
Fiscal Year Cheer


We've had an eventful and successful close to the calendar year 2017. We finished the remodeling of the rectory to allow for more staff offices and provide room for the expanding classes in the church. The remodeling was done on time, under budget, and high quality! No longer do the staff have to share a seat or take turns at a desk. There's also a great meeting space for Father Frank in the rectory without the risk of interrupting the education program.

Beginning this calendar year 2018, we are undergoing a Renew My Church review. More information to follow in the next several weeks when the review begins. Fortunately, our finances are doing very well, thanks to all the parishioners.

Monthly Sunday Collections increased 5% from fiscal 2016 to fiscal 2017. As our Fiscal Year 2017 (July 2016 -June 2017) has ended, we are doing better than we were last fiscal year (July 2015 – June 2016). Our Sunday collections totaled \$592,596, a 5% increase from 2016 and a 17% increase from 2015. Our Sunday Collections cover nearly 75% of St. Teresa's operating expenses.

Thank you to the parishioners of St. Teresa. Without your continued help, we would not be on a path to a more stable financial position.

Stewardship of Prayer and Worship

There are 351 parishes in the Archdiocese of Chicago; only 55 parishes have weekend attendance that exceeds 2,000. St. Teresa's October Count averaged for 2016, 550; for 2017,628 people at weekend Masses; The 2017 monthly averages are: January, 489; February, 570; March, 640; April, 705; May, 573; June, 541; July, 463; August, 510; September, 566; October, 621. In the Archdiocese there is 1 priest for every 1,525 parishioners; in the USA the ratio is 1:1,653 Catholics; 27 percent of US parishes do not have a resident priest. In comparison, South America has a ratio of 1:7,094 Catholics.





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Burying the Dead: Extrajudicial Killings in the Philippines & the Catholic Church's Response

Rodrigo Duterte's War on Drugs. Suspected of being addicts and pushers, the majority of murder victims are among the poor.

Besides helping bury the dead and providing economic and psychosocial assistance to families of victims, the Catholic Church in the Philippines is exercising a prophetic role. In addition to having established community-based rehab programs for drug users and addicts, the Church is monitoring and denouncing human rights violations and extending sanctuary to witnesses.

About the speaker: Rev. Amado Picardal, CSsR, is a 63-year-old Filipino Catholic priest and member of the Redemptorist Congregation. A human rights and peace advocate, he has served as spokesperson of the Coalition Against Summary Execution (based in Davao, Philippines) since 2003 and of the Network Against Killings in the Philippines since 2016.

About the Corporal Works of Mercy: The seven corporal works of mercy give us a model for how we should treat all others, as if they were Christ in disguise. They respond to the basic physical (corporal) needs of humanity as we journey together through this life: *Feed the hungry. Give drink to the thirsty. Shelter the homeless (welcome the stranger). Clothe the naked. Visit the sick & imprisoned. Bury the dead. Give alms to the poor.*

Treasures from Tradition

"One of the most unusual Catholic churches in the world is in Amsterdam: Our Lord in the Attic, or as the locals say, "Ons Lieve Heer op Solder." What looks like a beautiful narrow brick mansion alongside a canal is a clever disguise for a very well-preserved seventeenth-century home and a secret church. During the Reformation, the Netherlands was divided into Protestant Holland and the Spanish Netherlands, now known as Belgium, a Catholic stronghold. Protestant reformers seized all the Catholic parishes in Holland and "de-Catholicized" them. New laws forbade the celebration of the Mass in public. St. Nicholas Church was renamed "Old Church" by the new owners, and the

dispossessed Catholics got to work "hiding" St. Nicholas Parish in the upper floors of this mansion. Other Catholics did the same thing, but this is the only hidden church that survives today. Sunday Mass is still celebrated here.

It's a beautiful hideaway, with nothing spared in regard to marble, gilding, a pipe organ, and classic Dutch painting. A few steps away, the Old Church, begun in 1250, stands emptied of the statues and carvings of its Catholic days, its windows replaced by plain glass. The new tenants gave up when it came to the ceiling, which is still painted with saints, biblical scenes, and merchant ships. The Dutch reformers were tolerant sorts, and as long as the Catholics kept out of sight, they were out of mind. Catholicism was at last tolerated in Holland after 1853, but in 1924 when the International Eucharistic Congress was held in Amsterdam, processions of Catholics were still forbidden in the streets. Today, Roman Catholics are about 19 percent of the population, and there's no need for any of them to hide in the attic. — Rev. James Field, Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

Que agencias civiles tomen interés por los derechos del indígena es siempre "buena nueva". Lamentablemente lo que es "buena nueva" para la muchedumbre pobre es "mala noticia" para los poderosos. Uno de éstos decidió vengarse en contra de los campesinos. En su rabia, asesinó al joven Segundo Francisco de sólo 25 años de edad. Pero su muerte, como la de todo mártir, no fue en vano. and demands of our discipleship through baptism, we must first know our need for conversion, our repentance, our need to believe in the gospel fully. Today's Gospel opens with the stark reminder of what befell John the Baptist for completely living out his vocation as the herald of Christ and the gospel: he was arrested, imprisoned, and martyred. Though few of us will experience consequences that extreme, we must all be ready to risk some sort of rejection as, heeding the call of Jesus, we live out the kingdom of God at hand, repent of our sins, and believe in the good news of salvation. January 21 — January 27

New Year's Resolutions

It is January 21st, three weeks since New Year's Day, and by now, of the roughly 42 percent of us who made New Year's resolutions, about 40 percent have broken them. Which is okay. The Statistic Brain Research Institute reports, "People who explicitly make resolutions are 10 times more likely to attain their goals than people who don't explicitly make resolutions." There is something within us as humans that desires to make a fresh start, to become resolved, and then to change.

We see this played out in all three of our readings today. First, we have Jonah walking through the streets of Nineveh and proclaiming, "Forty days more and Nineveh shall be destroyed." Surprisingly (especially to Jonah) this dour warning works. One hundred percent of the people, from adults to children, and even including livestock, cover themselves in sackcloth, fast from food and water, and devote their time to turning from their evil ways.

St. Paul has a similarly urgent message for the church in Corinth, "I tell you, brothers and sisters, the time is running out." For Paul and the early Christian communities living a mere 20 years after Jesus' death and resurrection, Jesus' return in glory was imminent. Their lives, which had been changed by the revelation of God's kingdom in Jesus' life, death and resurrection, could be radically (and eternally) altered again at any moment when "the day of the Lord will come like a thief at night" (1 Thessalonians 5:2). For this reason Paul tells them, "The world in its present form is pass-

ing away." There is no time to focus on anything other than the work at hand, spreading the good news of Jesus, building up his church, and remembering him in the breaking of the bread.

And then we come to the Gospel reading where we hear the first words Jesus utters in the Gospel according to Mark, the Gospel that will accompany us throughout this liturgical year. Jesus says, "This is the time of fulfillment. The kingdom of God is at hand. Repent and believe in the gospel."

What does all of this urgency mean for us, living more than 2,000 years from the time Jesus walked in the land of Israel?

Like the Ninevites, the Corinthians and the Israelites, we too, live in a time of uncertainty. We exist in a fallen world where resolutions are easily made and easily broken, where each day there is a new opportunity to "repent and believe in the Gospel."

But we also live in "the time of fulfillment." Jesus' message to the people of his day, his message to us now, is that the time of fulfillment is upon us. We do not need to wait for the kingdom of God to manifest in "some heaven light years away" as Marty Haugen's hymn "Gather Us In" reminds us. We are called to manifest the kingdom in the here and now.

In Mark's Gospel, after proclaiming the dawning of the kingdom, Jesus begins enacting it. Those who are broken in body, mind, and spirit are healed. Sinners and outcasts are restored to God and to the community, and a few loaves and fish feed thousands. Wherever Jesus goes, the kingdom of God's love, peace and joy breaks out. And now we, who are the body of Christ, are called to continue living into this kingdom.

The kingdom is among us, within us, around us, inviting us in each moment of each day to claim our identity as kingdom people. This is a resolution not just for the new year but for everyday, to live in such a manner that the kingdom of God breaks out all around. St. Paul tells us, "the world in its present form is passing away." By the work of our hands guided by the love of God, may we be the agents of this transformation. Now is the time of fulfillment. The kingdom of God is at hand!


