There are 351 parishes in the Archdiocese of Chicago; only 55 parishes have weekend attendance that exceeds 2,000. St. Teresa's 2016 October Count averaged 550 people at weekend Masses. The 2017 monthly averages are: January, 489; February, 570; March, 640; April, 705; May, 573; June, 541; July, 463; August, 510. In the Archdiocese there is 1 priest for every 1,525 parishioners; in the USA the ratio is 1:1,653 Catholics; 27 percent of US parishes do not have a resident priest. In comparison, South America has a ratio of 1:7,094 Catholics.

Fr. Frank is starting a border ministry reading group for those interested in participating in the border ministry at St. Teresa. The group will meet to discuss the book *Rescuing Regina*, by Josephe Marie Flynn SSND (2011, Chicago Review Press).

Here's a brief synopsis of the book from Amazon:

What is it like to be a young mother threatened with deportation to the country whose government has imprisoned you and whose soldiers have raped and tortured you? You don't want to leave your children behind, but how can you take them with you, knowing that your homeland, ruled by chaos and violence, is notorious for murdering failed asylum seekers?

Regina Bakala found herself in just this situation ten years after escaping the Congo and settling in the United States. Upon arrival, Regina had worked with an immigration lawyer, then joyfully reunited with her husband, also a Congolese torture survivor, and had two children. Life was challenging but full of hope until the night there was a knock at the door and immigration agents burst in. They forced Regina from her home as her family watched, then locked her in prison to await deportation to certain death.

In *Rescuing Regina*, author Josephe Marie Flynn tells Regina's powerful story—and how her husband, a pit-bull lawyer, a group of volunteers, and a feisty nun set aside political differences to galvanize a movement to save her. Revealing what she uncovered about US immigration policies and the dangers faced by those escaping war crimes, Flynn exposes an America most never see: a vast underbelly of injustice, a harsh detention and deportation system, and a frighteningly arbitrary asylum process. In their battle for justice, Regina and Josephe not only confronted dangerous obstacles but also reawakened emotions and traumas from the past. A compelling story of a quest for justice, *Rescuing Regina* is also a tale of friendship, faith, hope, and the transformative journey of two friends.

## **Treasures from Tradition**

We've seen how the rescue of Eucharistic Prayer II from the mists of history changed the style of our prayer, intro-

ducing a sleek simplicity to the prayer said aloud by the priest. Remember, before the reform of our prayer in the late 1960s, the priest whispered the words of the Roman Canon, Eucharistic Prayer I. His voice was not amplified, his back was to the people, who could only tell what was going on by a shift in his posture as he bowed and genuflected and as bells were rung to indicate his progress through the prayer.

With the emergence of the new prayers, some feared that the old prayer would be lost forever if it weren't somehow changed. The reformers asked that it be streamlined a bit by omitting the repeated "Through Christ" at the end of various intercessions, and trimming the list of somewhat obscure saints. The new edition therefore brackets parts of the two lists of saints in the prayer, unfortunately dropping all the women from the second set. The decision was also made to keep the Lord's words at the consecration exactly the same in every Eucharistic Prayer, although there is precedent for more variety. On November 2, 1968, Pope Paul VI signed off on the plan of the new Mass, and by April 1969, the publication of the revised order of Mass was announced. — Rev. James Field, Copyright © J. S. ### Tradiciones de Nuestra Fe

de la Merced. Esta orden religiosa se remonta al siglo XIII, mientras algunos musulmanes tomaban prisioneros cristianos en España. Era su misión rescatar a los cautivos, incluso, hasta tomar su lugar si fuera necesario.

Con el paso de los siglos, los mercedarios se han dedicado a rescatar todo tipo de cautivos del abuso social. Por tal razón, muchas imágenes de la Virgen de Nuestra Señora de la Merced la pintan con dos bolsitas de monedas usadas para comprar

la libertad de los encarcelados o esclavizados. En otras imágenes carga cadenas abiertas como símbolo de libertad.

Esta patrona de Perú recuerda el deseo latinoamericano de la liberación. Este deseo de liberación se ha convertido en un compromiso urgente para la Iglesia latinoamericana en protesta por los muchos abusos por parte de militares, guerrilleros y carteles de la droga que amenazan la libertad. Jesús vino a liberarnos del pecado y sus consecuencias y su madre (la Merced) ayuda fielmente en esa obra. ## Forgiveness

Then the father became seriously ill. The mother called the son and told him he had better

come soon. The son walked sheepishly into the hospital room. The father motioned his son to him and whispered: "Did you ever think you could do anything that would keep me from loving you?"

Resentment and anger are foul things, the first reading from Sirach tells us. Remember the last things. Stop hating. Live by the commandments. As Saint Paul writes to the Romans, we are to live for the Lord and die for the Lord.

**Gospel** — Forgive one another from your heart (Matthew 18:21-35).

## **Easier Said Than Done**

In Matthew's Gospel, we hear Jesus' response to Peter's question, "Lord, if my brother sins against me, how often must I forgive? As many as seven times?" Jesus answered, "I say to you, not seven times but seventy-seven times." Jesus further emphasizes his position on forgiveness by instructing Peter: "Each of you forgives your brother from your heart."

Granting forgiveness for minor offences is attainable: the neighbor who gossips about us, the driver who cuts us off in traffic, or the friend who hurts our feelings. As Christians, we are called to forgive all grievances, including the most heinous, brutal, savage crimes against humanity. This level of forgiveness is not only difficult, but can be tricky when dealing with anger, especially when anger is the result of a vicious abuse. As human beings, it is unhealthy not to feel hurt or anger. Not recognizing and acknowledging feelings can lead to depression or even suicide.

Yet, in today's reading from Sirach we hear wrath and anger described as hateful things and "the vengeful will suffer the Lord's vengeance." And, we hear Jesus' response to Peter. In John's Gospel, we are called even beyond that. Not only are we expected to forgive, but must love ourselves — not a selfwe are called to love: "I give you a new commandment, says the Lord; love one another as I have loved you" (13:34).

Easier said than done. Before we can begin to forgive, and

eventually love, we need to heal. In order to heal, we have to live and work through the pain and anger. We pray for the gift of faith. Faith is a most powerful companion. Faith grows hope. Hope recognizes part of the pain will subside, eventually. Faith and hope grow wisdom. In time, we realize this current pain can't be rushed. We need to embrace the stages of depression. Our self-pitying evolves into selflove.

We begin to do external healing: exercising, socializing, nutrition, self-care and counseling. In order to heal, we realize that we centered, myopic love, but rather a healthy acceptance of all our feelings. Internal healing appears when we realize that the love we feel for ourselves is actually the love of God. The love of God has power

over everything. It is in this realization, this power of self-love through God's love, that we are able to forgive. We might never forget the crisis, and maybe we should not forget. Remembering might be necessary to avoid a repeat of the original crisis.

As difficult as it is to forgive an offender, forgiving one's self may be more strenuous. There can be so many mental blocks to overcome and we may hear condescending, negative voices from past pains.

A classic example is the adult-child placing an aging parent into a nursing home. If the parent dies alone, the adult-child might be riddled with guilt. Since the parent is now deceased, the adult-child cannot ask for forgiveness. Healing may require counseling. But, the journey to healing from shock, through depression, through anger, to love and eventual forgiveness surely can be glimpsed in Psalm 103, "The Lord is kind and merciful, slow to anger, and rich in compassion. He pardons all your iniquities, heals all your ills. He redeems your life from destruction, crowns you with kindness and compassion."

Forgiving can be challenging. The ability to forgive and love is definitely arduous. But, being "crowned with kindness and compassion" makes forgiveness and love possible.


