



There are 351 parishes in the Archdiocese of Chicago; only 55 parishes have weekend attendance that exceeds 2,000. St. Teresa's October Count averaged for 2016, 550; for 2017, 628 people at weekend Masses; The 2017/2018 monthly averages are: January, 489/644; February, 570/566; March, 640/637; April, 705; May, 573; June, 541; July, 463; August, 510; September, 566; October, 621; November 622. In the Archdiocese there is 1 priest for every 1,525 parishioners; in the USA the ratio is 1:1,653 Catholics; 27 percent of US parishes do not have a resident priest. In comparison, South America has a ratio of 1:7,094 Catholics.







In medieval times, one country, Scotland, linked its

economy to the liturgy. Four holy days of the church calendar were keyed to the legal year. On these days, rents were due, clergy and servants were paid, and contracts and leases would begin or end. The term days were Pentecost (called Whitsunday), the Feast of Saint Martin on November 11 (Martinmas), the Feast of the Presentation

on February 2 (Candlemas), and August 2 (Lammas), a harvest festival. On Lammas day, the first loaf of bread from the summer wheat harvest was given to the village priest. After the Reformation, which swept the Catholic festivals away, the term days were gradually detached from the old feasts. It was only in 1990 that the term days were anchored on the 28th of February, May, August, and November. Today the old Scottish universities are the last hold-outs, still naming their terms or semesters after the old festivals. Scottish students today may not know about the liturgical year, but they still call the fall term Martinmas, and the spring session Candlemas. Rev. James Field, Copyright O. J. S. Paluch Co.

Living Branches

The Gospel and second reading for this Fifth Sunday of Easter emphasize the need for us to remain in

Christ, and he in us. This shared life finds expression in the image of the one vine and many branches. We become living branches of the vine, members of the Body of Christ through baptism, Eucharist, and confirmation, sacraments of sharing God's own life. The First Letter of John describes the fruit of this

vine as active love of neighbor: "And his commandment is this: we should believe . . . and love one another" (1 John 3:23).

Our first reading from Acts shows us an example of someone who shares in Christ's life in the person of Saint Paul. Paul's fearless witness, even at the risk of his life, is proof to everyone that the risen Lord's Spirit truly fills him with life and is bearing fruit in him. Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co., Inc.

Stories of La Posada: Marcial's Story

"I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me." – *Matthew 25:35*

St. Teresa is partnering with *La Posada Providencia* for our Border Ministry. Located in the lower Rio Grande Valley, *La Posada* provides shelter for immigrants and asylum seekers waiting for their cases to be adjudicated before the U.S. Immigration Court.



Living its mission to "welcome the stranger," *La Posada* has welcomed over 9,000 "strangers" since 1989. In this weekly column, the refugees and volunteers from La Posada share their stories with the community of St. Teresa of Avila parish.

Marcial's Story (Guatemala)


I am from Guatemala. I left my family in October 2017 to immigrate to the United States. I suffered a lot on the way to Mexico. They robbed me of all my belongings. Later crossing the river immigration grabbed me, and I spent three days in a "hielera" [Border Patrol short-term holding facility] with nothing but a t-shirt so I was very cold. Later they took me to detention. I spent 33 days without speaking to my family. I did not have family in the United States, so a friend told me to send a card to the sisters of La Posada Providencia asking if they would take me in when I was released. Thanks to them, after 15 days I received a card in detention saying that Marcial was welcome at La Posada Providencia. I arrived in the middle of the night, and a sister came to the bus station to bring me to La Posada. The next day I was given food and clothing. I am thankful to God and to them while I look for friends and work. They receive all people that are immigrants and they serve them. I am thankful to them for all they have given me. 
