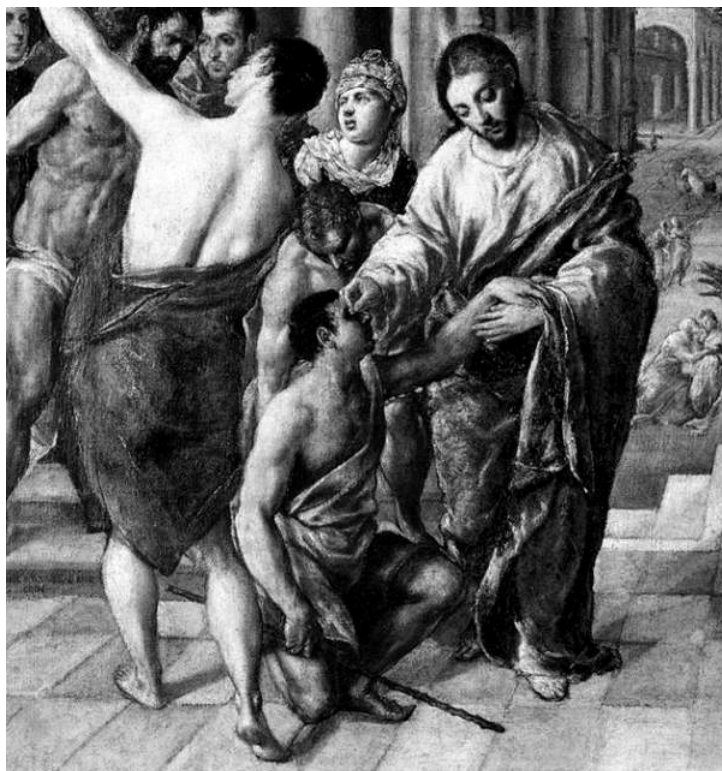

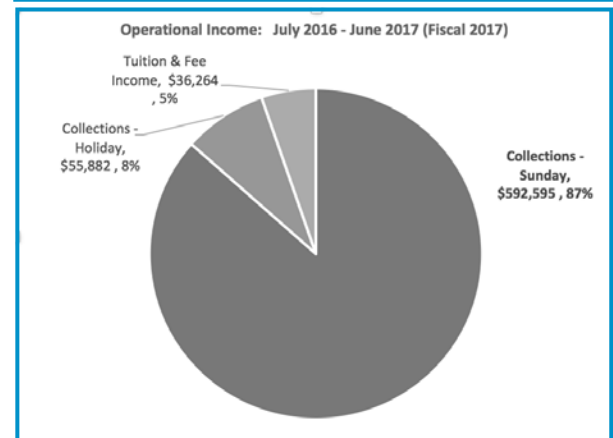
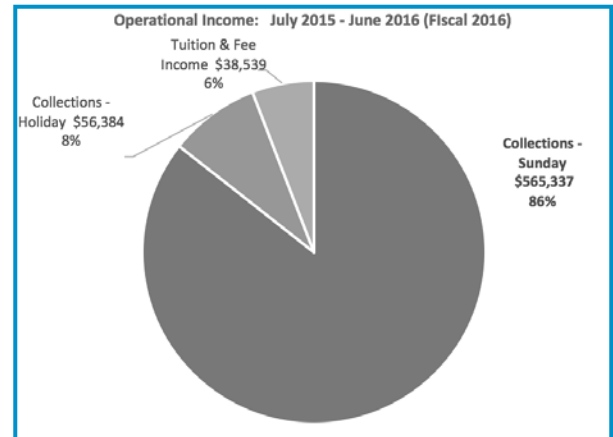
Fiscal Year Cheer

We've had an eventful and successful close to the calendar year 2017. We finished the remodeling of the rectory to allow for more staff offices and provide room for the expanding classes in the church. The remodeling was done on time, under budget, and high quality! No longer do the staff have to share a seat or take turns at a desk. There's also a great meeting space for Father Frank in the rectory without the risk of interrupting the education program.

Beginning this calendar year 2018, we are undergoing a Renew My Church review. More information to follow in the next several weeks when the review begins. Fortunately, our finances are doing very well, thanks to all the parishioners.

Monthly Sunday Collections increased 5% from fiscal 2016 to fiscal 2017. As our Fiscal Year 2017 (July 2016 – June 2017) has ended, we are doing better than we were last fiscal year (July 2015 – June 2016). Our Sunday collections totaled \$592,596, a 5% increase from 2016 and a 17% increase from 2015. Our Sunday Collections cover nearly 75% of St. Teresa's operating expenses.

Thank you to the parishioners of St. Teresa. Without your continued help, we would not be on a path to a more stable financial position.

There are 351 parishes in the Archdiocese of Chicago; only 55 parishes have weekend attendance that exceeds 2,000. St. Teresa's October Count averaged for 2016, 550; for 2017, 628 people at weekend Masses; The 2017 monthly averages are: January, 489; February, 570; March, 640; April, 705; May, 573; June, 541; July, 463; August, 510; September, 566; October, 621. In the Archdiocese there is 1 priest for every 1,525 parishioners; in the USA the ratio is 1:1,653 Catholics; 27 percent of US parishes do not have a resident priest. In comparison, South America has a ratio of 1:7,094 Catholics.



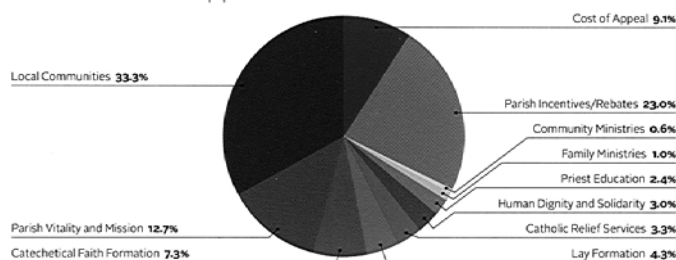

Treasures from Tradition

This is the year of St. Paul, and so one of the most visited churches of Rome is also one of the most beautiful: the Basilica of St. Paul Outside the Walls. Like so many other churches, it was founded by the master-builder (or financier) Emperor Constantine about the year 315. Paul was martyred outside the walls of the City of Rome at a place called Tre Fontaine, probably on June 29, in the year 65, perhaps the first anniversary of St. Peter's crucifixion. Christians buried him in a quiet place about two miles away, and visited to pray. Constantine was running low on bricks, apparently, because the first church was tiny. In 386 it was demolished and today's basilica begun. This vast and towering space looks much the same today as it did in the fourth century.

The centuries have not been kind to ancient Rome, but until the early 1800s St. Paul Outside the Walls survived beautifully, perhaps because it has been assigned for nearly a thousand years to Benedictine monks. It was therefore a vibrant place of daily prayer even through the centuries when Rome was a poor and nearly abandoned city. In 1823 a great fire resulted from a botched repair job to lead on the roof, and St. Paul's was destroyed. It is said that the whole world contributed to its restoration. Even the Russian czar and the viceroy of Egypt gave alabaster, malachite, and lapis lazuli for the pillars and the tabernacle. Several of the precious mosaics were able to be restored, bringing the ancient basilica back to life. One of the great treasures of the basilica is a set of prison chains, said to have been worn by the Apostle in the last days before his martyrdom. Unlike other Roman churches, St. Paul's stands in a garden-like suburban neighborhood, surrounded by stately palm trees, gardens, and parks. — Rev. James Field, Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.



Tradiciones de Nuestra Fe

El día 2 de febrero se celebrará la Candelaria. En este día se conmemora la purificación de María, cuarenta días después de que dio a luz a Jesús. Candelaria viene del verbo latín candere (brillar), de allí la palabra candela, o sea, veladora. La celebración de la Purificación de María y la Presentación del Niño Jesús en el templo se conmemora con la bendición de todas las velas y veladoras que se van a usar durante el año. Esto se hace con la esperanza de que nunca venga a faltar la luz, tanto material como espiritual, en las casas de los fieles. Los cristianos, como Simeón en el templo, pueden decir que ellos también han visto la salvación; Jesús la verdadera luz que brilla en brazos de María.

En Puerto Rico tradicionalmente esta fiesta se celebra con la quemazón de los árboles de navidad, basura, palos, cosas viejas, etc. Esta costumbre subraya el deseo de dejar atrás todo lo malo para que llegue lo bueno; es decir terminar con la oscuridad para que brille la luz. — Fray Gilberto Cavazos-Glez, OFM, Copyright © J. True Prophets

In Deuteronomy today we hear that God's very words will fill the mouth of a true prophet, but a false prophet will, in a manner of speaking, put mere mortal words into God's mouth. In Mark's Gospel, we see Jesus teaching and healing as a true prophet, one filled with the authority of God's own voice. The whole history of our church is filled with both true and false prophets. Some false prophets were extremely popular and quite well-versed in scripture, and even held positions of authority. But in today's Gospel we learn that Jesus' fame spread because he taught with authority; he wasn't an authority because he was popular or famous. Elsewhere, we also learn from him, in his desert temptation confrontations with Satan, that anyone can quote scripture, even against God's purposes. Today we hear that his authority was not like that of the scribes, who held the official positions of religious authority in his day. Our work is to do our best to discern the true prophets in our midst, and to be true prophets as well. The psalmist tells us how to do this: by not hardening our hearts when God speaks. If we truly listen to God, it will be God's very words filling our mouths.

Profetas Verdaderos

Hoy en Deuteronomio oímos que las palabras de Dios llenarán la boca de un profeta verdadero, pero un profeta falso pondrá, por así decirlo, palabras meramente humanas en boca de Dios. En el Evangelio según san Marcos, vemos a Jesús enseñando y curando como un profeta verdadero con la autoridad de la voz de Dios. La historia de nuestra Iglesia está llena de ambos tipos de profetas. Algunos profetas falsos fueron extremadamente populares y eran muy versados en la Sagrada Escritura, incluso ocupaban puestos de autoridad eclesial. Pero en el Evangelio de hoy descubrimos que la fama de Jesús se extendió porque enseñaba con autoridad; no era una autoridad porque fuera popular o famoso. En otra parte, descubrimos con él, cuando es tentado y enfrenta a Satanás en el desierto, que cualquiera puede citar la Sagrada Escritura, incluso si estos van en contra de los propósitos de Dios. Hoy oímos que su autoridad no era como la de los escribas, que eran la autoridad oficial religiosa en su época. Nuestra tarea es hacer todo lo posible por saber identificar a los verdaderos profetas que están entre nosotros y también a ser verdaderos profetas. El salmista nos dice cómo hacerlo: no debemos endurecer nuestros corazones cuando escuchamos a Dios. Si realmente escuchamos a Dios, Dios pondrá sus palabras en nuestra boca. Copyright © J. S. Reflection

January 28 — February 3

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“We’ve never seen anything like this!”

The Great Fire of Rome erupted on the night of July 18 in 64 C.E. Reported to have burned for more than a week, the destruction through the city was massive. The historian, Tacitus, wrote that Emperor Nero accused a group of people called “Christians” of starting the fire. As a result, a major persecution of them took place. Many of this small, recently constituted group — roughly 30 years after the death of Jesus — were brutally executed by being thrown to the beasts, crucified, and being burned alive.

Truth be told, at that time the world was experienced by most people as being dark and violent, a world overflowing with immense poverty and untold ruthlessness. It was the world of the Roman Empire — an empire in which the emperor was worshiped as a god. Among the titles he bestowed upon himself were “Lord of the Universe,” “Mighty God,” and “Prince of Peace” — to name just a few. To many people of that time, demonic forces had the upper hand. Satan was seen to be the ultimate ruler of the world.

But then, something extraordinary, something totally unexpected happened. Amid all this darkness and terror, a whole new literary genre was born. A book, unlike any other ever written, was created — a book that audaciously announced “good news of great joy!” This book, this “beginning of the gospel of Jesus Christ,” announced that a new beginning, a radical breakthrough had taken place. This book insisted that there was now present the possibility

of liberation, of escape from all this fear and brutality, of peace.

The writer of this radically revolutionary story was named Mark, the “interpreter” of the most famous of all apostles: Peter. As inscribed by Mark, the heart of Peter’s astounding message positioned the salvific actions of Jesus against the evil of Satan. Yes, Satan is mighty, but Jesus is even more so. Yes, the world is filled with demonic forces, but Jesus has triumphed over all of them. Yes, a darkness does cover the world, but Jesus has generated a bright light of hope that promises a whole new way of living, a whole new way of being.

And, as asserted in Mark’s Gospel, the “good news” for everyone suffering so horribly is essentially this: Emperor Nero is not the

all-powerful one as he insists; Jesus is. Emperor Nero is not the Lord of the universe as he claims; Jesus is.

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How could Mark make these revolutionary claims about Jesus? A leper is cleansed. A man with a withered hand and a woman with a hemorrhage are made well. A little child who was deemed dead is brought back to life. A raging sea is calmed. A madman is soothed and made whole. And then, in today’s Gospel, there is the touching story of Peter’s mother-in-law. The tenderness that emanates from Jesus is beautifully stated by these words written by Mark: “He approached, grasped her hand, and helped her up.”

This is the good news that Mark so desperately wants us to hear: The God of Jesus, unlike the emperor of Rome, wants only to rescue, to heal, to make well; the God of Jesus, unlike the emperor of Rome, wants only to take each of us by our hand and help us up.

This is why Mark reminds us again and again, throughout his entire Gospel, of the people’s persistent refrain of joy and awe: “We’ve never seen anything like this!”
