

The Archdiocese of Chicago Renew My Church Proposed Scenario

Members of the St. Teresa *Renew My Church* (RMC) committee met with other committee members of the RMC Lincoln Park / Old Town grouping on March 13th at St. Michael. At that meeting, we were given one scenario. Even though it is challenging, we were not given multiple scenarios (as was communicated to us at the beginning of this process), we believe this is an opportunity for us to produce multiple, creative, and viable scenarios for our Lincoln Park grouping.

The Archdiocesan RMC committee feels the staffing and property ownership structure in our grouping is unique because the Redemptorists both staff and own the property at St. Michael and the Vincentians both staff and own the property at St. Vincent de Paul. Additionally, the Archdiocese RMC committee feels the relatively recent unification of Immaculate Conception and St. Joseph as one parish is also important to take into account. Thus, here is the Archdiocese RMC committee initial scenario:

- St. Teresa of Avila and St. Josaphat would unite as one canonical parish with two active church worship sites. This assumes that St. Josaphat's current capital campaign will be able to address the church facility's capital needs. St. Josaphat School would serve as the parish school.
- St. Michael and St. Vincent de Paul would each remain in their current structures, based on their staffing and ownership by their respective religious communities, unless they

choose to create something different.

 Immaculate Conception and St. Joseph would remain in its current structure as a multi-site parish. The school would also continue in its current structure.



The RMC process and group discussion is not over. We had a healthy discussion and voiced our challenges with this single sce-

nario as well as opportunities to improve it. Over the next two weeks, the St. Teresa committee will propose additional scenarios that exemplify the strength of St. Teresa's spirit, vitality of our mission, viability of our finances, and the continuing growth of our parish.

What can you do over the next couple weeks? Attend mass, express what makes St. Teresa special, talk to others and share our mission. Please reach out to us to offer any suggestions.

There are 351 parishes in the Archdiocese of Chicago; only 55 parishes have weekend attendance that exceeds 2,000. St. Teresa's October Count averaged for 2016, 550; for 2017,628 people at weekend Masses; The 2017/2018 monthly averages are: January, 489/644; February, 570/566; March, 640/602; April, 705; May, 573; June, 541; July, 463; August, 510; September, 566; October, 621. In the Archdiocese there is 1 priest for every 1,525 parishioners; in the USA the ratio is 1:1,653 Catholics; 27 percent of US parishes do not have a resident priest. In comparison, South America has a ratio of 1:7,094 Catholics.

Stories of *La Posada:* Yaniel (Cuba)

"I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me." – *Matthew 25:35*

St. Teresa is partnering with *La Posada Providencia* for our Border Ministry. Located in the lower Rio Grande Valley, *La Posada* provides shelter for immigrants and asylum seekers waiting for



their cases to be adjudicated before the U.S. Immigration Court.

Living its mission to "welcome the stranger," *La Posada* has welcomed over 9,000 "strangers" since 1989. In this weekly column, the refugees and volunteers from La Posada share their stories with the community of St. Teresa of Avila parish.

Yaniel's Story (Cuba)

I am from Cuba, but I was persecuted by the government of Cuba for my political ideas. I ran away from Cuba in 2014. I got to Ecuador and worked hard to save money to keep traveling to the USA.

In February 2017, I traveled from Ecuador to Mexico with a visa. Then, I presented myself at the US border to ask for asylum. They put me in prison, and I remained there for eight months until I finished my case. The judge granted me "withholding of removal". I'm allowed to live in the USA.

I found the address of *La Posada Providencia* in Texas and they welcomed me. I'm really blessed here. I have no family in the USA, but I think that I can have a normal life. Now, I'm waiting for my work permit to begin to work and pay my rent and after all create a new family.

Treasures from Tradition

Sometimes children acquire nicknames in childhood that stalk them through adulthood: "Pinky," "Boo-boo," and the like. This Sunday was once called "Low Sunday," a step down from Easter glory, and an unfortunate nickname since Easter rejoicing goes on for fifty days. Traditionally this is the day when the newly baptized put away their

white baptismal robes and returned to their everyday life after a week of intense celebration. Of course, the goal was to take up everyday duties with a very new point of view.

A long title for the day was Dominica in albis deposito, or "The Lord's Day for Putting Away the Albs," so no wonder the nickname "Low Sunday" arose. In the old calendar it was also called "Quasimodo Sunday," after the first word of the opening chant, Qua-

simodo geniti infantes, or "As newborn infants," a reference to the newly baptized taken from the Epistle of Peter. Victor Hugo's bell-ringing hero in The Hunchback of Notre Dame was abandoned as an infant on the threshold of the cathedral of Paris on Low Sunday, 1467, and named "Quasimodo" for the feast. — Rev. James Field, Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

Tradiciones de Nuestra Fe

En tiempos pasados, cuando la Misa era en latín, no teníamos la oportunidad de escuchar en nuestra propia lengua las bellas palabras que Cristo pronunció durante la Última Cena y que el sacerdote repite durante la Consagración: "Esto es mi cuerpo"... "Esta es mi sangre". Por tal razón los monaguillos sonaban unas campanitas

> indicando que algo importante estaba pasando. En ese momento los fieles levantábamos la cabeza para ver el pan convertido en cuerpo y el vino convertido en sangre.

Lamentablemente el sacerdote nos daba la espalda y no podíamos ver lo que ocurría sobre el altar. Sin embargo, respondíamos con las palabras del apóstol Tomás: "Señor mío y Dios mío".

Estas palabras reconocen y adoran la presencia de Jesús en el pan y el vino. A este momento se le consideraba el más importante de la Misa. No obstante, el Concilio Vaticano II vino a enseñarnos que este es el momento cumbre, junto con toda la Plegaria Eucarística, pues toda la Misa es igualmente importante, excepto que durante la Plegaria Eucarística alcanzamos el punto más alto de la celebración. Por esa razón ya no hay campanita, pues ahora escuchamos todo en nuestro propio idioma, así como los discípulos las escucharon de Cristo, en su propio


So That You Might Believe

It is not often that the author of one of the books of the Bible comes right out and tells us directly why he

is writing what he is writing. In this Sunday's Gospel reading, taken from the conclusion of John's Gospel, the author tells us that he has chosen to record these events so "that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that through this belief you may have life in his name" (20:31).

The letter of John echoes this idea by saying that "[e]

veryone who believes that Jesus is the Christ is begotten by God" (5:1)—what we might refer to as being "born again." Our reading from the Acts of the Apostles for this Second Sunday of Easter shows us exactly what it looks like when believers are born again through faith. Copyright @ J. S. Paluch Co., Inc.

Faith in Action

When I was in third grade, my teacher told the class that St. Thomas the Apostle was from Missouri. Seeing our skeptical faces, she continued, "That's why our nickname is the Show-Me State!"

I don't remember if we laughed or groaned at the corny joke, but since then I have always felt a sense of kinship with Thomas. I suspect even some non-Missourians might feel the same way. Many of us probably experience the longing Thomas expressed in today's Gospel — if not to literally put our fingers in the nail marks of Jesus' hands, at least to be confronted with some sort of concrete, undeniable proof that Jesus is risen. It can seem difficult, even unfair, to be expected to believe what we have not seen.

Today's Gospel reading does not vindicate this attitude, but it does offer some hope. Jesus rebukes Thomas for not believing before he has seen, but he is also merciful. He gives Thomas a second chance by offering him the proof that he requested. And Thomas does not waste the opportunity. He not only accepts that Jesus is risen, but immediately realizes what that means, responding "My Lord and my God!" According to church tradition, Thomas' faith was so strong that it eventually led him to martyrdom.

Consider applying Thomas' story to the modern struggle to have faith. Several points can be made. First, Thomas remained part the community, even while he was doubting. Thomas was still there when Jesus returned because the other disciples did not reject him for his lack of belief and he didn't leave to seek out more likeminded individuals.

How do we react when our family, friends or members of our parishes disagree with us, seem too skeptical or too naively credulous? Do we separate ourselves from them or try to remain in community, trusting God can work with the situation?

Second, Thomas clearly stated what would compel him to have faith — and he got it! We should not demand signs from God and expect to receive them, but we can always reflect on, and ask God for, what we need to make our faith stronger. Is it an experience of God's presence in prayer, a greater understanding of Scripture, the ability to see God in our neighbors? How can we be more open to the gift of faith?

Finally, once Thomas does have faith, he does more than admit he was wrong. Instead, he accepts the Resurrection as a reality that will change his priorities and his actions,

eventually leading him to die as a martyr for his faith. Even those of us not called to martyrdom are called to recognize that Jesus reverses the typical measures of success — and to let that recognition change our behavior. This is difficult. One can believe Jesus when he says we can only save our lives by losing them; that we will be judged on how we treat our neighbors in need; that being poor, hungry, sorrowful or despised are reasons for rejoicing while being rich, well-fed or celebrated are reasons for woe. But do we behave as if those teachings are the truth? If we don't, can we really say we believe them?

Today's first two readings present examples of faith in action. In Acts, we see the early Christians behave in a way that would not make sense without their faith, selling their property and giving the proceeds to the apostles to distribute. The author of the second reading is convinced, against literal appearances that faith "conquers the world."

If we truly had faith, what would we do and how would we think? Would we sell our possessions, change the way we spend our time, take greater risks in the service of the kingdom of God, pursue righteousness rather than comfort and prefer peace to prestige?

This Easter season, Thomas' story can inspire us to take the next opportunity for our faith to transform our lives.


