to continue that reconciliation on earth as in heaven through our ceaseless efforts to be, as Paul would write, ambassadors of reconciliation. Let us not get too comfortable thinking that we are responsible only for keeping our own lives from the path of wickedness and disagreement. centinela, es un cargo de peso. Tan pesado, se nos hace conocer, que si Ezequiel falla y no da la voz de alarma a los que le rodean y ellos mueren en estado de maldad, ¡Ezequiel será el responsable! Healing the Community

"It takes one to know one." So goes the old saying. Many times in life, it's true. The kind of person we know best is typically the kind of person who we are ourselves. A young girl can't identify with her parents because, well, she's never been a parent. A teacher may not be able to identify with a construction worker because that teacher has never worked in construction.

This is true in almost every area of life. For someone who's never experienced poverty, truly empathizing with the poor is extremely difficult to do. Or, for someone who's always had access to food and drink, knowing what it's like to experience hunger is, likewise, very difficult. We could go on with examples, but the point remains the same: Those we truly know best are those who have walked a similar path as we have.

There is one thing, though, that we all know and experience. We've all been there before, and in many cases, in similar kinds of ways. That thing is sin. We've tasted it today and yesterday. And, we'll probably taste it tomorrow. In today's Gospel reading, it's easy — perhaps tempting — to hear Jesus telling us to be sin-finders: Call out the one who sins against you. If they don't listen, then go and get one or two more to help you call the sinner out so they will get the picture. And, if that doesn't work, bring the whole village in. If that still doesn't do the trick, be gone with them. Sounds pretty

harsh, doesn't it? If we're an habitual sinfinder, maybe it even sounds enjoyable! In any case, we should pause before jumping to the "Jesus is being harsh" conclusion. Because for those of us who know sin's impact (hint: that's all of us), this passage today has a lot of healing power.

Jesus knows we need each other. He knows those who attempt the journey on their own would be lost — even with a compass and a map. Paul tells the Romans in today's reading that whatever other commandment there may be is summed in this saying: "Love your neighbor as yourself." Even though they never met, Paul and Jesus were on exactly the same page. As a Christian, there just isn't much difference between me and my sisters and brothers. What we do to others, we do to our-

selves and vice versa. Jesus knows we need to heal and restore relationships to be a loving community.

People in the Western world might have a hard time with that approach. We like to keep things private. In the case of wrongdoing, that may mean sweeping the issue under the rug. So, we're challenged when Jesus steps in and says, "Not so fast folks. You've got some cleanup to do." Our gut instinct is to pretend that Jesus isn't talking to us. He must mean someone else or some other group of people. But, what if we genuinely took the last words of this Gospel to heart, and let them frame our whole way of thinking about the matter. "For where two or three are gathered in my name, there I am in the midst of them."

Do you think, with that phrase, that Jesus is interested in punishing us wrongdoers? No way. What he's interested in is restoration, in bringing us to a place of spiritual health. So, for those who are inclined to say nothing to a wayward sister or brother, and for those who are inclined to say everything, just remember: We are a part of them, too.

If we took Jesus' words seriously, maybe we would see the beauty in that. More importantly, maybe we would taste the medicine of healing restoration.


Seeking a Leader
